

## Run-Off Election Saturday, June 4

Absentee voting in the June 4 Democratic run-off primary election began on Wednesday of this week and will extend through next Tuesday, May 31.

For state office, there is only one run-off necessary, and that is for Attorney General to succeed Waggoner Carr. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, generally considered a moderate, and Franklin Spears of San Antonio, a liberal, are the candidates.

One county race, for treasurer, must be decided by a run-off, Mrs. Jessie Jewel Stevens and Mrs. Teddie B. Kelley. They were the leaders in a field of five candidates in the first primary.

Also, Dorman L. Gandy and Willis Pennington are in the run-off for Commissioner of Precinct 2 representing the southeast quarter of Lynn county.

In addition, two run-offs are necessary for election of precinct chairmen, all these candidates being by write in. In Voting Precinct 3, O'Donnell, Odetta Saleh and Clyde Winans will be voted upon for precinct chairman; and in Precinct 8, Gordon, J. B. Jones and J. C. Gandy's names appear on that precinct's ballots for chair-

## Judge Smith On Judicial Body

Judge Truett Smith was among the nine members of the new state Judicial Qualifications Commission sworn in Saturday at Austin by Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert of the Texas Supreme Court.

Immediately following the ceremony, the new commission elected Spurgeon E. Bell, chief justice of the First Court of Civil Appeals, Houston, as chairman; Truett Smith, district judge of the 106th Judicial District, Tahoka, as vice chairman; and Fred B. Werkenstein of Austin as secretary.

The commission was authorized by a constitutional amendment by the 59th Legislature to oversee the Texas judicial system. Three members were named by Gov. Connally, two by the State Bar, and four by the Supreme Court.

Mrs. Smith accompanied her husband to Austin for the ceremonies. Judge Smith says the affair was an impressive one since the Justices donned their robes, and a number of attorneys, judges, and others were among the spectators.

## O'Donnell Ladies Seek Highway 87 Intersection Change

The O'Donnell Young Homemakers have been investigating the possibility of a safe intersection on State Highway 87 just north of O'Donnell, adjacent to Jackson's Cafe.

A letter from Governor Connally has been received and also one from Mr. Greer, State highway engineer from Austin. Mr. Greer assured the group the intersection and its possibilities would be investigated and their findings reported to the organization.

## Final Canadian Funds Approved

Congressman George Mahon announced today that the additional sum of \$3,500,000 is being made available for the continued construction of the Canadian River project for the current fiscal year. Congress had appropriated \$17,000,000 last year for the project and the additional funds have been made available as a result of the unanticipated speed of construction which has taken place.

Mahon, who heads the House Appropriations Committee, said that the Budget estimate now before the Committee for continuation of the project next year totals \$14,215,000. This will bring total appropriations for the project to about \$83,000,000 and will substantially complete it. Mahon said he anticipated no serious difficulty in securing approval of the funds requested. When the project was begun several years ago it was anticipated that the total cost would be \$90,000,000, but it is being built for the lesser figure. The project is expected to be in substantial operation by about June 1967.

## Highway Patrol Needs Recruits

Texas Department of Public Safety is desperately in need of 125 new enlistees from 21 to 35 years of age who would draw \$400 per month during a 16 week training period and a starting salary of \$468 per month, plus expenses and uniforms. C. A. Dempsey, district safety officer states.

Any young man interested should contact Patrolmen Marvin Hagens and Ray Priest at Tahoka immediately. June 6th is the final date for accepting applications for the training school beginning August 9. A written examination will be given applicants June 11 in Lubbock to determine fitness for training.

There are many advantages to serving with the State Highway Patrol, Mr. Dempsey says, including job security, opportunity for advancement, salary advances for longevity of service, paid vacations, insurance and sick leave, 12 holidays each year, and retirement benefits. All uniforms and equipment are furnished.

Now is the best opportunity for a young man to get into the work since there are 125 vacancies in the Highway Patrol, 16 in drivers license division, nine in weight and license, and three in vehicle inspection.

Applicants must have high school education or equivalent, be in sound physical condition, have 20-30 vision or correctable by glasses to 20-20, and be of good moral character.

**Ordinance**

REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF O'DONNELL; PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The City Clerk may employ a special office to be known and designated as the Dog Catcher, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance. The City Clerk shall be responsible to the City of O'Donnell for all moneys collected under this ordinance and shall make monthly reports in writing of all money collected under this ordinance to the Council and shall deposit with the city treasurer all money so collected at least once a month.

SECTION 2. All dogs within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian on or before June 1st, and each year thereafter and it is further provided herein that every Veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female, within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee collected by him for same.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Police or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City for that purpose and called the "Dog Pound" and any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, without a tag as provided for under the terms of this ordinance and if such dog, male, or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said pound within the time required under the provisions of this ordinance then the City Clerk shall advertise said dog for sale twenty four hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the City Hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female at public auction and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought

by the city at once and killed by the police or his duly authorized agent.

