DIABETES IS TAKING MANY LIVES

Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span, nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year.

While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are annually causing a decreasing number of deaths in this country, diabetes is

still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group, Dr. Cox said.

Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures which made the disease more easily diagnosed.

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupations call for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple, whole some diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.

A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the
Constitution of the State of Texas
authorizing the Legislature to ap-
propriate Seventy-five Thousand
(\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much
thereof as may be necessary, to pay
claims incurred by John Tarleton
Agricultural College for the con-
struction of a building on the cam-
pus of such college pursuant to de-
ficiency authorization of the Govern-
or of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE
OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution
of the State of Texas be amended
by adding a new section, as follows:
"The Legislature is authorized to
appropriate so much money as may
be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-
five thousand (\$75,000.00) dollars,
to pay claims incurred by John Tar-
leton Agricultural College for the
construction of a building on the
campus pursuant to deficiency autho-
rization by the Governor of Texas
on August 31, 1937."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitu-
tional Amendment shall be submit-
ted to a vote of the qualified electors
of this state at the next general
election to be held on the first Tues-
day after the first Monday in Novem-
ber, A. D. 1946, at which all
ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL
AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING
THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR
BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR
JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTUR-
AL COLLEGE"; and
AGAINST THE CONSTITU-
TIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZ-
ING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY
FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED
FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICUL-
TURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of
said clauses on the ballot, leaving
the one expressing his vote on the
proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue
the necessary proclamation for said
election and have the same publish-
ed as required by the Constitution
and laws of this state.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand
(\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much
thereof as may be necessary is here
by appropriated out of any funds in
the treasury of the state, not other-
wise appropriated, to pay the expen-
ses of such publication and election.

JOINT RESOLUTION
Amendment to Article
of the Constitution of the State
relating to the State
Retirement, Disability
and Compensation Fund

RESOLVED BY THE
SENATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS
That Article 16 of the
Constitution of the State of Texas
be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The Legislature
shall have the right to levy taxes to
maintain the Retirement, Disability
and Compensation Fund for the
officers and employees of the
State; provided that the amount
of such taxes shall not exceed five
percent of the net income of each
person for any year exceeding the
amount of \$100,000,000,000,000,
to be provided from the com-
mon property of such person, or by the
State for such Retirement,
Disability and Compensation Fund
as provided by law.

Section 2. The Legislature shall have
the right to provide for and admin-
ister the Retirement, Disability and
Compensation Fund for the officers and
employees of the State; provided same is
authorized by a majority vote of the
Senate of this State, and in bonds
of such person, or by the State for
such Retirement, Disability and Com-
pensation Fund as provided by law.

United States, the State of Texas, or
counties or cities of this State or in
bonds issued by any agency of the
United States Government, the pay-
ment of the principal of and interest
on which is guaranteed by the
United States, provided that a suffi-
cient amount of said funds shall
be kept on hand to meet the immed-
iate payment of the amount likely to
become due each year out of said
Fund, such amount of funds to be
kept on hand to be determined by
the agency which may provide by
law to administer said Fund; and
provided that the recipients of bene-
fits from said Fund shall not be eli-
gible from any other pension retire-
ment funds or direct aid from the
State of Texas, unless the Fund, the
creation of which is provided for
herein, contributed by the county,
is released to the State of Texas as
a condition to receiving such other
pension aid.

Section 3. The Governor of the State
of Texas shall issue the necessary
proclamation for said election and
shall have the same published as re-
quired by the Constitution for
Amendments thereto.

thly output of 27,000 caskets by
April of 1947 is scheduled accord-
ing to the Quartermaster General
of the Army, T. B. Larkin. Manufac-
ture of all the caskets and the out-
ter cases to protect them, which the
program requires, is expected to be
completed within fifteen months af-
ter production is started.

Manufacturers have agreed that
upon award-of the contracts, 99
working days will be required to
build production assembly lines, up-
on receipt of steel, 21 days will be
required for prefabrication of com-
ponent and stockpiling for start of
production. After start of produc-
tion 30 days will be required for in-
itial delivery. This means that if
steel is available no caskets will be
delivered prior to early in 1947.

Assurances have been given to
the Quartermaster corps by the Civ-
ilian Production Administration
that it will assist manufacturers to
obtain steel, plywood, rubber and
other materials needed for filling
the requirements. Inability of manu-
facturers to obtain steel has heret-
ofore delayed initiation of the Re-
patriation program. The type of cas-
ket to be used was selected only af-
ter considerable research. It was
decided to use a casket of seamless
steel construction, hermetically
sealed. Factors considered were
that caskets should be conservative
in design, conform with the stand-
ards of the American public and be
appropriate to the reverence which
the program for final burial of mem-
bers of the Armed Forces expresses.

Specifically, the caskets decided
upon is lacquered or enameled in
bronze seal brown, equipped with
conventional handles and with in-
terior upholstery. The cases are
of plywood, earthbrown in color, lin-
ed with zinc coated steel and with
metal handles. The casket is to be
permanently attached to the base of
the case which is fastened to the
main section of the case with auto-
matic clasps.

