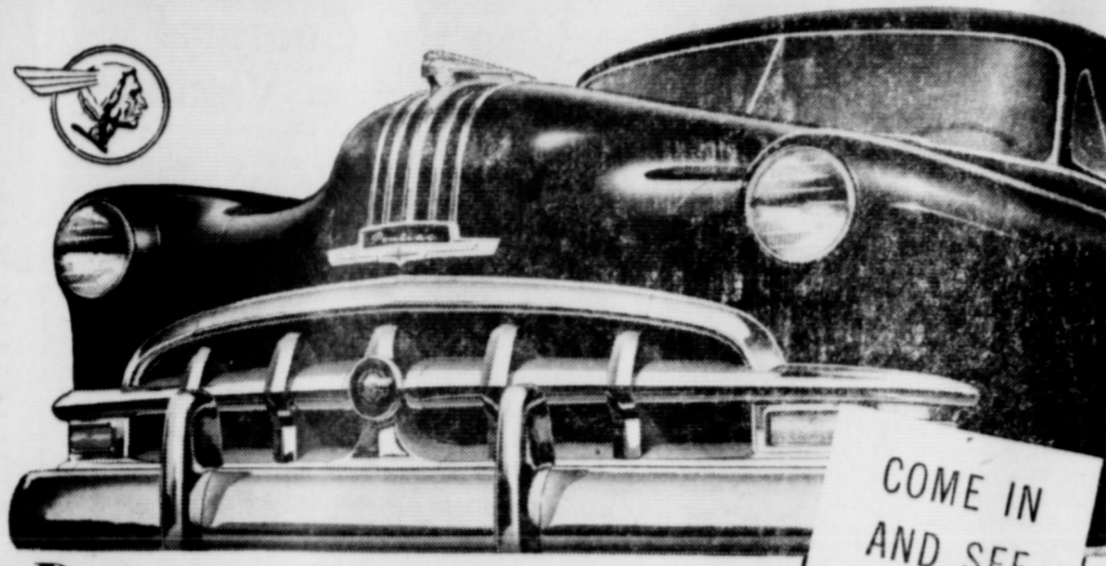

Plane Incident Heats Up Cold War; German Rearmament Pleas Spread; Court Upholds Georgia Vote System

COLD WAR: Heating Up

Russia had heated up the Cold War. A United States air force navy privateer had disappeared after a flight in which it was reported to have flown over Russian territory.

A WIDESPREAD HUNT by American officials was launched for the missing plane. Erroneous reports had it that life rafts from the plane had been found.

But later, a life raft was picked up and air force officials indicated a conviction it came from the missing plane, which had 10 crew members aboard.

Had the Soviets shot down the plane, or so crippled it by gunfire that it crashed in the Baltic? That was the big question.

THOSE were questions that would have to wait, however, until the answer to what had actually happened to the plane had been cleared up.

GEORGIA: Unit Vote Strays

The county-unit vote determination system is unique in the United States because only two states use it. It is unique, too, in that it is found acceptable by city populations in these states.

But, the U.S. supreme court has said the system is all right. In a 7 to 2 decision it refused to strike down the county-unit vote in Georgia.

JUSTICE BLACK and Douglas protested bitterly against the majority opinion, which was brief and unsigned.

The majority opinion said that federal courts have no right to interfere with the way a state geographically apportions voting strength.

Two Georgia voters attacked the existing law. Under the system, each of Georgia's 159 counties is allotted a number of unit votes.

THE CANDIDATE who receives the most popular votes in a county is awarded all its unit votes.

ROYALTY: Tough Going

Everyone has known for a long time that with the exception of England, royalty has been having a tough time. With the changing times have gone royal privilege and pomp but, chiefly regretful to royalty, the cash, too, has gone.

LATEST to join the ranks of impoverished noblemen was a German duke, Ernst August, of Cumberland and Brunswick, father of a queen and cousin of a king.

Duke Ernst was really up against it. He was so badly off, financially, that he had to sell treasured antiques just to pay his grocery bills.

Said the duke, philosophically, "Of course, I'm sorry to part with these things, but it just can't be helped." The duke was down to his last two castles—and one of them is a war ruin.

TV FOOTBALL: One Show Over

Football fans who have been following Big Ten football via television screen, will find that this fall the show's over. They'll have to go out to the stadium now, instead of sitting cozily at home and following the play.

Big Ten athletic directors, meeting in Chicago, voted to ban live television of their schools' football games for this season.

GERMANY: A Repetition?

Any mention of rearming Germany makes cold chills run down the backs of those who remember how a beaten, dismantled Reich was permitted to come back and plunge the world into the most devastating conflict it had ever known.

THREE TIMES in the past 80 years, German war machines have struck swiftly and ruthlessly at the peace of the world.

Now, all the great talk, the board planning, the global thinking is merging into one resounding chorus: "Rearm Germany!"