SECTION 4. (a) The owner and keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the City Clerk, or his duly authorized agent, the sum of \$25 per day or fractional part thereof during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded which sum so paid to him shall by the police be paid over to the City Clerk for deposit with the Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City as well as all other money received by him under the terms of this ordinance.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section within the forty-eight hours then said dog or dogs shall be advertised and sold or killed in the manner provided for in this ordinance. It shall be the duty of the police and duly authorized Dog Catcher to see that the terms of this ordinance are strictly enforced, provided however, that the terms of this ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the City.

SECTION 5. The policemen of this city shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog in the streets which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 6. That any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 7. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.

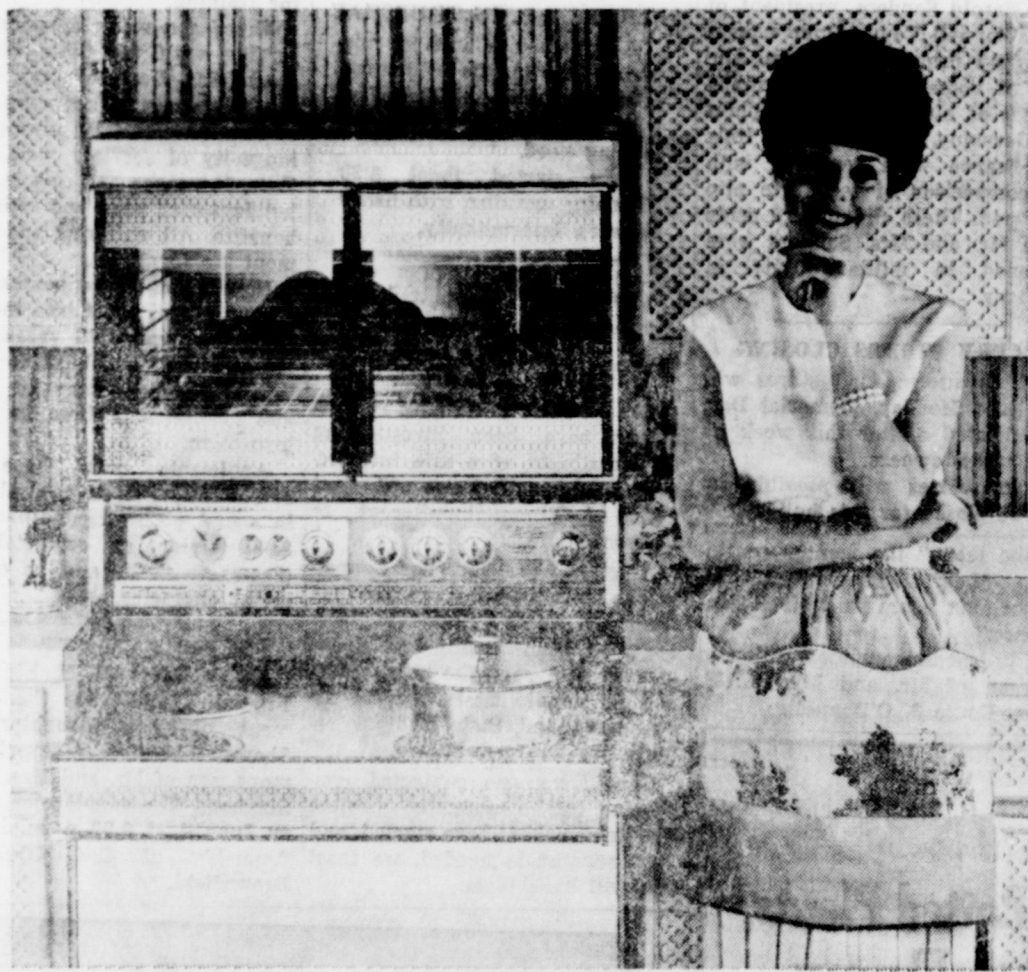

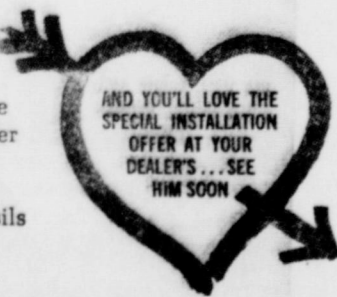

**Palo Duro Sheep, Deer Doing Well**

Canyon — The second Texas Parks and Wildlife Department helicopter count of aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Canyon this year also pinpointed both sheep and mule deer, reports Biologist Phil Evans.

Helicopter observers in the northern portion of the Palo Duro Canyon four weeks ago saw 40 aoudad sheep and 116 mule deer. They also successfully marked ten sheep with paint capsules fired from a CO2 pistol that splashes bright paint on fleeing animals.

The second count totaled 82 aoudad sheep and 64 mule deer in the same census area.

Biologists surmise that a goodly number of aoudads and mule deer

evaded their count attempts since none of the sheep marked with paint last month were seen.

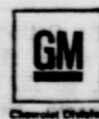
