

Free Speech Issue . In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.-Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail

The defendants, many of them nembers of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court," State's Attorney Edwin C.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds col lected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeas-

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

To qualify for social security To qualify for social security benefits at retirement, how many work units will you need? "Most people don't know", John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office, said to day. Many don't even know there is such a requirement, while others mistakenly think they can qualify for payments with only a year or two of work.

"Most people will need severa years of credit", Mr. Hutton son nued, "and the chances are, you will too." The exact number you will need depends on when you reach retirement age; 62 for women, 65 for men. People reaching retirement age now need 4 1-2 years of earnings. Younger people will need more. For example, anyone now under age 54 will need 10 years—the maximum. will need depends on when you read

Since payments in the feature depend on your earnings now, it's important that you receive all cedits due. If you work for wages, you should be certain your employer reports them with your correct social security number. If you are self-employed, you should be careful to use your correct social security number on your tax returns. Club Steak lb
