Multiple Sclerosis Victims Get Hope

ATLANTIC CITY-The attitude concerning multiple sclerosis, once regarded as a disease leading to helplessness and early death, has changed. The feeling now is that patients can live a useful life for

a long time.
This change in attitude was told here by Drs. Edward E. Gordon and Karl E. Carlson of New York. They presented a joint paper before the section of physical medicine and rehabilitation at a meeting of the American Medical Association. They said multiple sclerosis need not have terrifying implications if the optimistic side be stressed, such as the relatively long life expectancy and the possibility of spontaneous arrest of the disease process.

They pointed out that the survival time of victims appears to be underrated, citing one recent statistical study which indicated that the median duration of the disease is about 27 years.

Multiple colerosis fellows a chronic degeneration of the brain and spinal cord, mod commo h young persons. The onset is usually between 15 and 30 years of age. Among its many symptoms are weakness in one or both legs, tremors, slowness in pronunciation and eye disorders. In late stages there may develop defective memory, emotional disturbances and lack of control. The cause is ob-

Hot Dog Celebrates 100th Birthday As U. S. Delicacy

CHICAGO - "The American frankfurter more popularly known as the hot dog or red hot is 100 years old this year," it is pointed out editorially in National Live Stock Producer.

Back in 1852 in the German elty Frankfurt a butcher concocted the edd-shaped meat delicacy in honor of his dog-a Dachshund.

"Today however, the hot dog had found its place in America where some 6.3 billion are consumed annually. That's over 548,-000 miles of hot dogs.

"Hot dogs are available at picnics, baseball games, amusement parks, race tracks-whenever and wherever people gather. In New York City alone, some 21,280 miles of hot dogs are consumed an-

The magazine points out that many animals are marketed each year that cannot be merchandised as steaks, chops and roasts but the meat industry has developed methods of making meat from these animals into very appetizing sausage and canned meats.

"In 1951, sausage represented about 12.4 percent of total meat production and canned meats 11.5 percent. Both have gained about 3 percent since 1941. There are about 200 recognized varieties of sausage with the popular frankfurter or hot dog making up about 25 percent of total sausage production. Bologna rates second at 17 percent.

'But whether it's a hot dog, fresh sausage or cold cuts, these meats contain the tang and appetite appeal that have achieved a place of ortance in the meat industry with the consuming public."





week-long celebration marked
the 175th anniversary of the
Battle of Saratoga, fought on
the site of this village, 11 miles
east of Saratoga Springs.

The British opened the campaign of 1777 by seeking to isolate New England through occupying the Hudson Valley. Lord Burgoyne was to come down from Canada through Lake Champlain and Lake George, meeting Lord Howe, who was to march from New York, at Albany.

The plan went awry. Lord Howe marched to Philadelphia. Lord Burgoyne reached Ticonderoga by July 1, but suffered heavy losses. After a series of defeats inflicted by Gen. Benedict Arnold, the British surrendered to General Gates at Old Saratoga, now Schuylerville, on Oct. 17.

Mammoth Black Bear Scares Mountain Folk

ROCKTON, Pa.—Residents of this little mountain village are sighing with relief—a mammoth black bear that had been frightening the community was trapped and removed by the Pennsylvania game commission.

Although bears are not uncommon in this locality, this fellow was of uncommon size, village residents declare. Those who saw him claim that he must have weighed at least 500 pounds.

A farmer, Murlin Burt, whose fields had been raided many times by the bear, requested permission from the game commission to kill the brute, but the game protectors denied his request. Bear season doesn't open until December, the commission replied. But the commission came to the rescue of

Burt and the community.

Game Protector Claude Kelsey built a box trap made of big planks. He baited the trap with honey, and he and the villagers waited. It wasn't long before the big bear, always on the prowl for food, walked into the trap.

Mrs. Van Wie filed suit for divorce in Long Beach and a few days later learned of Van Wie's marital record as the "Ding Don" Daddy of the D Line" in San Fre cisco back in 1945.





Sleep Important

Sufficient sleep is an important part of healthy living. Adequate sleep helps you to feel well, buildss sup your resistance to diseases. An occasional night of too little sleep will not hurt you. However, when you habitually go from day to day without sllep, damaging results are felt.

In addition to ruining your dis-position, insufficient sleep plays havoc with your coordination and timing. Workers who are short of sleep and rest tend to be accident prone. Some men who try to hold an extra-time job to increase the family income, have paid a heavy penaltty in damaged health and accidents.

Good sleeping habits take practice. It's like anything else you do. No one ian learn to become an expert swimmer, just by reading about various strokes. You have to spend many hours practicing to become a goood swimmer.

Listening to the radio, watching television, or working on hobbies that persons are loathe to quit are sometimes causes of staying up too late. Late entertaining also cuts out many hours of sleep. time and routine for getting ready for bed will help put you in the moood for sleep. The routine may mean reading the evening newspaper or a light story after you are ready for bed. Or it may be listen-ing to soft music just before you turn out the lights and snuggle under the covers.

A regular routine for getting children to bed also helps put them in the mood for sleep. It helps when mothers are relaxed and plea-sant when it's the children's bedtime. After readin them a quite, pleasant story, the children will probably be ready to turn out the light and fall asleep. This helps form good sleeping habits, which mean much to a child's health. Young children need lots of sleep—about twelve hours for the preschool youngaters and nine to ten school youngsters, and nine to ten hours for the older children..
