

Multiple Sclerosis Victims Get Hope

ATLANTIC CITY—The attitude concerning multiple sclerosis, once regarded as a disease leading to helplessness and early death, has changed. The feeling now is that patients can live a useful life for a long time.

This change in attitude was told here by Drs. Edward E. Gordon and Karl E. Carlson of New York. They presented a joint paper before the section of physical medicine and rehabilitation at a meeting of the American Medical Association. They said multiple sclerosis need not have terrifying implications if the optimistic side be stressed, such as the relatively long life expectancy and the possibility of spontaneous arrest of the disease process.

They pointed out that the survival time of victims appears to be underrated, citing one recent statistical study which indicated that the median duration of the disease is about 27 years.

Multiple sclerosis follows a chronic degeneration of the brain and spinal cord, most common in young persons. The onset is usually between 15 and 30 years of age. Among its many symptoms are weakness in one or both legs, tremors, slowness in pronunciation and eye disorders. In late stages there may develop defective memory, emotional disturbances and lack of control. The cause is obscure.

Hot Dog Celebrates 100th Birthday As U. S. Delicacy

CHICAGO — "The American frankfurter more popularly known as the hot dog or red hot is 100 years old this year," it is pointed out editorially in National Live Stock Producer.

"Back in 1852 in the German city of Frankfurt a butcher concocted the odd-shaped meat delicacy in honor of his dog—a Dachshund.

"Today however, the hot dog had found its place in America where some 6.3 billion are consumed annually. That's over 548,000 miles of hot dogs.

"Hot dogs are available at picnics, baseball games, amusement parks, race tracks—whenever and wherever people gather. In New York City alone, some 21,280 miles of hot dogs are consumed annually.

The magazine points out that many animals are marketed each year that cannot be merchandised as steaks, chops and roasts but the meat industry has developed methods of making meat from these animals into very appetizing sausage and canned meats.

"In 1951, sausage represented about 12.4 percent of total meat production and canned meats 11.5 percent. Both have gained about 3 percent since 1941. There are about 200 recognized varieties of sausage with the popular frankfurter or hot dog making up about 25 percent of total sausage production. Bologna rates second at 17 percent.

"But whether it's a hot dog, fresh sausage or cold cuts, these meats contain the tang and appetite appeal that have achieved a place of importance in the meat industry and with the consuming public."

Pharmacy Is Celebrating 100th Birthday

NEW YORK—Modern pharmacy which celebrates its 100th birthday this year, is as far ahead of men who launched its progress, they, in turn, overshadowed potion-crowers of medieval times according to R. Q. Richards, president of the American Pharmaceutical Association.

Black Magic

"If the 24 men who founded A.P.A. in 1852 were to witness the effect of drugs now common in the modern pharmacy, they would be certain they were seeing magic or a miracle, Mr. Richards pointed out. "Yet they were among the most accomplished and skilled pharmacists of their time."

"In contrast to the prescriptions of a century ago, which often included a dozen ingredients and required hours for preparation, today's pharmacist has many drugs and other "rifle-aimed" medicines that knock out bacteria and viruses overnight. Yet, paradoxically, even though he manufactures his own drugs, compounding is greatly simplified, the modern pharmacist must have more skill and knowledge ever before!"

Pharmacy Progress

Tracing the progress of pharmacy since the original group organized to combat importation of inferior or adulterated drugs and to raise educational standards, the A.P.A. president reported that the six colleges of pharmacy with a few hundred students that existed in 1852 increased to 71 with more than 20,000 undergraduates. In contrast to the 6,000 apprentice pharmacists who practiced a century ago, there are now 100,000 the great majority college-trained. And, instead of fewer than 100 drug stores, most of them physician-owned, today there are more than 53,000, all with qualified pharmacists.

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URSA MAJOR Biggest Bears Are Found Near Iowa Town

MARQUETTE, Iowa—The largest and most handsome bears in the world reside in the east Iowa.

These venerable and innocuous ursine giants march high in hills which overlook the Mississippi north of Marquette. They may be seen by visiting Iowa's only national monument, Effigy Mounds.