Early this year some 250 letters
were sent to firms which presuma-
bly might have been expected to be
interested in submitting bids on the
caskets and outer cases which the
Government will have to supply.

Last March, at the Jeffersonville
Quartermaster depot, the propos-
als were opened. Of the 12 sub-
mitted, only 5 appeared favorable
for further consideration.

Even while the proposals were
being considered, it became appar-
ent that none of the bidders would
be able to fulfill their contracts un-
less the War Department was able
to give them assistance in procuring
needed materials.

Accordingly, steps were taken by
the Office of the Quartermaster Gen-
eral to secure assistance from the
Civilian Production Administration
in obtaining steel, plywood and oth-
er material for the manufacturers.

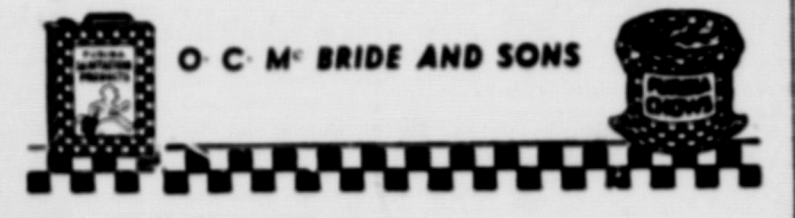

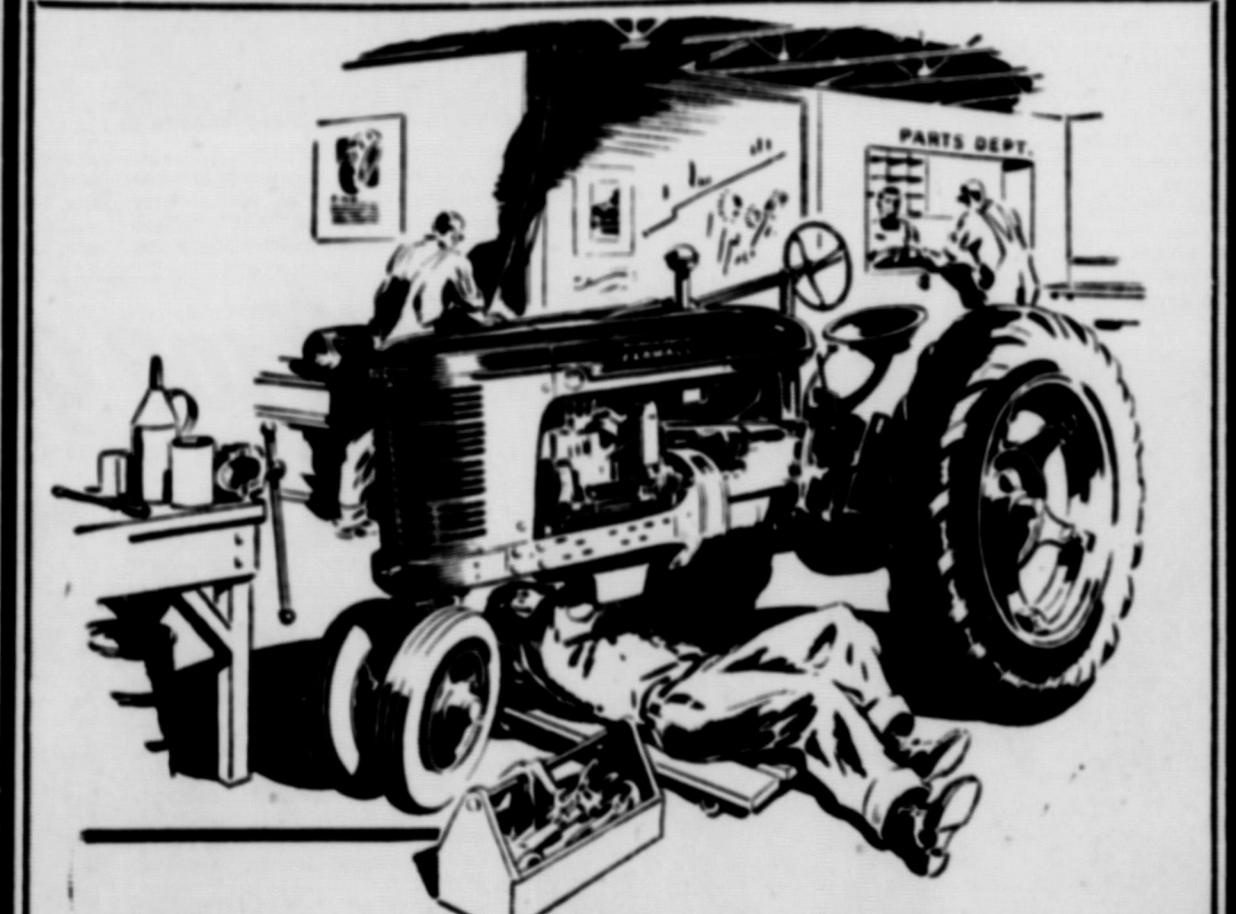

By The Old Timer

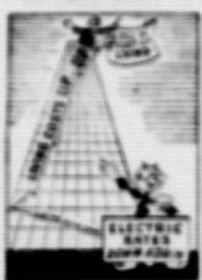
