Social security payments can be paid retroactively for only one year filed, if entitlement exists said W. G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock District Office.

"There are some rare occasions," he went on, when a person claims benefits, fails to prove entitle-ment for a number of months, then succeeds and gets back payments for more than a year from the time furnished the last bit of evidence on which his eligibility depended."

"Ordinarily, such occasions are few and far between, as a social security office is usually able to help most people gather, in no more than a week or so, any evidence needed to prove their rights to benefits," added Hutton.

He further stated that the vast majority of the more than 7 mil-lion people now receiving monthly social security payments had trouble getting their checks started It was thus not necessary to pay them retroactively for more than a month or so unless they had de-layed filing their claims for many months past their initial eligibility.

"We have always suggested that the nearest social security office be notified when a claimant reaches the age of 65, or when a person insured under social security dies," Hutton concluded.

"Fall Out" Explained

Ever heard the expression "fall out" in connection with atomic age? Ever wondered what it's all about?

State Health Department radiation experts say fall out is nothing more than particles of matter in the air, made radioactive by nuclear or thermonuclear explosions. When an atomic or hydrogen bomb exploded close to the ground. thousands of tons of atomized earth, building materials, rocks and gases are sucked upward---like soda being sucked through a straw. Sometimes they reach a height of 80,000 feet--15 miles or more--helping to form the awe-some cloud always seen after one of these explosions.

Larger radioactive particles spill out over the immediate area of the explosion soon after it occurs. but others-- lighter particles--may be wafted about by the upper breezes for hundreds of miles. Sooner or later they settle earth. This is fall out.

Many people think radioactivity is something new, a product of mod-ern life like the Bikini bathing suit. That isn't true. Radiation experts say the whole world is radioactive, but normal amounts are not dangerous. It is only when radioactivity is present in highly concentrated amounts that it becomes dangerous.

Radioactivity is sometimes highly concentrated in fall out, say the erperts. It can settle anywhere. You can't see, hear, taste, smell or feel it Yet, if you're exposed to it long enough it can be lethl.





A patrolman is credited with sounding the first warning of the awesome San Angelo storm of 1953.

Only four of the state's first-order weather bureau - El Paso, Laredo, Del Rio, and Dallas, are without warning networks.

All stations are connected by teletype and radio. Any station is able to instantly appraise all other stations of a tornado traveling in their direction. When such a warning is given, the weather bureau in the storm's line of approach immediately notifies all communities in the area.




