learned that my little Jew play were unpredictable in battle and a coward. The little boog, would change battle lines at taking a losing fight. In continuing with the winner Frenchy many years later and some folks don't like too a fight.

one night in the park I made the best of trying to court a girl who was a date of an Oak Cliff girl. I got a royal beating but after my Jew "Cats" thought I been taught a lesson they line up taking the visitor in series, was pitiful what resulted.

I age 19 I went into the old army in '27. I was in the two marines, stationed less than mile from the Mexican border Nogales, Ariz. A Mexican revolution was beginning to brew. In company, the 11th, now a National unit, were many from the line pot of eastern cities — as a boot. After nice mess I tired after being in saddle all these youths would fight in the pany street, blood flowing free the fighters laughing. I have seen a Jew who was a coward wasn't a good street fighter.

on the question "Are Jews God on People?" Perhaps the realer is what the Jew thinks. He got to rip out an oath and call question "an old wives tale". Jew has always from the dawn history been a free man and tend to be a "free thinker" in religion. Modern example was the German Lenin, who wrote the only book on communism.

Gentle may try to excuse his eddest thinking his poor business ment by telling the barroom that Jews are God's Chosen ple. The Jew lives this life with ir keen wit, hard work and rage. Unfortunately O'Donnell not had a Jew since shortly after we moved here. We would have thriving competitive town with a number of Jews.

Although this alarming number is cause for concern, nevertheless the rate of dropout has dropped from 41 percent to 30 percent since 1950. The term dropout doesn't bring pleasant pictures to mind. Many people often associate the colloquial term with juvenile delinquents. Yet the boy or girl who becomes a dropout may be a nice young person — just bewildered, unsure of himself, and his goal in life.

Many youngsters face the decision of whether to leave school or continue before they are old enough or experience enough to decide wisely. The process which leads to a student leaving school is a long one — and it is affected by the student, his family and his school. Youngsters need guidance and encouragement from their families and school officials. Many people must share the blame for a school dropout.

A SPOUSE IN THE HOUSE

The new dividend exclusion feature of the 1964 tax law may give Texas taxpayers a break. If either the husband or wife has excludable dividends they can exclude the first \$200. The four percent dividend credit has been reduced to 2 percent. The average investor will benefit more by having the larger exclusion. The advantage in Texas is due to dividends being considered community income. In non-community property states they could only exclude \$100 for the husband or the wife if the stock was all in the name of one spouse. In Texas it pays to have a spouse in the house.

MR. LINE SAYS MACHINES WILL SORT ZIP MAIL

Postmaster Ode Line said Monday he received word from Postmaster General John Gronouski in Washington, D. C. that a breakthrough has now been made on electronic machines to read ZIP coded addresses on mail. The Postmaster General said he expects to begin installing these new machines in major post offices in about a year. He said that each machine will be able to sort, as well as read at the rate of 35,000 letters an hour.

The offices to get the address readers have not been announced but the local postmaster said they will have significant effect on the mail in and out of each community regardless of whether it gets the new machine.

This is because they will speed incoming mail to smaller offices from major cities and step up the dispatch of mail deposited in smaller communities but which must be processed enroute at major mail points

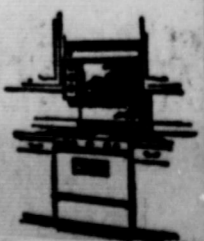

ARMY OFFERS GRADUATE SPECIALIST PROGRAM

Sgt. Mel Baker, local Army recruiter informed the Index that the Army is offering the graduate specialist program again this year to all high school seniors who wish to take advantage of this program. Students who wish to have a guaranteed technical school waiting for them upon their graduation from high school should indicate their desire to pre-qualify on the senior survey cards they will receive thru the mail in the near future. This does not obligate the student to join any branch of service however it would give them the opportunity to obtain information as to the exact school or assignment they are mentally and physically capable of attending in the military service.