Joining this chorus was General Jacob L. Devers, retired chief of U.S. army field forces, who said in an address in Louisville, Ky., that western Germans "Would like to fight for us, under American officers, against the Russians."

NO ONE disputes that. But recent history is too grim for such general equanimity.

So Chamberlain went to Berchtesgaden with his foiled umbrella and came back hugging to his breast the miserable pledge of the Austrian madman of "peace in our time."

THE world had a horrible taste of that kind of "peace." To rearm Germany creates a fearful possibility that the dose may be repeated.

STRIKE THREAT: Old Issue Flares

Two big railway unions were ready to "review the whole case" of their Diesel-engine dispute with the nation's railroads.

The argument was two years old and was easy to state. The unions felt that the adoption of Diesel-powered locomotives discriminated against manpower.

The railroads, on the other hand, have refused to do this. Union leaders refused to discuss just how imminent a strike might be or when and in what matter it might be called.

The union was in a highly strategic position. It was free to strike at any time, inasmuch as all "cooling off" provisions of the railway labor act have been exhausted.

Thunderjet

The air force's Republic "Thunderjet" was reaching out farther and farther to deal death and confusion to any potential U.S. enemy.

The air force reported that the F-84's range has been increased to where it can carry out most types of missions more than 1,000 miles from base.

Some of the sprightliest talk to be heard in Manhattan these nights is in the coffeehouses frequented by the talented and threadbare refugees of Mittel-Europa.

Most of the stories spun by these continental katzenjammers are on the comic side; yet, once in a while they come up with a yarn which leaves a ping-pong ball in your throat.

For instance, there's the tale about the old gentleman and his greying wife who, during the summer months, can be seen almost every day on the carousel near the Central park zoo.

Who are they? Well, to tell you, I'll have to go back several years and several thousand miles.

Shortly after the Nazi goose-stepped into Vienna and decency went underground, a well-known surgeon and his wife, both of frowned-upon ancestry, were urged by friends to take their six-year-old son and leave the country.

His usefulness, however, came to an end a few afternoons later

and his wife from the carousel and were about to take the child when their leader, a youth with a hangman's sense of humor, stopped them.

As the carousel started up again, the tiny strains of "Chiribiri-bim" drowned out the mother's screams, and the last the couple saw of their son he was riding on the merry-go-round.

Even information received in letters, excepting of course the confidential and purely personal, is news if the writer is known by others.

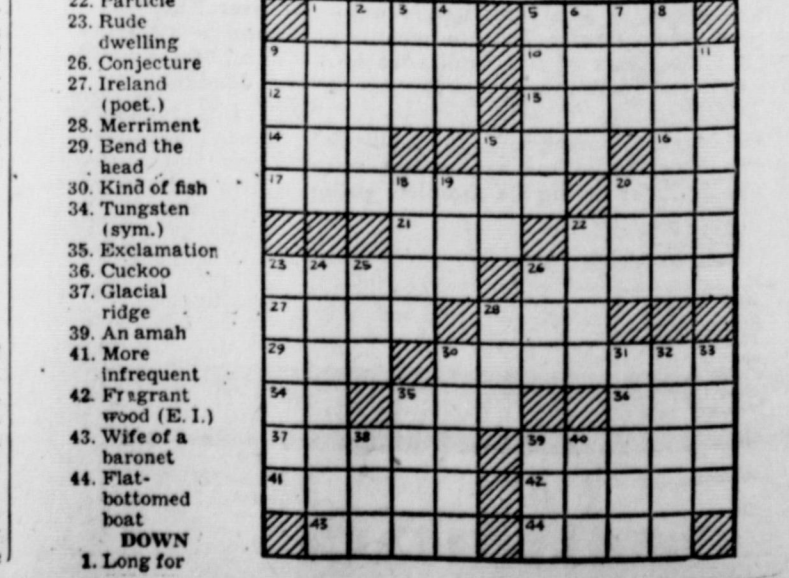
Community Is Interested occasions when sickness, accidents, or other personal troubles occur, the community will want to know about them so it can respond accordingly.

**Cook Strawberries Quickly When Preserving**  
(See Recipe Below)

**Preserve the Strawberry**  
THE STRAWBERRY SEASON is all too short, especially if you like this handsome, red, luscious berry. However, while it's here, plan to put away some of the berries in the form of jam or preserves so you may enjoy them the year around.

Strawberries are rich in vitamin C but should be eaten fresh to get maximum benefits from this nutrient. Short cooking time will avoid complete loss of the vitamin, as well as preserving the color and flavor.

The berries have an affinity with pineapple and rhubarb, and may be combined with them, as you will see in the recipes.

