Rites Are Read For Cleon Eason, Jr. Here

Cleon Eason, Jr., age 20, born and reared here, was killed in a car-truck crash early last Tuesday morning on highway 59 about 30 miles east of Laredo. Cleon was stationed at Beeville with the U. S. Navy and was enroute back to his base after a trip to Laredo. The car he was driving was in a collision with a truck transporting high explosives however there was no explosion.

Two passengers, Jack Martin and Tracy Slink, all from Chase Naval Air Station at Beeville, are in a critical condition in the base hospital.

Cleon obtained his high school diploma in the Navy. He was born in O. K. community near here on May 17, 1937. He attended O'Donnell schools and high school and entered the Navy three years ago at age 17. He had recently returned from a two year tour of duty on Hawaii.

The body was sent by rail to Post from Laredo by Naval escort.

A full military funeral was conducted Friday afternoon at 3 p. m. at the O'Donnell Baptist Church with services conducted by Rev. Lewis Cobb of Lubbock. Burial followed in O'Donnell cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. Navy personnel were pallbearers.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cleon Eason of here, his wife, Mrs. Delores Eason, two sisters Mrs. Harold Hall of here, Mrs. Bobby McGlaun of Tahoka and his grandmother, Mrs. W. W. Williams.

Cleon had many friends here and was well-liked by all. Our sympathy to the loved ones.

S. S. Man Here 19th

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be in O'Donnell on June 19th at 3 p. m. at the Elementary School and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security. More than 100,000 severely disabled people in communities all over the nation will receive their first S. S. disability insurance checks in August. But many other eligible disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age, some of them living in Texas, have so far failed to make application to their S. S. offices. Those who have been disabled for work for a long time must apply before June 30th or they will lose their rights to these new benefits.

Any severely disabled person who has worked under social security for at least 5 years and who has been disabled for 6 months or more should get in contact with his S. S. office right away. If he is between 50 and 65 years of age, he may be eligible to have his S. S. record frozen to protect his future right to disability payments and also his and his family's rights to old age and survivors insurance benefits.

To be disabled under S. S. law a worker must be unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity. It must be the kind of physical or mental condition which shows up in medical evidence and must have lasted for at least six months.

TEXAS VOTERS WILL DECIDE FATE OF 12 AMENDMENTS

A record total of 12 proposed constitutional amendments were submitted by the 55th Legislature for a vote of the people. The Legislature which ended Thursday of last week set four measures for a vote next Nov. 5th and eight others will come before the people at the general election on Nov. 4th, 1958. Key proposals include annual sessions of the legislature and \$7,500 a year pay for lawmakers, a 200 million dollar water conservation plan and an increase in the monthly maximum for old age pensions.

MAGNETO CENTER Town of 4,700 Makes Vital Airplane Parts

SIDNEY, N.Y.—An electronic airplane instrument made in the community of 4,700 population, bringing aviation officials from all over the world. So widespread is interest in the instrument—used on airplanes in pinpoint trouble anywhere in the ignition system—that 167 officials representing 43 domestic and foreign airlines plus builders of planes and engines, recently came to watch the electronic units being manufactured here by the scientific magneto division of Bendix Aviation corporation.

Take Over Hotel
Because Sidney has but one small hotel, a nearby resort was taken over in its entirety for the record number of visitors, who conferred for three days on the role of the Sidney-built device in aviation safety and reliability.

In addition to the principal U.S. airlines, such foreign operators as Trans-Canada Airlines, Air France, KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, Sabena Belgian Airlines and Lancaerpostal Venezolana participated in the conference and plant tour.

Ralph S. Damon, president of Trans World Airlines, Inc., said at the meeting that the instrument, called an ignition analyzer, is making a major contribution to aviation safety, which has increased 50-fold in 15 years and is expected soon to topple the safety records of any other form of mass transportation.

The analyzer, slated for application to passenger cars, trucks, tractors and other automotive vehicles as well as aviation, uses a cathode-ray tube like the "big tube" in TV sets to show engine performance in various electrical wave patterns. It will, for example, quickly locate a poor sparking among the 224 carried by some of the larger multi-engine planes.

Began in Garage
Sidney, builds magnetos and jet igniters for the aircraft industry as well as additional ignition and electrical equipment for automotive and industrial engines. Described in a national magazine article as "The Village We Can't Do Without," the community was the source of most of the military units for World War II military planes, tanks and PT boats.

