ates. The appropriations have given the ation almost unprecedented oppor The appropriations have given the nation almost unprecedented oppor-tunity to advance the good roads bringing business back to normal. Prices of materials of all kinds are are the lowest in many years, there is an abundance of labor and engi-meering talent, and governments can borrow money at low rates of in-terest

berrow money at low rates of in-terest. A large part of the money is to be used in rural areas where it will give the bigest return for each dol-lor spent. The American farmer has been waging a battle against a varie-ty of circumstances, and a sound "re-life" program is the construction of year-round, farm-to-market roads. It is probably true that lack of ade-quate transportation arteries has done much as anything else to hold agriculture back. We live in a motorized age, in which quick, low-priced transporta-tion is essential to commercial and social activities of all kinds. Only a small part of our millions of miles of roads are surfaced and passable at all times of the year. Wise use of the appropriations will pay high divi-dends.

More generally popular is the "safe re-sponsibility law," now in effect in New York, Connecticut and other states. This law provides that a driv-er, after causing an accident, must provide proof of his financial re-sponsibility before being allowed to again operate a car. Laws of periodical inspection of cars, for controlling nedestrians walking on the highways, and for banishing ancient and dilapidated motor vehicles, have likewise been proposed and will receive due con-sideration.

Every step taken, no matter how small, means that at least a few lives are saved, a few pieces of prop-erty protected. The public is reach-ing a state of mind that gives no en-couragement to those who, through carelesances and incompetence, sow death along the highways.






