IMPORTANT NOTICE TO VOTERS

Before you can vote in the Democratic Primary May 7th, 1960, you must do one of the following —

1. If you are required to pay a poll tax (ages 21-60) and have paid it, you must bring your Poll Tax Receipt with you to the poll.
2. If you are required to pay a poll tax, and have paid it, but have LOST or MISPLACED your poll tax receipt, you can still vote, BUT at the poll your name will be checked on the official poll tax, and if it shows you have paid your poll tax, you can then sign an AFFIDAVIT OF LOST POLL TAX RECEIPT at the poll, and then vote.
3. If you are not required to pay a poll tax under the law, then you need not bring anything, BUT at the poll the Election Judge will issue you an EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE, and then you can vote.

Many Wonders At Carlsbad

Would you like to see the famous Kings Palace, the Queens Chamber and the Papoose and Green Lake Rooms in Carlsbad Caverns National Park without making the longer walk-in trip? Then hurry to the National Park in southeastern New Mexico before June. During the non-summer season a special afternoon tour of the four scenic rooms follows the 1:55 P. M. (Mountain Standard Time) tour of the Big Room.

Access to the underground wonderland at the 750 foot level is by elevator service from the spacious new Visitor's Center. Many persons, who saw only the Big Room on a previous trip to the Caverns, are returning for the scenic room tour or for the afternoon photographic tour. All parties now return to the surface by elevator. Four elevators are in use, providing quick efficient service.

The Cavern, recognized as the eighth wonder of the world, is the world's largest and most spectacular.

Carlsbad Caverns National Park is open every day of the year and provides the finest in day-time visitors' facilities, including surface and underground lunchrooms, nursery, kennel, observation tower, museum, and spacious surface lobby.

A "weaver" is a horse that employs a particular weaving motion and whose feet never strike the ground in a straight line when bucking. This motion is most disconcerting to a rider.

A Worm That Stings --

A Megalopye opercularis — for those of you who don't have an entomology textbook handy—is a moth, commonly called "asp" in the larval stage. These brown or grey, semi-crescent shaped larvae may become extremely abundant, feeding on the foliage of a variety of trees and shrubs. They're making their annual appearance in Texas now, and will be noticeable until months of late fall.

Everyone should familiarize themselves with the appearance and medical importance of these stinging caterpillars. Children, in particular, should be warned to avoid them. Individual reaction to the stings varies greatly, dependent upon many factors such as age, sensitivity status, size of caterpillar, area of skin involved, and the amount of pressure on contact.

A mature larva dropping from a tree into a person's shirt or blouse and mashed against the skin in several places before being retrieved would likely cause a much more painful condition than the simple act of brushing an exposed arm or leg against a small specimen.

A burning pain is felt almost immediately on contact. Small, raised, whitish spots appear, later becoming red. The inflamed area may spread for several inches, accompanied by swelling.

The resulting skin reaction frequently lasts for days. Further systemic symptoms may arise of an allergic nature.

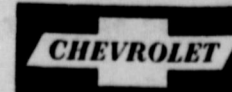

Roberts Makes Formal Statement in District Race



Wesley Roberts of Lamesa, 34-year old State Representative, recently issued this statement to voters in his bid for re-election:

"The 99th District seat in the House of Representatives in Austin belongs to you—the people of Andrews, Dawson, Gaines and Lynn Counties — and to no one else. I have endeavored to serve you well and give you the representation in your State Government that West Texas have a right to demand of that office.

"My past and future is tied to West Texas and its people and I will give my best to see that you continue to get an honest, fair and strong voice in your state government."

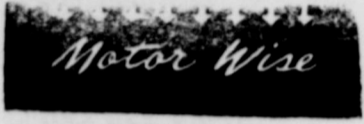
Roberts has served on a number of important legislative committees including Appropriations, Public Affairs, Labor, Insurance, and Gas and, as a strong advocate of economy in state government, was recently appointed as chairman of House Cost of Government Investigating Committee, charged to find ways to eliminate waste and extravagance in our state government. Roberts estimates this group has already found where the tax payers can be saved several million dollars and will make recommendations for the next legislature concerning waste, extravagance and duplication of services in some state departments. Some state officials are expecting a \$300 million tax bill in the next session, and Roberts experience during the past session on the revenue and tax committee should strengthen West Texas' representation in seeing that any tax passed should not be unfair to West Texas. Roberts was author of HB 11,

the bill that finally settled the 7-month deadlock in the past session.

A vote for Roberts is also a vote for—a lifelong Democrat, a native Plainsman and Baylor University graduate, a West Texas business man, a proven proponent of conservation of soil and water, and an active worker on juvenile problems a supporter of the Hale-Akin educational recommendations, amendments in auto insurance merit rating plan for equitable treatment for all, and work toward some solution of the short oil allowable.

Roberts married Joan Vining of Seminole in 1949, and the couple has one son, Wesley, Jr., 1-year-old. Roberts has a BBA degree from Baylor and graduated from Andrews High School. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II. During his tenure in office Roberts has been cited by State Vocational Agriculture Teachers and Dawson County Farm Bureau for his work in the interest of agricultural legislation, and by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for his work in women's rights in Texas.

New Drug Causes Gain in Calf Weight

Chole Hereford steer calves implanted with 12 milligrams of stilbestrol when approximately three months of age averaged 19 pounds more per steer at weaning time than their non-implanted mates. Too, A. A. Melton, animal husbandman, at the Trans-Pecos Experiment Station, Balmorhea, said the implanted calves had an advantage in condition which was reflected in a slightly higher grade.
 Forty-one choice Hereford steer calves were implanted and the same number not implanted in the test. The implanted calves weighed 521 pounds per head at weaning time, about October 1, 1959, compared with 502 pounds for those not receiving the implant of 12 milligrams of stilbestrol, Melton said.
 In continuing the comparison, one group implanted as suckling calves was reimplanted with 24 milligrams of stilbestrol on November 19. This group showed a daily gain of 1.12 pounds from November 19, 1959 to February 24, 1960. Another group, first implanted in November, had a gain of 1.16 pounds daily. The group implanted only as suckling calves in May had a daily gain of 1.09 pound and those not implanted at any time gained 1.03 pounds daily, Melton said.
 The steers will be placed in drylot for fattening about May 1 and implants again used to provide comparisons between 3.2, 1 and no

implants, respectively. The steers are expected to reach slaughter weights by August or September. Melton added that presently stockmen are cautioned to allow at least 100 days between implantation and the sale of the steers for slaughter.

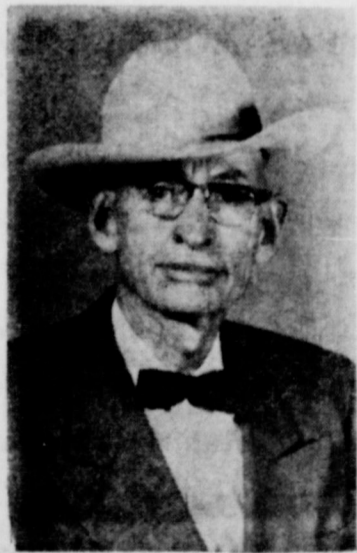
