Facts Given On Little League Over Nation

"Little League reaches the traditional age of maturity this year. "It has been 21 years since a group of neighbors got together in the north-central section of Pennsylvania and formed the first 'Little League'.

This year, about a million boys in some 5,500 leagues in all 50 states and nearly 20 foreign countries will participate.

That doesn't include the thousands of adult males who will give up their spring and summer evenings to run these leagues. Nor the legions of mothers washing the spring mud out of son's—and husbands'—practice clothes.

In 21 years, the program has had its 'growing pains,' analogous to its boys.

In the first nine years, the original league grew to 15 leagues, 14 in Pennsylvania and one in Mammonton, N. J.

In 1948, a commercial sponsor took over and gave Little League its first big impetus.

That year, 94 leagues were organized in six states; the following year there were 197 leagues in 12 states, Canada and Latin America.

By the time the last state — South Dakota — joined the program in 1955 there were 3,580 leagues in the United States, 107 in Canada, seven in Germany, two in Guam, four in the Panama Canal Zone and one each in England, France, Cuba and Venezuela.

Altogether the Little League has made remarkable growth.

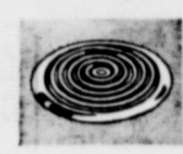

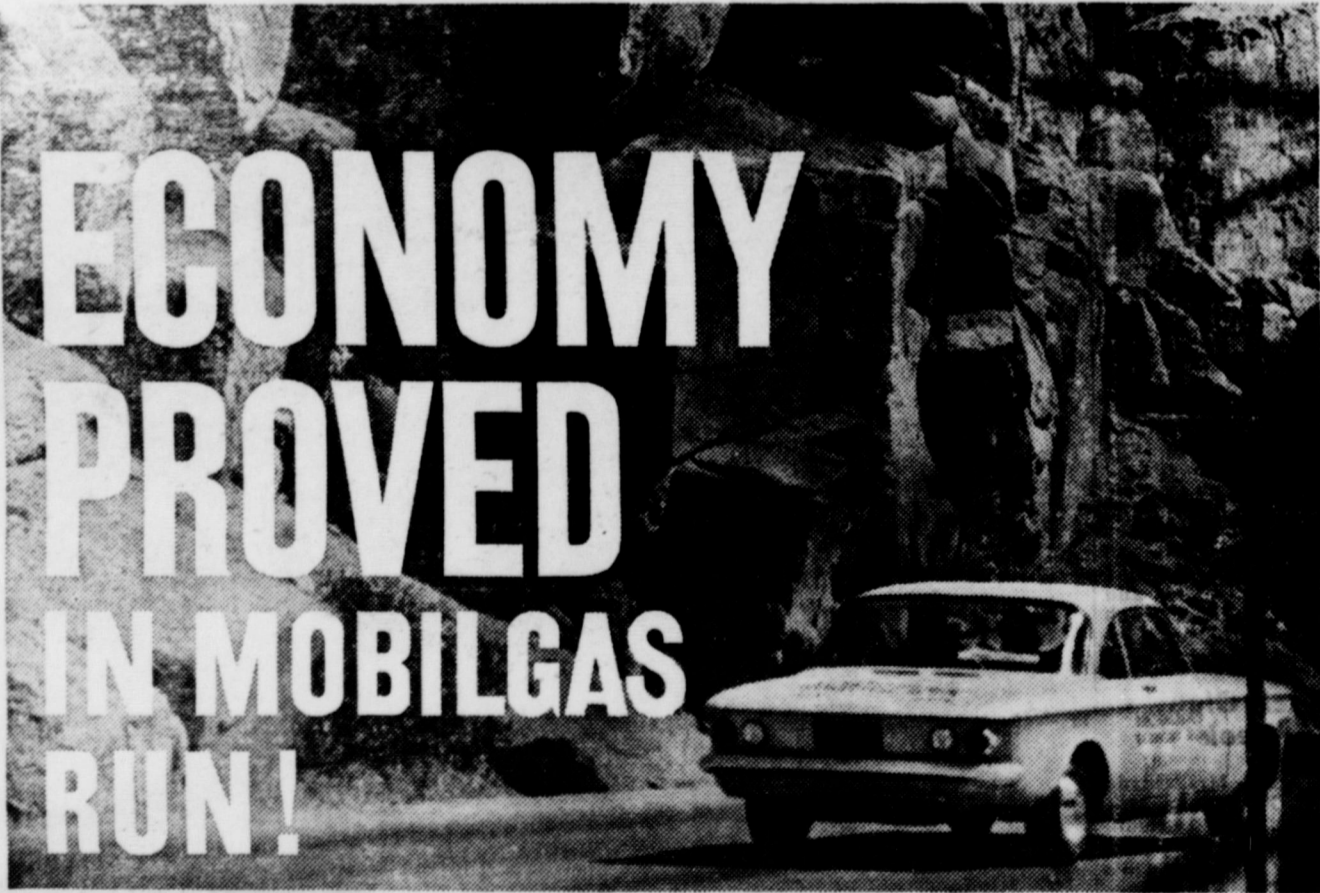

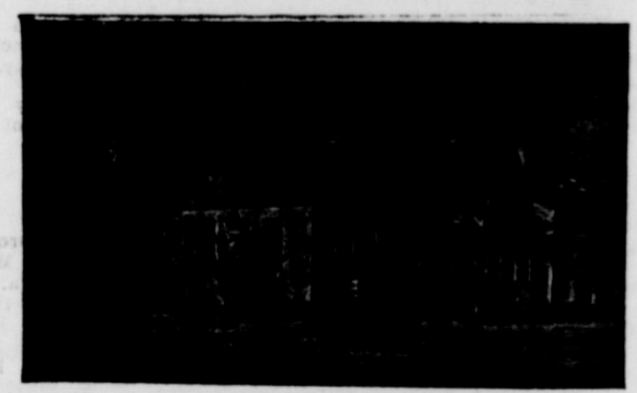

Free Speech Issue - In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court." State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

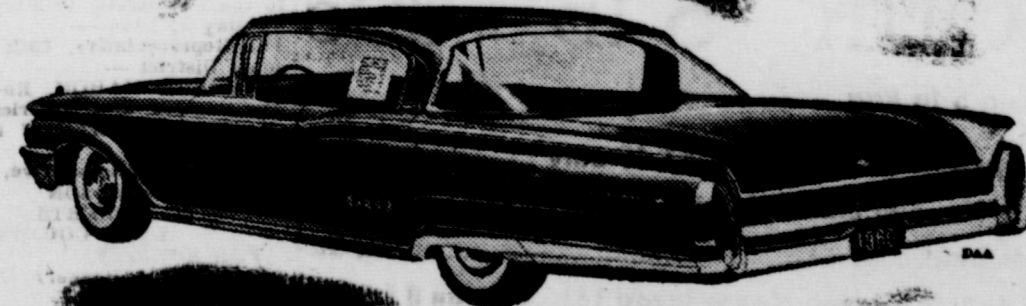
