Federal Insurance Deadline April 30

Final date for Lynn county farmers to take advantage of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation's program of investment protection for cotton is April 30, according to Ben A. Jordan, Jr., State Director for the FCIC.

Federal Crop Insurance has provided almost \$7,600,000 in guaranteed income protection for Lynn county farmers against loss of crops from unavoidable natural hazards since its inception in the county. During this same period, Lynn county farmers have received direct payments in excess of \$1,900,000 for damage to cotton crops.

Final day for casting an absentee ballot is Tuesday, May 3.

Interest locally in politics was beginning to pick up this week, and a fairly heavy vote is being forecast in Lynn county because of contests for county judge, clerk, treasurer, two commissioners and two justice of the peace offices.

Help Clean Up O'Donnell!

Farm Program Is Explained

About one hundred farmers attended the meeting Thursday night of last week, when Wallace Dove, ASCS office manager, explained some vital rules of the new farm program as handed down to him.

For those who failed to attend, the following brief review is given:

Cotton Allotments

Lynn county has 1,449 farm units with effective allotment of 181,961 acres, with all but 10 signed up to divert 61,754 acres, or 34 of the 35 percent allowed, leaving 120,207 acres to plant under the new program.

Pointing out the effect of the county's economy, he said if the average yield is 402 pounds per acre this would be a reduction of 49,650 bales.

Feed Grain

A total of 1288 farms have a feed grain base total of 243,109, with 113,801 intending for planting and 68,513 diverted. He said 46.8 percent of the acreage is signed in the program.

Dates To Remember

Dove said the following are the dates for the farmer to remember: May 2 final date for reporting wheat and barley. If the farmer has barley seeded but no base and is participating in the Feed Grain Program he must either certify his acreage for harvest or dispose

of such acreage by May 2. If bar-corn, also diverted acres.

June 20, final date for measuring service after planting. Cost is \$5.00 for first plot and \$3.00 and 2 cents per acre.

May 16, final date for pre-measuring; cost \$8.00-\$4.00 and 5 cents per acre (plus 36 cents per mile based on 9 cents times 4 ways.)

Ineligible as diverted acres are ley or wheat is disposed of by grazing, it must be grazed to the extent that nothing could be harvested by May 2.

August 15, final date for reporting cotton, grain sorghum, and Farmer Certification

This year, Lynn is one of the counties in the pilot program to allow farmers to measure their own acres, but 25 percent will be checked. Farms of all ASCS personnel will be checked.

A farmer may certify his own acres, he may pre-measure, or he may take advantage of the more practical method of having ASCS officer personnel measure his acres. He may also check with ASCS office maps. To avoid liability of penalty, he can apply for measuring service, but should do this early as ASCS can not guarantee personnel will be available to get around to all.

Tolerances are (1) to .9 of an acre based on 40 acres, or (2) the larger of 2 acres or 5 percent, not to exceed a total of 15 acres.

The farmer should make certain he has his full diverted acres laid out.

Designated Diverted Acres

Only land intensively cultivated during at least one of the four years immediately preceding the current year is eligible, tilled in accepted manner in producing small grain or row crops.

Ineligible as diverted acres are turn rows, or end rows used in operations of equipment; w-type ditches regardless of width; and wet low-lying areas.

Minimum size for designated crops, plots not to exceed five per farm without prior Committee approval, must be at least one chain wide and contain at least one acre unless it is a whole field or sub-division, or unless less than one acre is needed for diversion. Four or more normal rows may be used for diversion when in a pattern with other crops.

Deficient Diverted Acres

For deficient diverted acres, an adjustment will be permitted when there is additional eligible land on the farm and such acreage has been treated as diverted for the entire year. Destruction of a crop to qualify the acreage as diverted may be permitted if this is done before certifying or before the final disposition date.

The farmer may request a re-measurement.