All told, there are 80 mounds within the monument's boundaries. But only 18 of these are mounds. There are three bird figures and the rest are linear conical mounds.

Great Bear

Great Bear Mound, largest of effigies, is 140 feet long, five high and 70 feet wide at the shoulders. It is one of the Yellow River group at the north end of the monument. Yellow river mounds have been cleared of underbrush and hiking trails have been built.

A smaller bear mound in same area has been outlined gravel to aid the viewer's eye following the lines of the effigy.

Effigy Mounds is one of America's richest archeological treasures. A great deal has been learned about the stone age culture of the mound builders through study of pottery and implements found near the mounds.

A recent discovery which has quite a stir among Iowa archeologists was the finding by national park service authorities that one, but two separate tribal groups simultaneously built mounds in monument area.

Sacred Ground

This has led scholars to believe that the area was a sacred burial ground set aside for all mound-building peoples in the section, apparently all the mounds are burial places.

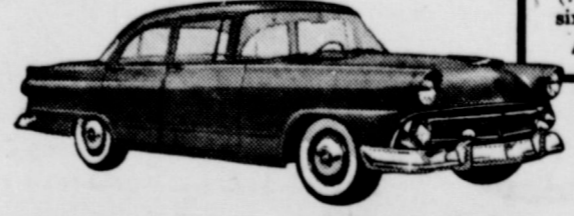

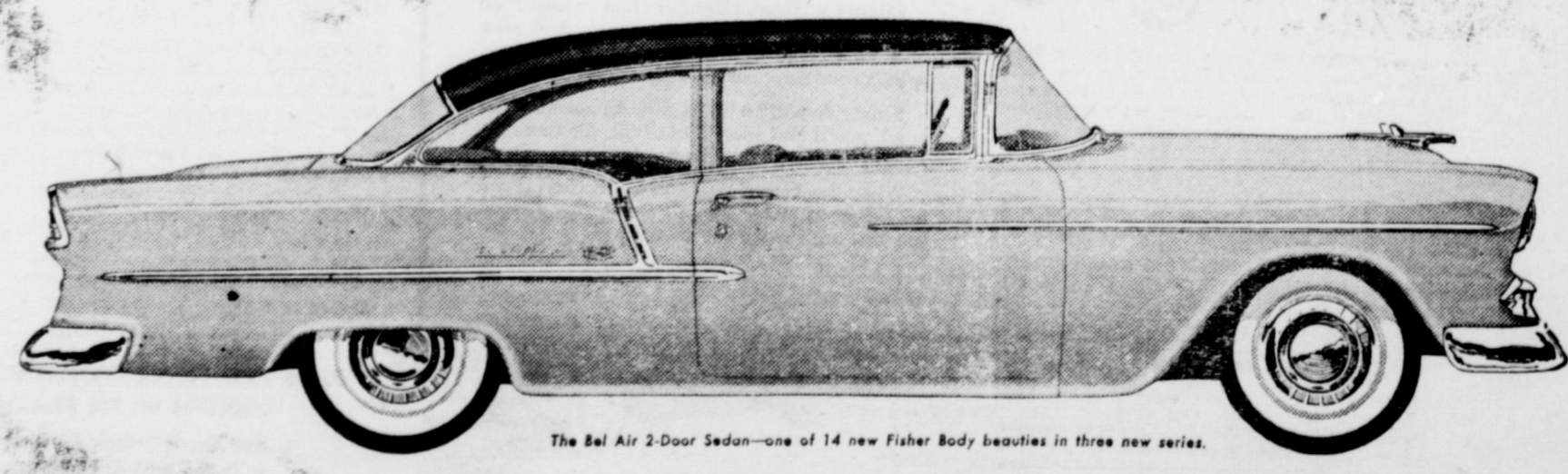

Ding Dong Daddy Is Charged by Wife No. 16 With Bigamy

LOS ANGELES—Wife No. 16 of the Ding Dong Daddy of the "D" Line, Francis H. Van Wie, 66, has charged her husband with bigamy. Mrs. Martha Moyle Van Wie signed a complaint that she married the former San Francisco motorman unaware of his 15 previous marriages.

