Earlier predictions of a wide spread Asian flu epidemic this fall and winter appear to be materializing. Reports of cases coming in from all quarters indicate that Texas has been well seeded with the virus. So far, Asian flu, which is really a new strain of virus type well known to lab technicians, has been comparatively mild. This very fact has caused many people to ask why so much noise is being made about it. There are several gool answers. First, even mild flu can be disabling for four or five days follow ed by a period of lassitude and

Second, flu is always unpredictable. Cases are frequently complicated by bacterial infections. even when uncomplicated, the ill-ness has a particularly dangerous impact on persons suffering from heart ailments or chronic diseases.