Postal Savings Is Discontinued

I urge each depositor that might have Postal Savings certificates at other post offices to withdraw their postal savings accounts as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 28, 1966 by the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Johnson. No deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. Interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

For the convenience of all certificates held by a depositor they may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Office in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates, than the 2 percent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the system has out-lived its usefulness for the American people. As of June 30, 1965 there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. This number has been declining at a rate of about 6,500 per month.

Unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

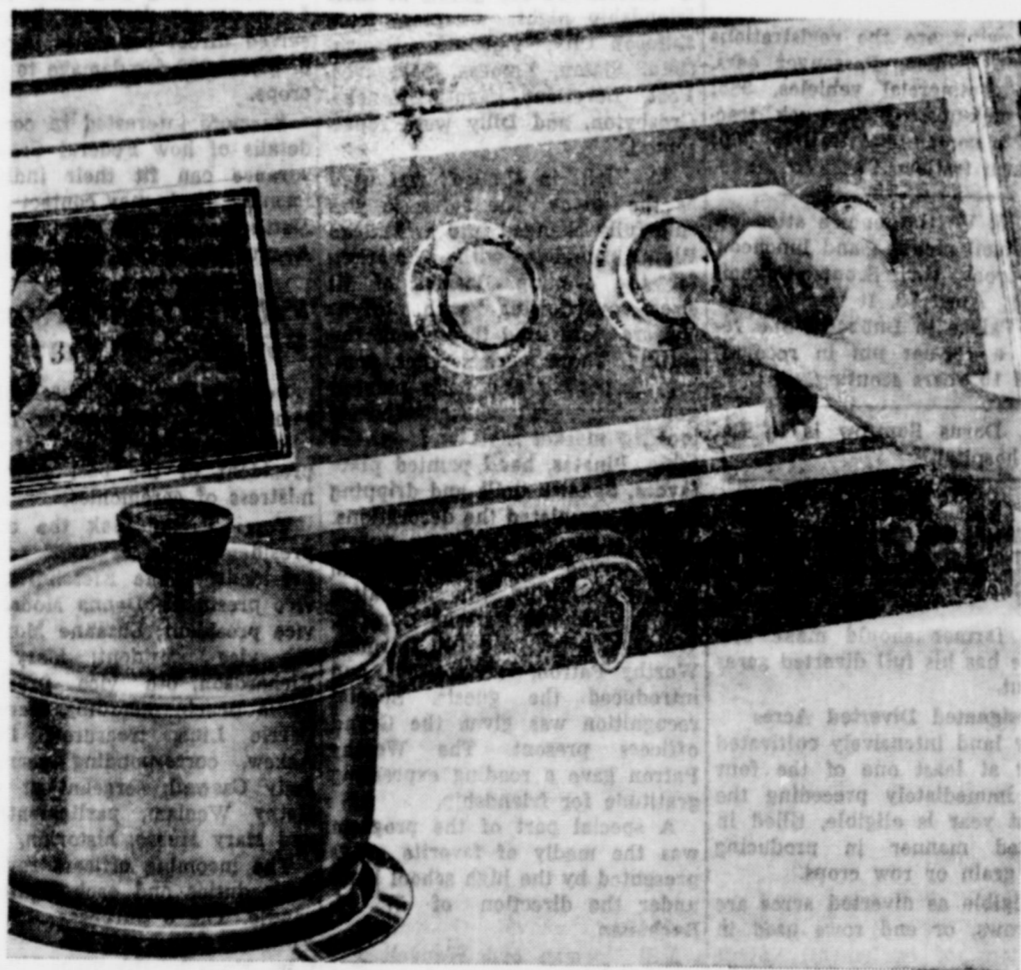
I plan on seeing everyone in my precinct in person that I have not seen, before election.

My opponent is asking for 16 years. I think that is too long as there are so many good men in Precinct 2.

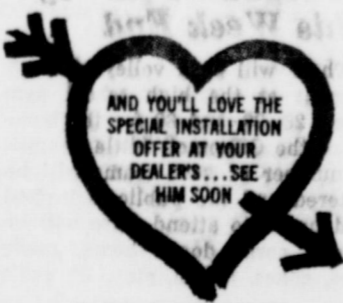