The complaint accuses the roly-poly motorman of marrying Martha in Yuma in 1951, then eloping two months ago with wife No. 17, Mrs. Amelia Pritchard Van Wie, 73.

Mrs. Martha Van Wie agreed to testify as a witness if the district attorney issued a bigamy complaint. She made her promise a few hours before a warrant was signed against Van Wie.

She told Walter Sullivan, district attorney's investigator, that she met Van Wie early in 1951 at a social gathering here and he proposed marriage, hinting that he was wealthy and would take her off the old age pension rolls. Mrs. Van Wie said they separated after two weeks, were reconciled for a few weeks longer and finally separated four months after their marriage.

Mrs. Van Wie filed suit for divorce in Long Beach and a few days later learned of Van Wie's marital record as the "Ding Dong Daddy of the D Line" in San Francisco back in 1945.

Redcoats

March Upon Village
 SCHUYLERVILLE, N.Y.—A week-long celebration marked the 175th anniversary of the Battle of Saratoga, fought on the site of this village, 11 miles east of Saratoga Springs.

The British opened the campaign of 1777 by seeking to isolate New England through occupying the Hudson Valley. Lord Burgoyne was to come down from Canada through Lake Champlain and Lake George, meeting Lord Howe, who was to march from New York, at Albany.

The plan went awry. Lord Howe marched to Philadelphia. Lord Burgoyne reached Ticonderoga by July 1, but suffered heavy losses. After a series of defeats inflicted by Gen. Benedict Arnold, the British surrendered to General Gates at Old Saratoga, now Schuylerville, on Oct. 17.

Mammoth Black Bear Scares Mountain Folk

ROCKTON, Pa.—Residents of this little mountain village are sighing with relief—a mammoth black bear that had been frightening the community was trapped and removed by the Pennsylvania game commission.

Although bears are not uncommon in this locality, this fellow was of uncommon size, village residents declare. Those who saw him claim that he must have weighed at least 500 pounds.

A farmer, Murlin Burt, whose fields had been raided many times from the bear, requested permission from the game commission to kill the brute, but the game protectors denied his request. 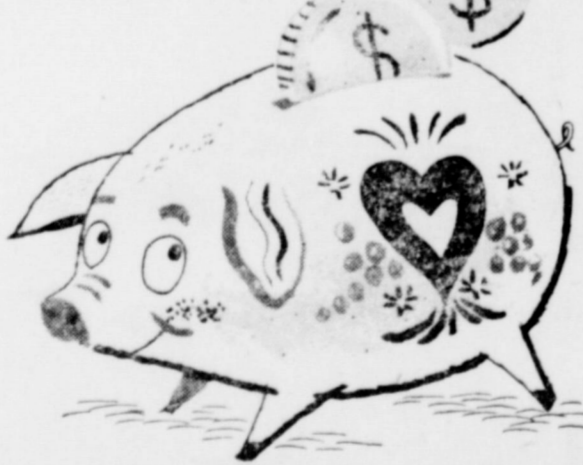

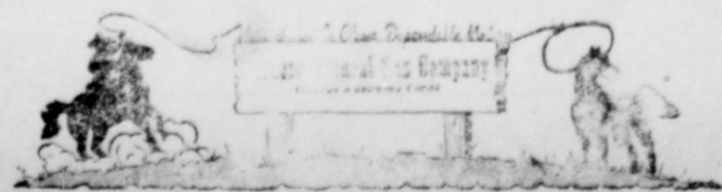

Sleep Important

Sufficient sleep is an important part of healthy living. Adequate sleep helps you to feel well, and builds up your resistance to diseases. An occasional night of too little sleep will not hurt you. However, when you habitually go from day to day without sleep, damaging results are felt.

Or it may be listening to soft music just before you turn out the lights and snuggle under the covers.

A regular routine for getting children to bed also helps put them in the mood for sleep. It helps when mothers are relaxed and pleasant when it's the children's bedtime. After reading them a quite pleasant story, the children will probably be ready to turn out the light and fall asleep. This helps form good sleeping habits, which mean much to a child's health. Young children need lots of sleep—about twelve hours for the preschool youngsters, and nine to ten hours for the older children.
