S. S. News — The social security district office has had far more inquiries than usual these past few weeks. John G. Hutton, manager, reported, A good many calls are from people who are receiving monthly retirement, disability or survivor checks now and who are concerned about getting the increase that was authorized by Congress and the President recently.

Mr. Hutton reminds all social security beneficiaries that the increase in monthly benefits will come to them automatically; they do not have to phone, write, or visit the social security office to request or file any kind of application for the increase.

The checks for January of 1959, which will be mailed out on the first of February, will include the full increase the law provides, an average jump of about seven percent, he said. In dollars this means 65 year-old workers will receive from \$3.00 to 7.50 more, depending upon the amount of their present benefits. Where total family payments reach \$254.00, individual benefits other than that paid to the worker may show a lesser percentage increase Mr. Hutton concluded.

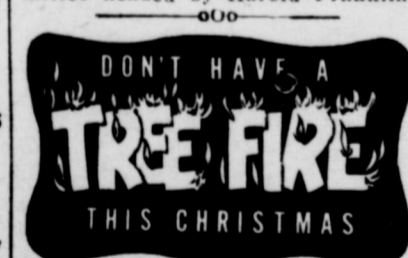

EVERY AVERAGE American home will have a Christmas tree this year. Traditional and symbolic as the trees are, they present a great fire hazard, and should be carefully watched.

Remember that when you bring a tree into the house it is going to dry up. A freshly-cut tree will not take fire any easier than the evergreen trees growing outside, but the hazard increases by the hour. For this reason, it is not wise to put up the tree too early before Christmas day or to leave it too long after the 25th. Trees of all kind will become highly inflammable at the end of a week.

Families, clubs, churches or organizations that wish to keep their trees up longer than a week should take special safeguards to keep it reasonably safe.

The tree can be kept fresh by setting it up in a pan of water. Cut off the base of the tree at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it standing in water during the entire period it remains in the house. It may be necessary to add water from time to time to keep the water level above the cut.

Place the tree well away from stoves, radiators, and other sources of heat. When you smoke, stay away from the tree. Also be sure that the tree is secured in such a way that it cannot fall. Do not put it near a doorway where it might block an avenue of escape, should a fire occur.

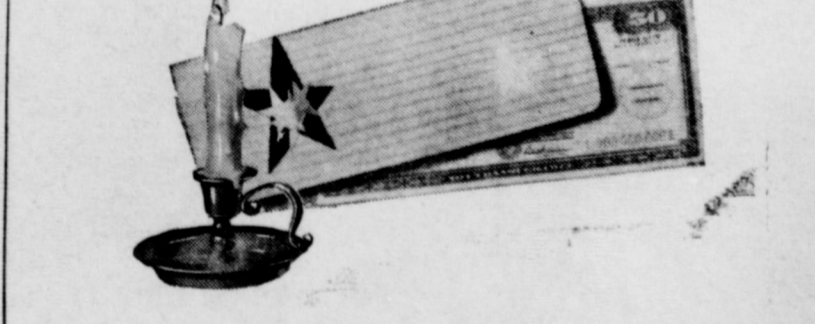

Home Lighting Is Important

Every home needs well lighted, useful places to study and read. A desk lamp properly placed is in preventing eye strain and reducing fatigue, according to home furnishings specialists.

Table lamp, wall model, or even a pair of wall lamps can do the job. An important thing is to be sure the lamp is equipped with a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade or with a wide harp to accommodate an indirect type bulb. These types of under-shade lighting give a combination of upward and downward light that eases the eye-irritating difference in brightness between the desk and the rest of the room. The light of the lamp from the desk is important, too. A lamp that gives such a small amount of light that part of the desk is usually dark. A lamp that is too bright places the bottom of the shade at eye level with a resulting glare that is uncomfortable. People find that a height of 18 inches between desk top and bottom of the lamp shade is most satisfactory.

Another important factor is placement of the lamp on the desk. It should be placed on the side of the desk opposite the writing hand. If two lamps are used, such as two desk lamps, mount them with the shades about 30 inches apart.

For the amount of light—150 watts is the minimum recommended for a wall or table lamp while a desk lamp should have a minimum of 100 watts each. Ideally, a light-colored desk with a light finish is the most comfortable when working under a lamp. If a surface is not available, a colored desk blotter will help.

Q—I plan to sell my house, let the buyer take over my loan, and get release of liability from VA. My wife also signed the note. Will she be released from liability to the Government, if I am?

A—Yes. You understand, of course, that to get a release from VA, the purchaser must agree in writing to purchase your property and assume your unpaid liability. He must also satisfy the VA he is a good credit risk.

Q—I gave up my VA pension a while ago and chose to receive compensation instead, in order not to have my social security disability payments reduced. My pension is larger than the compensation payments, and I understand that now,

by new law, I can collect both the pension and full social security disability benefits. Is this so?

A—Yes. A veteran entitled to both compensation and VA pension, who waived pension and chose compensation to avoid deduction from social security disability payments, may now rescind that waiver. The new law you mention allows receipt of both full social security disability payments and VA pension.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I have a daughter in college who is receiving death compensation payments from VA. She soon will reach her 21st birthday, but she will still be in school. Will it be possible for the VA payments to continue?

A—No. Under the law, compensation payments made to the child of a deceased veteran while she is in school may not be continued after she passes her 21st birthday.

Q—in the past, VA has been deducting my GI insurance premiums from my monthly disability compensation checks. Now my compensation has been reduced, and the amount I get each month is no longer large enough to cover my premiums. Will VA continue deductions, and let me send in the balance? Or what should I do?

A—Since your compensation has been reduced so that it no longer covers your premiums, the deduct-