**Rhubarb-Ripe Strawberry Jam**  
(Makes 7 6-ounce glasses)

3 cups prepared fruit  
4 1/2 cups sugar  
1 box powdered fruit pectin

To prepare fruit, trim and slice fine (do not peel) about 1/2 pound small red-stalked rhubarb. Grind about one quart fully ripe strawberries or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to a pulp. Combine fruits.

Measure sugar into dry dish and set aside until needed. Measure prepared fruit into a five- to six-quart kettle, filling up last cup or fraction of cup with water if necessary.

Place over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, and continue stirring until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once pour in sugar, stirring constantly. (To reduce foaming, 1/4 teaspoon butter may be added.) Continue stirring, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute.

Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once.

(Makes 10 6-ounce glasses)

4 cups prepared fruit  
6 1/2 cups sugar  
1 box powdered fruit pectin

Measure sugar into dry dish and set aside until needed. Measure prepared fruit into a five- to six-quart kettle, filling up last cup or fraction of cup with water if necessary.

**Strawberry Preserves**  
THE COLOR and flavor of strawberries are easily destroyed by heat. Hence, in making preserves it is well to cook them only a short time.

**Method I.** Select large, firm, tart berries. Wash, drain, and remove

caps. For each pound of fruit use one pound of sugar. Combine the fruit and the sugar in alternate layers and let stand 8 to 10 hours or overnight before cooking. While heating to boiling, stir carefully. Boil rapidly for 15 to 20 minutes until the sirup is somewhat thick, taking care to prevent burning. Remove the scum. Pour at once into hot sterilized jars and seal.

**METHOD II.** In this method the smaller, less-perfect berries are picked out to be used for juice. Crush these berries, then stir them while cooking them for about three minutes. Strain. To each pound of

choice prepared berries allow 1/4 cup of this juice and one pound of sugar. Add the sugar to the juice, stir, and heat slowly until the sugar is entirely dissolved. Drop the berries into the sirup, simmer for three to five minutes, then boil rapidly for 10 to 15 minutes, or until the fruit is somewhat clear. Remove the scum. Allow the preserves to stand about eight hours or overnight in a glass or porcelain bowl. Fill hot sterilized jars three-fourths full with the drained berries, without reheating them. Boil the sirup rapidly until fairly thick or 221°. Pour the hot sirup over the berries and seal.

**METHOD III.** (Sun Preserves)

Strawberry sun preserves can be made only if there is sufficiently hot sunshine to cause rapid evaporation.

To each pound of choice prepared strawberries allow one pound of sugar and one teaspoon of lemon juice. Prepare a sirup from strawberry juice and sugar as described under method II. Add the berries to the sirup and simmer for three to five minutes. Drain the berries from the sirup and place about an inch apart on shallow enameled pans or china platters. Boil the sirup until it is fairly thick; that is, for about 10 minutes, or to 221°. Remove the scum, add the lemon juice, and pour the sirup in a thin layer over the berries. Cover with window glass propped up about one-fourth inch from the pans. Place in the sun for two or three days or until the sirup has jelled. Take inside at night, and after each day's sunning turn the berries over. Without reheating, put the preserves into hot sterilized jars and seal.

Youngsters will like oatmeal on taste if it's already sweetened for them. From 1/2 to 1/4 cup of sugar for 1 1/2 cups of oats is about the right proportion. Add sugar or an equal amount of honey or sirup to boiling water before stirring in cereal.

Cherry pies may be improved with a bit of almond extract, or a suspicion of mace. You'll be surprised at how the flavor is brought out with either one.

Cottage cheese will make a delightful spread if you mix two teaspoons of crushed cardamom or caraway seeds with one cup of the cheese before serving.

After soaking eggplant slices in salted water, dip them in French dressing, then in fine bread or cracker crumbs and fry. Rich, but delicious!

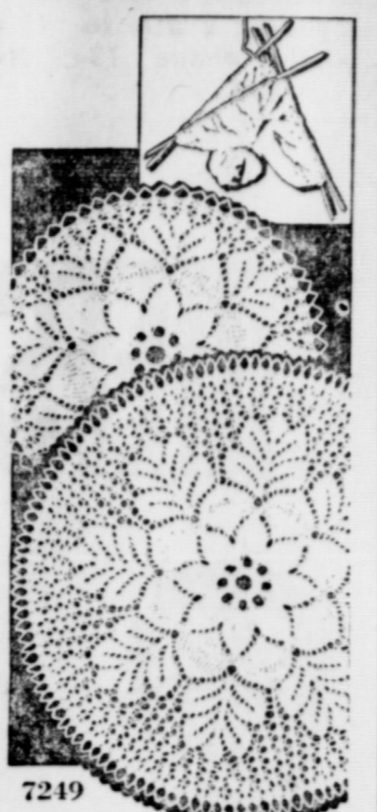

**Small Acreage Farmers Practice Conservation**

Small-farm operators are beginning to change their belief that soil conservation is a luxury they can't afford. Thousands of small farms are now practicing all-out soil conservation with exciting results.

