J. Frank Norris Will Speak at Lamesa Wednesday Night

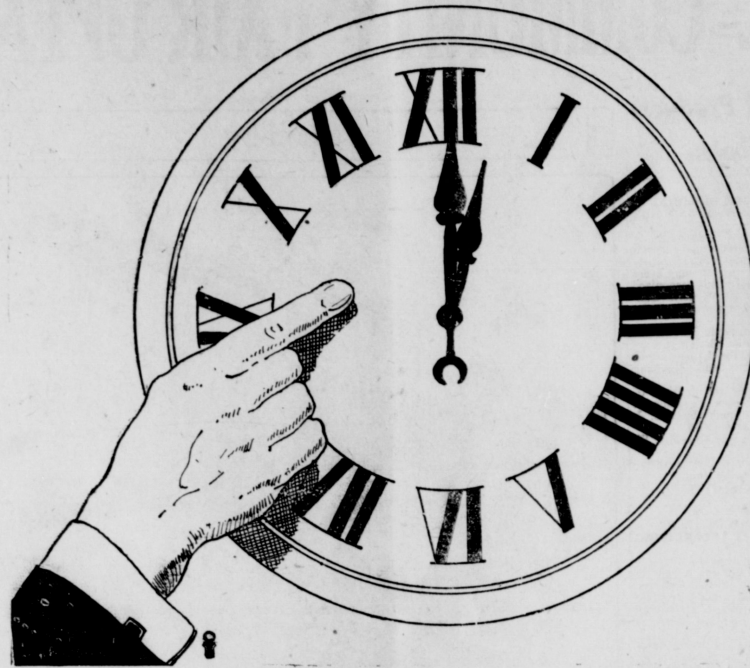

"INSIDE" INFORMATION

Summer butter on the farm for winter use should be made from perfectly sweet, pasteurized cream, churned without being ripened or soured. The butter-making process is practically the same as when sour cream is used. A few points, however, should be kept in mind. It is especially desirable to have the butter come firm enough so that the body will be waxy. When butter comes soft the body is likely to be greasy or oily, and this undesirable characteristic will increase with age. It is also important that the butter come in firm granules so that the buttermilk may be washed out easily. When the granules are the size of kernels of what the churn should be stopped. A churning period of about 30 minutes is required. It has been found that when the churning period is less than 30 minutes, buttermilk from sweet cream usually contains more butterfat than that from sour cream. The best way to keep sweet-cream butter in storage on the farm is by immersing it in strong brine, and keeping it in the coolest place available.

Shoulder of lamb has long been considered a choice cut, but the shoulder blade running through the center makes it impossible to carve into attractive slices. The shoulder blade and leg bone can easily be removed, however, leaving an excellent pocket for savory stuffing. The stuffed shoulder may then be rolled up or left flat like a pillow. In either case it is sewed together around the edges and roasted in an open pan. The tasty stuffing helps to conserve the juices of the meat and to add seasoning. Carving difficulties are thus overcome. The boned stuffed shoulder can be carved straight thru into shapely slices of just the right blend of meat and stuffing.

CHEVROLET MOTOR COMPANY REACHES NEW MILE-STONE

Further entrenching itself in its position as the world's foremost automobile producer, the Chevrolet Motor Company last week reached a new mile-stone in its manufacturing history. With production and sales continuing at a record September clip, the millionth car of 1923 came off the assembly line at Flint last Tuesday afternoon.

Due to the high September production schedule necessary to meet an unusually heavy fall demand, no formal ceremonies marked the occasion although W. S. Knudsen, president of the Chevrolet Motor Company, R.

H. Grant, vice-president in charge of sales, C. F. Barth, vice-president in charge of manufacturing and other Chevrolet officials were present.

The record making car was a coach, one of the most popular models in the line. It was a standard model in every respect. Like hundreds of thousands of Chevrolet coaches it was finished in avenue green Duco, with Tartan tan wheels, black beading and striping in gold.

After a brief informal ceremony the millionth car passed through the usual channels of distribution and was shipped a few hours after it came off the line to a dealer in the middle west.

An idea can be grasped of the immensity of the task of building 1,000,000 cars in less than 8 months when it is borne in mind that to achieve this record it was necessary that a Chevrolet be built approximately every 10 seconds of every working day.

Computing on the basis that there are 25 working days a month, it means that one million cars were built in a little more than 200 working days. Mr. Knudsen pointed out that the building of 1,000,000 cars since January 1 would not have been possible without strict adherence to precision methods. "Chevrolet knows that inaccuracies in manufacture and assembly slow down the line with a consequent lowering of output and increase of cost," Mr. Knudsen said. "In Chevrolet's scheme of volume production the highest standards of quality and accuracy must be maintained in order that costly delays in production caused by breakage and poor fitting parts may be avoided."

The sensational production of one million cars in less than eight months reflects the remarkable public acceptance accorded the "Bigger and Better" models since its introduction on January first. Never in the history of the automobile business has this record been approached by any other manufacturer of gear shift cars.

Contrary to the general belief that sweet clover is not palatable to livestock, this crop is used on some of the most successful farms of the Corn Belt as the principal pasture. There is no trouble in getting livestock to eat sweet clover pasture readily unless the growth is too big and tough before the animals are turned in on

it for the first time. For hay, the fall crop of the first year is generally preferred, as the growth then is finer and the hay is of better quality than at any other time. The hay cut from this crop is practically equal to first-class alfalfa hay, and a ton of sweet-clover hay per acre can be cut early in the fall if the soil has been limed and inoculated to put it in condition for the best growth of this crop.

ENGINEERS STUDY FLOOD RECORDS BACK TO 1000 B. C.

Records of floods and rains at Rome, Italy, dating back to 1000 B. C. are to be studied by army engineers in connection with flood control on the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers for the protection of Pittsburgh as well as work on the Mississippi.

Maj. Gen. Edgar Jadwin, Chief of engineers, has just returned from an inspection trip in the Pittsburgh and Buffalo districts, where he visited some of the sites proposed for reservoirs. He said he was much impressed

with the improvements he found in some of these sites. The possibility of turning the water of the upper Allegheny into Lake Erie instead of letting it flow down the Ohio is considered by the engineers.
