By-laws Given On Club House

(This is a compilation of the tentative rules, regulations and by-laws concerning the proposed Community Club House. The list is made in order that all interested persons may determine for themselves the benefits that may be derived from such a project. These rules are made to serve as a standard and may be added to or revised as the community members feel advised to do so.)
Article No. 1 — Name

The name of the organization shall be the O'DONNELL COMMUNITY CENTER.

Article No. 2 — Object.
The object of the O'Donnell Community Center shall be to provide a meeting place for approved, worthwhile civic, religious and social activities.

Article No. 3 — Officers
The officers of the organization shall be a president, a vice-president and a secretary-treasurer. They shall be elected annually from the board of directors by the board.

Article No. 4 — Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors shall consist of seven members elected by the participating organizations, including one independent member elected by the City Council. No director shall serve longer than one year term in succession. Lots shall be drawn by the first board members to determine the length of their service. Two shall draw one year terms, two shall draw two year terms and three shall draw three year terms. The board shall be representative of all interested areas. A quorum to transact business shall consist of four members.

Article No. 5 — Meetings
The Board of Directors shall meet once each quarter. The first quarter shall begin on the first day of the month following election. There shall be an annual meeting on the fourth Thursday night in January.

Article No. 6 — Restrictions
If all the churches in O'Donnell agree that the Community House is being wrongly used, it will be closed. The Board of Directors shall reserve the right to refuse the use of the building to any group or organization.

Article No. 7 — Maintenance.
Rentals of the building shall provide for maintenance of the Community Center.

Article No. 8 — Parliamentary Authority.
The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern the organization in all cases to which they are applicable.

Article No. 9 — Amendments
These by-laws, with the exception of Article No. 6, may be amended by a two-thirds vote present at the annual meeting, provided the amendment has first been submitted three times in publication before the meeting.

STANDING RULES (Proposed)
— Calendar of Activities
A calendar of activities is to be kept by the Secretary of the Board. Dates may be made by any organization. The hour schedule of meetings and charges are as follows —

Morning 9:00 to 11:30 \$1.50
Noon 11:30 to 1:30 \$1.50
Afternoon 2:00 to 6:00 \$2.50
Night 7:30 to 12:00 \$3.00
If meal is prepared here \$5.00
One 12-hour period \$8.00

The person or persons making reservations are responsible for seeing that the property is left in the same condition as found. These persons are also responsible for the paying of a breakage fee for damages or broken equipment. Linens are to be furnished by the users. The individual picking up the key will be held responsible for all equipment inside the building, this includes everything. The building must be cleaned immediately after using. Clean the kitchen as you would your own home. All equipment must be left in its proper place. When closing, be sure all windows and doors are closed and locked, all fires out, and turn out lights. You must get permission to decorate building.

Deposits
A clean-up deposit of \$5.00 is required for private parties. If the building is left clean, the \$5.00 will be returned. Bring money for rent and deposit when key is picked up. Return key by 10:00 a. m. the following day. A charge of 50c per day will be made for each day you fail to return the key.

Reservations may be made one month in advance. Only one booking ahead will be allowed at a time. Cancellation of Reservation

Country Editor

No one can be blamed for stretching a dollar as far as it will go. However, it is difficult to understand the person who spends two dollars to stretch one.

Every community has a sizable number of penny-conscious shoppers who will travel from twenty to fifty miles in search of a bargain. Such buying is usually unwise and wasteful. The cost of the trip is likely to run higher than any fancied savings. Also, a careful check of local stores would often reveal that a better price could be obtained here at home.

We can not question the loyalty or good intentions of local citizens who rush off to larger cities to make major purchases. They believe that they are practicing sound economics. And they may have some reason for their actions.

For, quite often our local people know more about the goods available in the metropolitan stores than they do about the goods in the stores here at home because of the extensive advertising originating in the larger trade centers.

Retail advertising from larger cities is constantly coming into every community in the form of catalogs, circulars and in regional newspapers. When local merchants do not counter the out-of-town advertising, it is natural for some shoppers to believe that the goods and services they seek can not be obtained locally.

Despite the aggressiveness of distant competition, the local merchant has a distinct advertising advantage — the local newspaper. No advertising medium used by non-local retailers covers our trade area so thoroughly and at such low cost as your local newspaper.

Thus, before the local retailer becomes too critical of out-of-town shopping, he should ask himself if he has given his potential customers enough shopping information to keep them at home.

Locally the fall Saturday night and Sunday morning measured 1.95 inches and lightning Saturday night started a small fire in J. F. White, Sr. chicken house and damaged a few T. V. sets and appliances. The rain was up to 1 inch over the western and northern area and as much as 2 inches to the south and east.

