G. T. Kibbe Acquitted

Last Thursday another of our citizens was taken before the county' tribunal at Tahoka and tried for something he did not do. This time the victim was C. T. Kibbe, D. C. He was charged with practicing medicine without having obtained a license from the State Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Kibbe was acquitted of the charge and the verdict of the jury is said to have caused a demonstration in the court room seldom equaled, the spectators rushing to the doctor to extend congratulations upon the justness of the decision.

Only one witness, Bob Anderson, was introduced by the state who testified that he was a "human being," that he had not received medical treatment, that the signs on the defendant's office door read, "Come in without knocking," "C. T. Kibbe, D. C., Chiropractor" and that D. C. was the abbreviation of District of Columbia, but upon further questioning stated that in this instance the letters stood for doctor of chiropractic.

Several witnesses were introduced by the defense, none of whom had received medical treatment, but had been given adjustments, the results of which they were not allowed to divulge by the court.

Just why Dr. Kibbe was forced to undergo the embarrassment of a court trial is not known to his friends here, except it is surmised that it is one of the penalties of success, forced upon him by envious hearts, as every school boy in O'Donnell knows that the practice of chiropractic is not the practice of medicine. The chiropractor uses no medicine and it would be an injustice to him to have him go before the medical board for an examination in materia medica when it is not used in his practice of relieving suffering humanity.

The chiropractors have tried for many years to get a bill through the legislature to create a chiropractic board and license those who are qualified to practice, but there has been so much opposition that they have never been able to get the bill passed. Twenty-eight states in the Union grant license to chiropractors.

The medical doctors of O'Donnell would have nothing to do with the prosecution of Dr. Kibbe's case, as they work in perfect harmony. Dr. Kibbe came here in November, built a home and office and has since been identified with every move for the upbuilding of the community

The farmers are taking advantage of the fine weather following the rains and are rushing the work of planting to utmost capacity many running their planters night and day.

Prof. H. James Bailey has been here this week to reorganize the band and tutor it into the tooting class. The result of his work is not yet known, but O'Donnell needs a band.

School Enrollment over 600

I have recently been working on the term report for the O'Donnell Public Schools and thought that some of the figures might prove interesting. There was a total enrollment of 612 pupils. The average attendance cannot be figured yet, because the term has not ended, but so far it is slightly above five hundred. This means that day in and out we have had an actual attendance of more than five hundred pupils. The high school total enrollment is ninety-five. There will be a large increase in the high school department another year, according to reports from the teachers as to probable promotions. I am expecting a high school of at least 125 pupils next year.

Some inquiries are still being made as to the status of the O'Donnell schools. We have already secured classification, the State Department of Education rating us as a class A high school. We are applying for affiliation or for credits in all the high school subjects and hope to be successful in at least some of them. Accrediting of a subject is based on an exhibit of the work of that subject, including themes, note books, tests and final examinations, and cannot be sent off until schools closes.

Patrons of the school will be gratified to learn that we have secured Dr. P. W. Horn, President of the Texas Technological College, to deliver the commencement address, May 29, 1925. Dr. Horn is one of the foremost educators in Texas or the South, and is a very capable speaker. The exercises will probably be held in one of the churches of the town as the auditorium at school is too small to accommodate the crowds.

The Baccalaureate sermon will be preached at the Methodist church Sunday, May 24, by Rev. B. H. Warren of Plainview. Rev. Warren comes to us highly recommended and no doubt will have an inspiring message. Other announcements in regard to commencement week will be made later.
