## Borden Co. Lets School Contact

Contracts totaling \$187,992 were awarded at Gall last week for the construction of three new elementary school buildings for the recently organized Borden County Rural High School District. Awarded the contract on a low bid of \$152,538 for the general construction work of the new building was the MarLang Construction Co of Sherman. Lucian Webb Plumbing and Heating of Abilene got the plumbing and heating contract on a bid of \$26,879 and Fagan Electric Co of Abilene got the electrical contract on a \$8,575 bid. The 3 new buildings will be located at Glenn Creek, 25 miles south west of Gall at the old Murphy school, location in the southeast corner of the county and at a new location to be called Plains south east of O'Donnell. The Plains and Murphy schools each will have 3 classrooms and an auditorium and cafeteria while the Glenn Creek school will have only two rooms. All buildings will be of brick and tile construction with built up roofs, radiant heating and asphalt tile floors. The five common school districts in Borden county, Gall, Glenn Creek, Mesquite, Berry Flat and Union consolidated last June into the new rural high school district which will teach 12 grades for the first time next year. Plains will be located on land of the Burrus estate about midway between the present Berry Flat and Mesquite schools.

## Electric Hoist



A new all-purpose electric hoist, designed to take the "back-breaking" strain out of lifting jobs on the farm, was put on the market recently. The unit includes an electric motor, trolley, cable and the necessary hooks to fit any make of litter or feed carriers. It will travel on any size or type of track and negotiates curves without difficulty. Farmers who might be interested in the equipment should inquire at their local dealers. It is manufactured by the Finchbaugh company of York, Pa.

## New Control for Soil Insects Is Announced

A new control for soil insects which damage vegetable crops now is available. An ingenious manufacturer is packaging ethylene dibromide, a highly effective soil fumigant, in heavy gelatin capsules. The capsules, big as old-fashioned horse pills, are pressed into the soil at intervals throughout the garden. Soil moisture dissolves them, releasing the gas in a few hours with no danger to the user.

Chlorate based defoliants gave the best results for total cotton defoliation in tests conducted last year by the Texas Agricultural Experiment station at Lubbock. Other tests indicate that at least 30 gallons of the spray solution per acre were necessary to eliminate dry burn.

Farmers who have supplies of small grain seed suitable for planting purposes are urged to save them. Supplies of such seed in many areas are short.

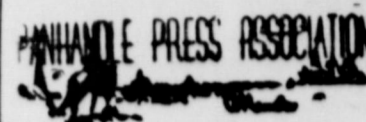

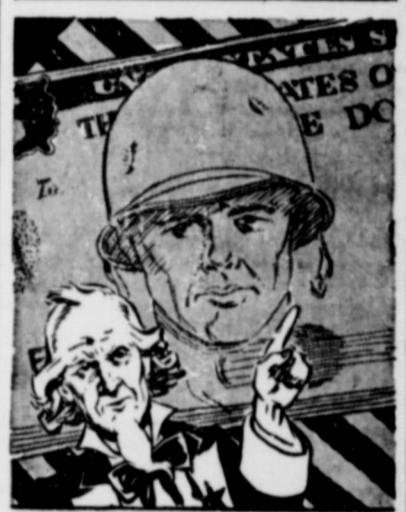

It takes an average of 44 tons of steel pipe for each oil well drilled in the nation. This does not count drill pipe or pipe lines but only the tubing and casing of the well. For the industry to drill 44,000 wells this year, almost two million tons of pipe will be needed.

**Poultry Experts Advise Weeding Out Cockerels**

All cockerels, except those to be kept for breeders, should be removed from the pullet flock by the time they are 12 weeks of age, poultry experts report.

If the cockerels are marketed at 12 weeks of age they will command a better price than if they are kept longer. If kept longer their meat becomes coarse and stringy. The rate of gain per pound of feed decreases with age and size of birds.

**DDT Is Being Replaced By A New Array of Chemicals**

DDT, miracle insect-killer of a few years ago, is losing ground to a whole new array of chemicals that destroy biting parasites of livestock and pets, the American Veterinary Medical Association journal reports. Shortcoming of DDT created a need for new insecticides in livestock and farming, and the need is being filled with methoxychlor, lindane, and chlordan. Farmers should be instructed on their use.

Modern kitchen designers generally aim at just two doors for the room: one to the interior and the other to the outside with both, if possible, at the same end of the room.

Live oak disease continues to be a problem in some areas of the state where the live oaks grow. When the trees become infected, severe pruning of the diseased limbs or branches or of the entire tree is recommended.

75 per cent of the breeder turkeys marketed in Texas during the spring of 1950 were grade A in quality.

Scarce feed items in the winter livestock ration are abundant in small grains. Now is the time to plant the supplemental small grain pastures.

**Farm Safety Urged**

In the race for food production, farmers should not neglect a vital cultivating operation: the cultivation of safe habits in the use of power machinery.

Farmers are using more and more petroleum power and a record number of tractors; manpower shortages are placing more power machinery than normally in inexperienced hands, and even experienced hands and even experienced operators are working under pressures conducive to carelessness. In a typical year, tractor accidents kill 1,540 farmers and injure 50,000 others. Is there any wonder then, that the need for safe habits is greater this year than ever before?

As many as 3 farmers are killed and 150 injured each working day while driving tractors along high ways during growing seasons. To avoid this fate, carry a red warning flag on drawn equipment during daylight hours; at nite use tail lights or at least reflectors. Make sure your brakes are equalized and be careful on highway shoulders where it is easy to tip over. Be extra careful now.

If you want to be kind to children, refuse their pleas to ride with you. One of the main causes of tractor fatalities is extra riders who fall off and are run over.

About half of the tractor fatalities result from accidents in which the vehicle tips over. To avoid this, never gun the motor when stuck in mud or ditch. Don't make a hitch that is higher than the draw bar, and be careful going up slopes with heavy loads.

Inventions and new developments of American oil scientists patented during the last five years totaled 8,179 or an average of 6 for every working day.
