> Many people regard rules of legal procedure as mere tools delay, of concern only to lawers andjuges. Far from this, they are instruments off justice, and of .eal signifisance to all of us. Prosedure is the lubricant which makes the machinery of uniform justice run smoothly.

The law is composed of two parts the substantive and the adjective law. The substantive law def.n.s rights, duties and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights and wrongs; it describes crimes and sets up penarties, reop.e can usu-ally see the value off substantive law. Ajective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invole the substantive law.

Some of our most (mportant rights are found in the body of procedural law. For example, as a people who want justice to prevail, wa like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have his day in cou-This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say perfore a judge and jury.

Your day in court implies that you shall have the right to be properly represented, to have your case presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a cleare cause of action. It mans that you shall be confornted by your accsers; that you shall have the right to cross examin them that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf.

Newly covered workers should make certain that they are receiving credit on their social security accounts. John G. Hutton, m nager of the Social Security office located at Lubbock reminded today.

He was referring especially 10 regularly employed houshold worpers and regularly employed farm workers who re among the groups which were given social security protection by the changes in social security law effective January 1, 1951. Hutton called attention to the fact that there may be some em-ployers of houshold workers or employers of farm workers who are not aware of their reeponsib-ilities under the new law, and who may accrdingly fail to make the necessary social security reports or to pay the social security taxes which would give these worke s the insurance protection int nded by the law.

Much of our procedural law comes down from centuries of expeence in the courts of ofher lands. It was inevitable that through the centuries some of the precedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have exper ienced many advantageos changes in our laws governing the procedur of courts and administrative agen cies. There is a growing custom in the United States of giving th courts the power to revise their rules in certain fields.

Our Texas rules of civil proce dure are made by our state Sup reme Court. The Court is constantl striving, with the recommendat-ions of the practicing lawyer, to improve these rules. The aim of the Supreme Court is to provide a uniform and relativly simple set of rules for dispensing justice with

O. P. S. Cafe Rules Effective

Some 2400 resturants and other eatng and drnkng establishments in the Far West Texas district of the Office of Price Stabilization were reminded today that the new celling price regulation covering their operation becomes effectivee

next Monday, April 7.

District price officiols pointed out that the new regulation (CPR 134) freezes resturant prices at the level shown on menus or charged during the week of February 3 to 9, 1952. It also requires operrators of eating and drinking establishments to post dollars-and cents ceiling prices for their principal meals, food items and beverages.

These frozen prices, with premissible adjustments by operators who have been charged lower than

which restaurants will post. The posted prices may be charged in the future only by the direction of the Office of Price Stabilization. The regulation provides that future adjustments may be made if the OPS determins that food and other costs have changed significantly, either upward or downward.

A series of trade meetings will be held throughout the district by price officials in the next few weeks to acquaint operators of restaurants and other drinking and eating establishments of the detailed provisions of the new regulation. The schedue of meetings will be released as soon as it is available.

Meanwhile, restaurant price officials this week are attending conferences in the regional OPS offices concerning administration of the regulation.

Thee price stabilization agency is now sending out the posters which must be posted. They must be displayed not later than April 25, 1952, bp restaurants in a place where they will be easily visible to customers.

Relax Rules To Obtain Silver Wings

Silver wings the symbol of the Air Force are easier to obtain now than any time since the end of the war.

Relaxing of age and educational requirements has opned aviation cadet training to many persons formerly denied the oppertunity to learn to fly.

Examining precedures for both airmen and civilian applicants have been streamlined. The waiting period between completion of entrance tests and appointments to a class has been lessened considerably.

Now it's even possible to go straight from basic into cadet training-

And certain applicants who failed the cadet qualification tests may re-apply immediately. Lowering of requirements for entry into cadit training is in line with an intensive drive to secure more applicants, both airmen and civilians, for instruction as pilots and observers.

If you're interested in becomin a cadet, you should apply as soon as possible. The present requirements will remain in effect only long enough to build up a sufficient backlog of applicants to fill future aviation cadet class requirements.

You are eligible to apply if you are: a male unmarried United States citizen between the age of 19 and 26 years, with 2, years college training.

You must meet high physical qualifications. Applicants intercants interested in one of the 11 aircraft, observer specialties shoold have an aptness for mathematics in addition to the physical, mental and moral cualifications required of all cadets. Visual requirements for observers are not as high as for pilots.

Airmen with less than two years of college may satisfy the educational requirement for application by producing any document indicating successful completion of high school, institution or a state board of education.

O. P. S. Rules On Farm

Thursday April 10, 1989

The Office of Price Stabilization has moved to bring the agency's ceiling price program for farm commities in line with provisions of the Agricultural Act of 1949, thhe district OPS office today. In one action it authorized

In one action it authorized sales of processed or unprocessed agricultural commities at prices equalling support or purchase or prices in cases where such prices have been announced by the commodity Credit Corporation.

Have Floors Comfortable, Attractive, Colorful

There are many different ways to treat the floors of the bedroom, and these depend on the style in which you do the room as well as considerations of taste and budget. 

Paint Makes A House Stand Out From Others

URBANA - CHAMPAIGN, Ill. -"Color is a powerful force in housing. It is the first thing a person notices and the thing he re-members longest about any object," William S. Pusey, University of Illinois small homes council staff member says.

"In housing, it is color-not root lines or siding material that makes one house stand out from another," he says. Pusey gives the following suggestions:

"A house with a dark, rich body color is usually improved by the use of white trim, especially if the trim and siding are of different materials.

"Too many changes of material and color makes a house look smaller. No one ever bought a house because it looked smaller than it really was.

"A tall house can stand to be broken up by the use of colored panels which cut down the apparent height and improve the proportions of the house.
