

Worms Are Current Problem

TOWN MAY GIN OVER 20,000 BALES

A welcomed thunder shower early Sunday afternoon riding into this area from the west netted 1 and 1-2 inches of moisture in town to put the 1957 cotton crop "in the bag" for a near record crop. Even greater benefit was that to the late feed. The fall was as much as 3 inches in the Grandview, New Moore and Wells triangle, but the fall was not much more than a shower in the far eastern part of area. Cotton is generally as good as 1949 and the town may gin as much as 22, 000 bales with area gins taking an additional 15, 000 to 17,000 bales. Crops are so good the farmers are

'knocking on wood'.
The cotton leaf worm is in dangerous infestation in some fields and spraying and dusting by mach-ine and plane is in effect this week as has been since early last month. Another three weeks will see the crop out of danger of worms.

A late freeze, say mid-November, will assure a record-breaking crop.

PLAN TO RETIRE?

If you intend to retire this month and flie a ciaim at the Social Security District Office for retirement benefits, you should bring the W-2 which you received from your employer, or a copy of your 1956 income tax return, according to John G. Hutton, manager of that office.

G. Hutton, manager of that office. The W-2 can be used to verify your 1956 earnings if you worked for someone else. The income tax return plus a carefully completed Schedule C, Profit or Loss from Business, is essential if you are in business for yourself in 1956. Cancelled check or other evidence of payment of the Social Security tax should also be available if you were self employed in 1956.

Mr. Hutton says that his office, like all other Social Security offices is having an exceptionally high in-take of claims since the first of the year, and some delays will be un-avoidable. However if claimants will come prepared with the proof of earnings described above. the record volumn of work can be pro-ceased more rapidly.

Mr. Hutton points out that social security amendments of 1956 which brought new groups under the program, reduced the ment age for women, and provided benefits for the severely disabled worker age 50 to 65. are responsible for the sharp increase in the work in his office.

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

New S. S. Ruling Given

Monthly insurance payments can now be paided to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or a deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration

This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental dis-

'Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18, 'Mr. Hutton says. Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or

Before this new provision went into effect, no family insurance could be paid for a child after he became 18 years of age. Now there is no age limit for a disabled child, "

Applications for these payments should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 2878-34th Street, Lubbock, Texas.

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


