> More than a half million dollars will flow into the county this week and in the immediate future, this sum being that due on cash and option. contracts entered into between the farmers and the United States government. The cash value of the options is still an unknown factor, but at present prices, the farmers stand to make an additional \$20 per bale.

At an early hour Tuesday morning the highway to the county seat was many days, as the lucky farmers and their friends drove up to get their checks, and by mid-afternoon the checks were being cashed and applied on debts or used to purchase necessities without which the family had struggled for years.

And was it good to watch them wave those checks! Christmas time in September is the only way such a situation can be described. "Have you got your check yet?" was the accepted greeting of the day, and the tide of optimism swept through the countryside in its wake.

As we go to press (Wednesday) we have not been able to secure definite figures as to the amount covered by the checks, but it is expected that a fair per cent of the half million dollars will be received by Lynn county farmers within the next two weeks.
