Deputy Is Released On Heavy Bond

At the close of the examining trial of deputy sheriff John Johnson, charged with the murder of Bunk Best, which was held in the court of Justice of the Peace A. B. Cooper at Lamesa last Thursday morning, the officer was released on a bond of \$7,500 on this charge, and on a bond of \$2,000 on a charge of assault to murder Grady Best.

At least seventy-five citizens of this county were in Lamesa previous to the trial and to offer themselves as bondsmen, it is estimated, Sheriff B. L. Parker stated immediately after the trial that Mr. Johnson will continue to hold his office as deputy.

It is not the aim nor the business of this paper to censure or criticize—we can only express our sorrow that such a tragic situation should have arisen. And it is a tragedy for every family in any wise connected with the principals in the case.

Evidence brought out in the justice court was that Dalton Barnhart, a neighbor of the Best family, came to O'Donnell Wednesday morning and asked Mr. Johnson to assist him in finding a calf, which he believed was in the possession of one of the Bests.

The officer explained that the calf was his territory and he had consented to take Barnhart to Lamesa to file a complaint with Sheriff G. White of Dawson county. On the highway north of Lamesa they met Grady and Bunk Best, Hazel Johnson and Lee Davis in a car coming north. Statement was made that the Best car passed the officer's car, then turned and followed it until it was overtaken. Both cars stopped and the two Best boys came to Johnson's car to talk to Barnhart.

Heated words arose, and one of them attempted to drag Barnhart from the car. Mr. Johnson asked and ordered that the struggle cease and in the ensuing scuffle believed that Bunk Best was drawing a gun from inside his shirt. The officer fired two shots the first one being the one which killed Bunk Best and the second wounding Grady.

Mr. Johnson asked Mr. Hancock to take the wounded men into Lamesa to the hospital, and himself went immediately to the office of Sheriff W. R. Burnett, to the office of Sheriff Parker was in O'Donnell at the time, and went to Lamesa immediately after being notified of the trouble.

Funeral services for Bunk Best were held Thursday afternoon at Hancock in the presence of one of the largest assemblies ever congregated in this part of the country. Interment was made in the cemetery there.

He is survived by his widow and four children, his father, and other members of the family. Again the Index can only extend sympathy to everyone connected with the sad affair.