Back in the 1930's, a farming magazine recalls, farmers were told to cut down on corn and small grain. The idea was to keep more of the land in grass and most of the rest in hay crops most of the time.

After giving soil conservation a try, thousands of operators of small farms have now concluded, the magazine finds, that one can raise more of everything. Some have doubled production in just a few years under soil conservation practices.

**Broilers Need Water**



Broilers need water to put on weight. Laying hens need it to maintain satisfactory egg production. And they need it all year round—winter and summer.

In years past, poultry waterers required almost constant attention during the winter. Often the battle against ice was fought with steaming kettles of water.

One method of overcoming this problem is presented in the accompanying illustration. It shows the installation of a heat lamp over a common type of waterer. The warmth produced is sufficient to keep the water free of ice as well as to prevent litter from becoming wet around the waterer.

**Dry Silage Sometimes Contains Few Vitamins**

Dry silage, which has been subjected to long-continued, high heat of fermentation, has little carotene of Vitamin-A content left in it. Carotene usually is badly needed to supplement the other vitamins.

The farmer with several silos to fill should start several days ahead of when the kernels have finished denting to avoid ending up the silo-filling with corn that is "rattle dry" as it is blown in.

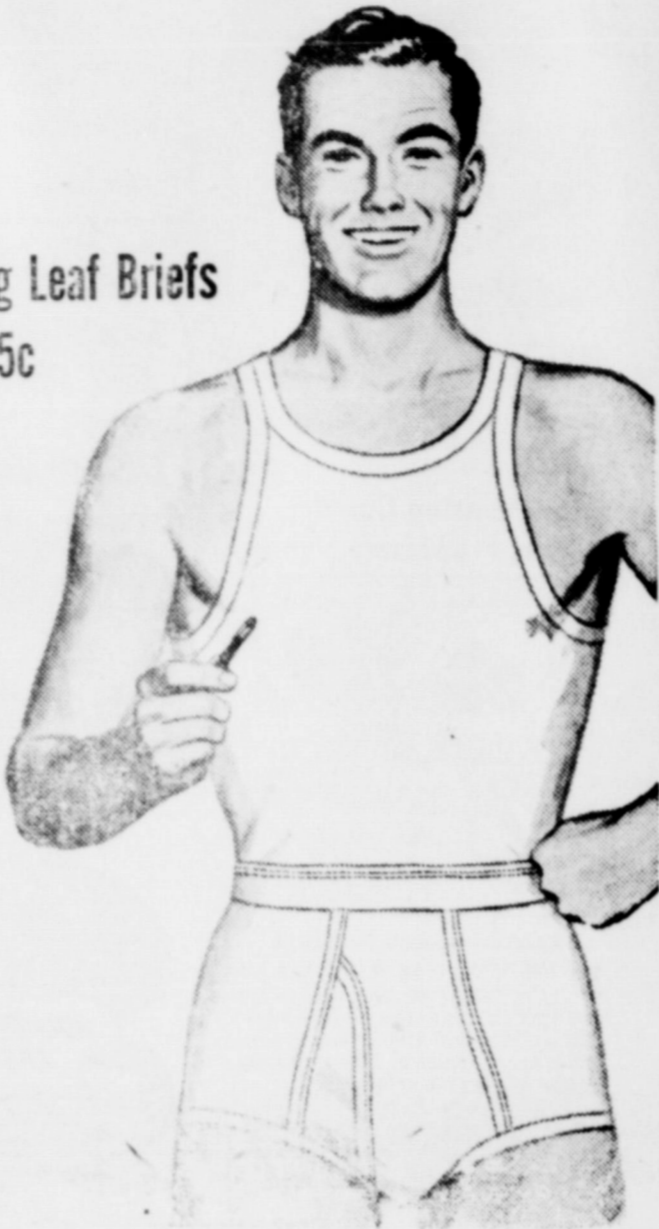

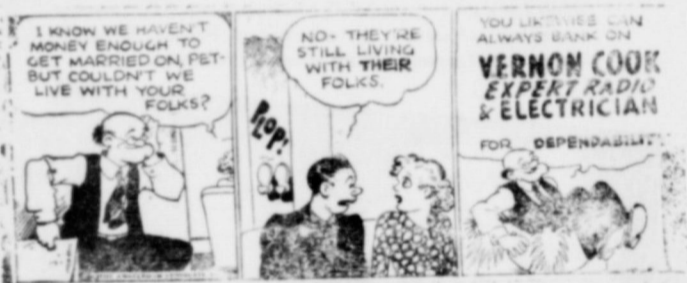

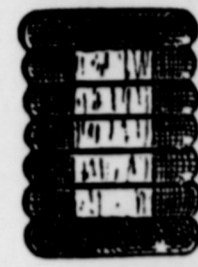