Cotton has been blooming and fruiting for several weeks and many dry land farms look like irrigated cotton. The first bale should be on the square within a week.

Most rental property is filled and business firms are being geared for a frantic fall rush.

"Death Curve" Takes More Lives This Year

At about 8 p. m. Sunday night three men died in a terrific head-on crash three miles north of town on highway 87. To date six men have died this year on this mild curve which is deadly deceptive especially at high speed and at night by tending to guide south bound cars to the east lane by optical illusion.

The dead are Oscar Burns Williams, 74, Kress, Oscar Ortiz, 39, O'Donnell and Milan Willard Crump, 41, believed to be a resident of either Big Spring or Wichita Falls.

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NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds.' Such bonds shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms, as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of adding or making funds available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized or authorized to be created by this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storage and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and helpful purposes for the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available for the Texas Water Development Fund, and for the payment of principal and interest thereon, from the sinking fund established by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the existing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds prior to December 31, 1952; moneys received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water Development Fund and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal or interest on such bonds shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General and registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their antedating nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

Mammoth Black Bear Scares Mountain Folk

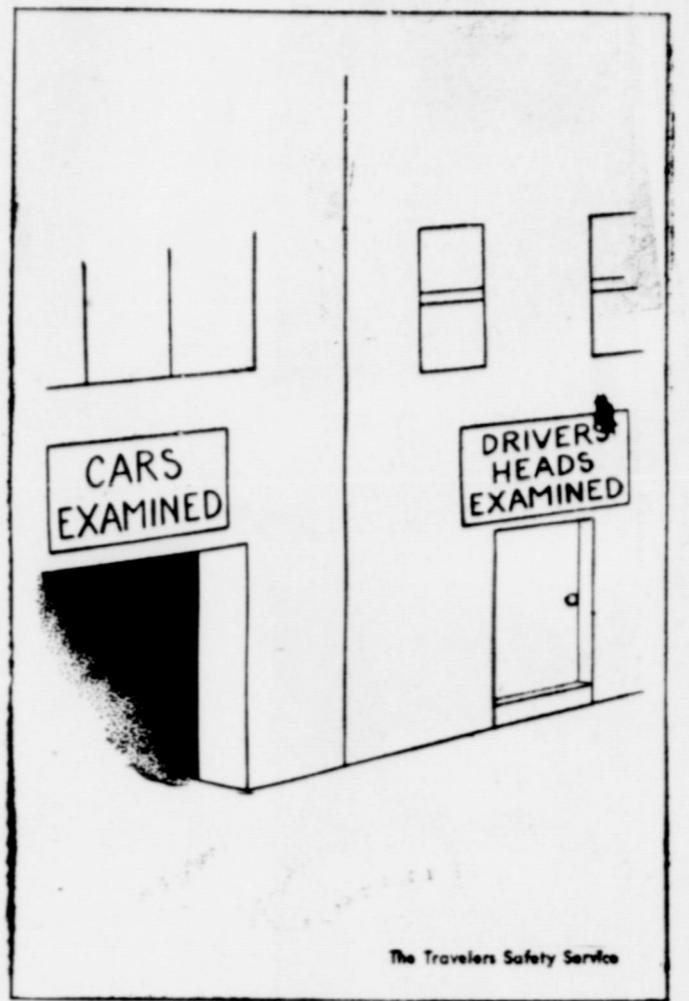

Feet Care Is Told

Summer-time is barefoot-time. One of the joys of summer vacations for small boys — and small girls too — is to be able to go about their business sans shoes.

What adult can say that he found no pleasure in mud oozing between his toes or the coarse grass tickling his feet?

However, shoes are basically a protective item of clothing, and when they are not worn, the protection is removed. For this reason each summer the incidence of foot injuries to children goes up.

These injuries are varied, but usually they are abrasions, cuts or punctures.

Prompt action and a hurried trip to the doctor or first aid kit is usually all that is required to set things right.