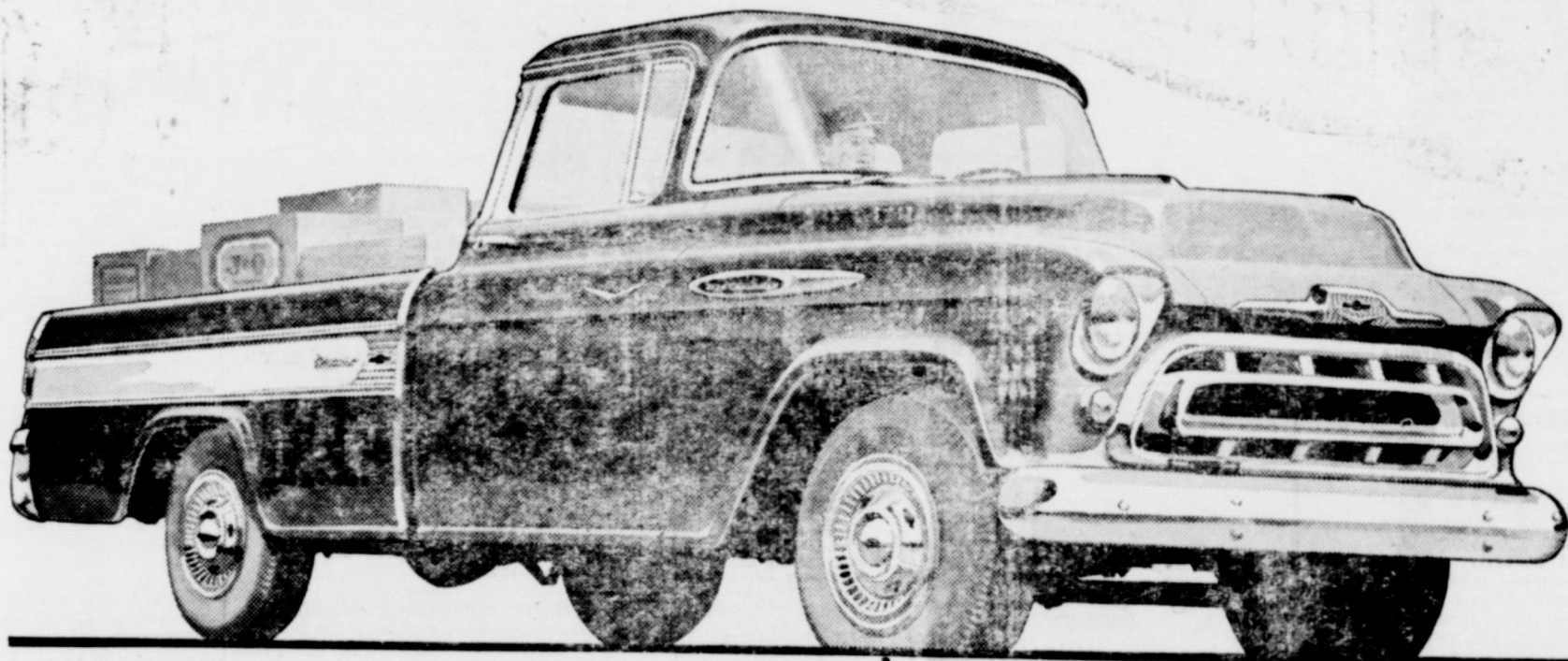

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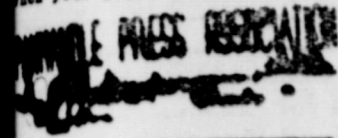

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Magistrate Sentences Man to 10 Whip Lashes

FREDERICK, Md.—Magistrate Wilbur F. Sheffield, Jr., has become a celebrity since he sentenced a man to 10 lashes for wife-beating. Mr. Sheffield has been deluged with fan mail.

The letters have come from all over the country and there is even one from Spain.

"Your decision will serve as a lesson," said one.

"Would a wife have gotten the same sentence?" challenged Dr. C. R. Wilber of the Bronx, N.Y., president of the National Sociological League.

"The whipping post, used over the nation, would reduce crime," said another.

"Lashes are for the middle ages," said another.

A group of Robbins, Calif., housewives prescribed 40-lashes—the legal maximum under Maryland's old whipping post laws—plus 40 kicks in the stomach.

Shuffling through the file, Magistrate Sheffield said he would stick by the sentence imposed August 6 on Marshall M. Flanary, 43-year-old carpenter from nearby Greenfield, who was convicted of beating his wife.

Only one thing is holding up the lashes now. Magistrate Sheffield ordered a mental examination for Flanary. Unless the doctors find Flanary insane and commit him to an institution, Magistrate Sheffield will sign another order for execution of the sentence. Flanary could have appealed, but he didn't.

Prospects now are for a good grain sorghum harvest in Texas this year. Harvest will be later than normal in many areas because of delayed plantings due to the weather but conditions warrant the optimistic outlook. Farmers are urged to line up their storage needs early and if on the farm storage must be provided that it be made really well in advance of harvest.

Besides the inheritance tax, Lassie will also have to pay income tax annually on any income the inheritance draws.

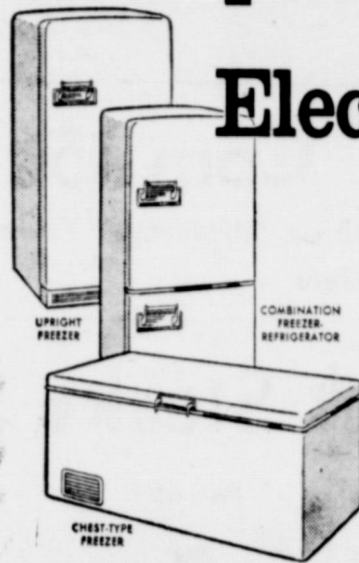
Mrs. Hanson will turn the matter over to Lassie's lawyers.

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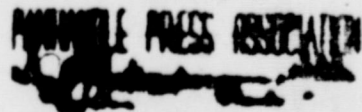
