Baylor county, with Seymour as the county seat, 200 miles away. When Lubbock county was organzed in 1891, Lynn was attached to ubbock for judicial purposes. Mexican sheepherders rom New Mexico territory known to have grazed their herds round the Tahoka Lake and Double Lakes water holes as early as the 1850's, the first Anglo merican settlers were Shaw McDonald who ran a sheep herd at Tahoka Lake. Then in 1883 Boyd and Frank Porter drove a herd of cattle out to Double Lakes. The next year Cass O. Edwards bought this herd and became the first permanent resident. He established the T Bar ranch, still owned by his fam ily. Other cattlemen followed ong them being Butler, Oxshire, Winn and Pulliman, Major Johnson, Col. C. C. Slaughter, Singleton Bros. and others. The lare Jack Alley, father of Mrs. Hall Robin-son, was one of the early comers,



Lions, Baboons **Enliven Africa Explorer Camp**

WASHINGTON, D.C.-A hungry lion and a tribe of marauding monkeys have enlivened camp life for an American expedition studying wildlife and native culture in the more remote parts of French Equatorial Africa.

Both the lion and the monkeysbaboons-invaded the camp of the expedition, the lion to steal the carcass of a hartebeest that had been killed as food for native bearers, and the baboons to upset plans made to photograph the lion.

The expedition is sponsored by the National Geographic Society The American Museum of Natural History and Dr. and Mrs. Carnes Weeks of Medway Plantation, Mount Holly, South Carolina. Expedition members include Mrs. Weeks, well known as an explorer. Walter A. Weber and Volkmar K. Wentzel of The Society, and T. Donald Carter of the Museum.

Larcenous Lion

The expedition had made camp on the Aouk River, east of Fort Archambault, French Equatorial Africa, in the midst of country heavy with game, when it encoun-tered the lion and the baboons. The lion stole into camp about 3:30 one morning to make off with the hartebeest carcass, which was found abandoned about 200 yards away.

Hoping to obtain pictures of a lion feeding at night, Mr. Wentzel retrieved the carcass and surrounded it with five cameras equipped with flash guns-all set up so that any movement would actuate the shutters and lights.

Unfortunately, however, the baboons found the cameras fascinating playthings and knocked them all down.

Species Collected

A full report of the scientific findings of the expedition will be made when it returns to the United States, but Mr. Carter has indicated successful progress in his collection of specimens for the Museum. He reported that "quite a bit" of "some very nice" material had been obtained on one 17-day. 600-mile field trip.

Wild animals did not provide all the trouble encountered by the travelers; some developed when the native cook mistook automotive brake fluid for cooking oil and fried steaks in it.
