





For the past several days I have been working with a committee from Texas and with my colleagues here (in Washington) in a special effort to persuade officials to raise the support price on milo from the 70 per cent level, which has been announced, to the 85 per cent of parity level which we had last year.

Many of us have been urging the Secretary of Agriculture over a period of weeks to raise the support level, pointing out that the 70 per cent support would mean disaster to many sorghum producing areas.

Yesterday we conferred with a representative of the President in regard to the matter. This morning at 8 o'clock we had a meeting of the committee with various Members of Congress from the grain sorghum producing states -- Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona. We are to see Secretary Benson at 2:30 today.