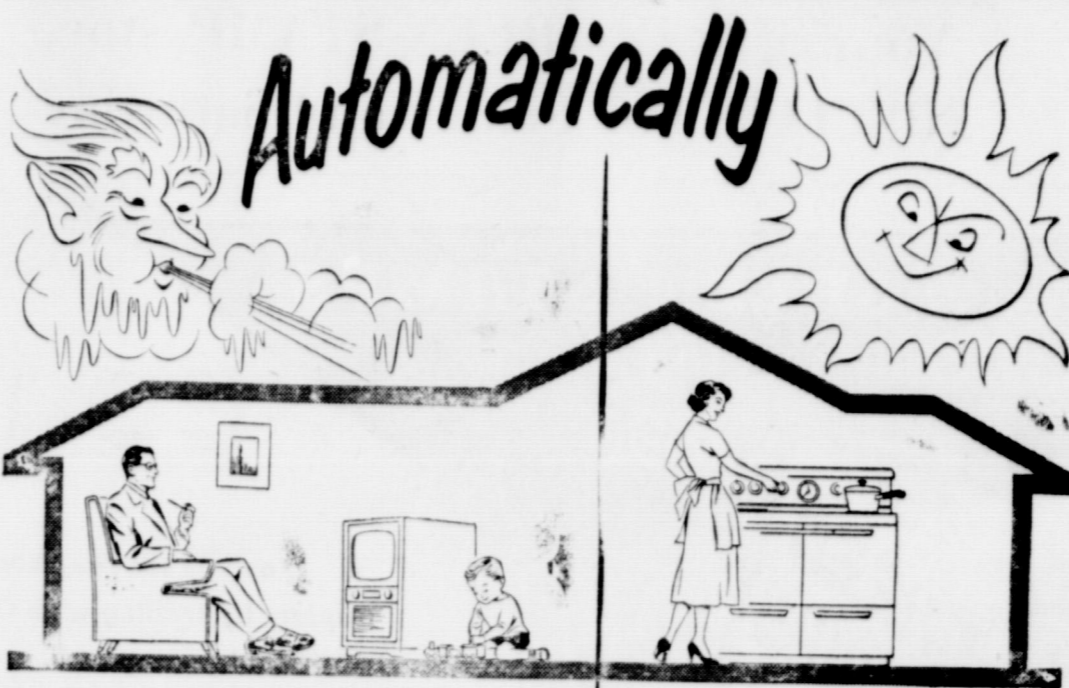
Lockjaw is an acute disease of the nervous system caused by poisons from wounds infected with tetanus bacteria. These organisms, Clostridium tetani, are found in the soil, especially in the feces of domesticated animals.

Contrary to popular belief, tetanus is not restricted to farm areas. Any domesticated animal, including cats and dogs, are capable of carrying the organisms.

The tetanus bacteria cannot survive well in open air, but thrive in closed wounds, which they enter through breaks in the skin, establishing themselves in dirty wounds resulting from all sorts of accidents from highway accidents to the most trivial penetrating wound.

The incubation period ranges from two to 50 days after contact with the germ. The first signs are often stiffness in the neck and jaw, sometimes preceded by chills, fever and stiffness of the muscles near the original wound.

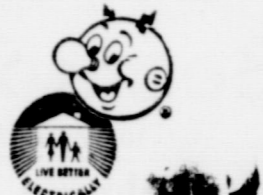

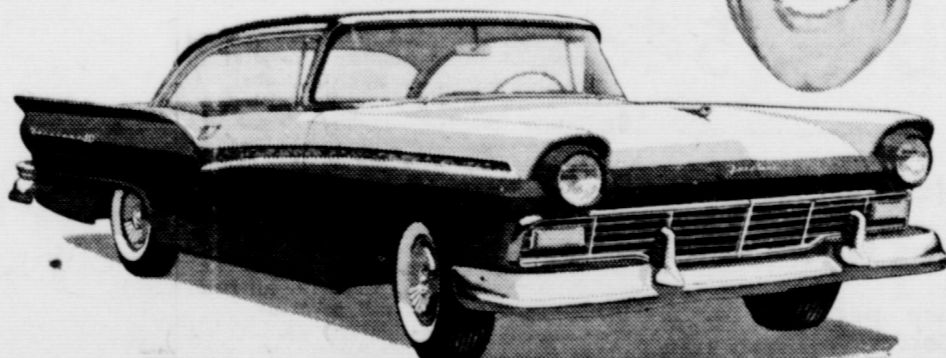

CAR WRECK — Continued from page 1

Ortiz and Crump were killed when their cars collided about three miles north of O'Donnell at 8 p.m. Sunday. In addition, Mrs. Ortiz and three children were injured in the mishap. The cars met head-on while rounding a curve on two-lane U.S. Highway 87, according to the investigating officer.

Ortiz was heading south toward O'Donnell while Crump was riding alone going north. Ortiz's car overturned once after the impact but landed on its wheels. Ortiz was pinned momentarily in the wreckage of his car, the officer said.

The bodies of the men were taken to the Stanley Funeral Home in Lubbock where efforts were being made late Sunday to contact relatives. Crump's survivors were not known and the survivors of Ortiz, other than his wife and three children, also were not available.

Mrs. Ortiz and her children were rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where a girl, Osona, 4, was in critical condition with multiple fractures. A boy, Oscar Jr., 6, received lacerations and abrasions while Mrs. Ortiz and another daughter, Jessie, 13 months, were held for observation.
