News was received here Sunday of serious illness of the father of E. E. Phillips, and she and Mr. Phillips left immediately for Bridgeport to be at his bedside.

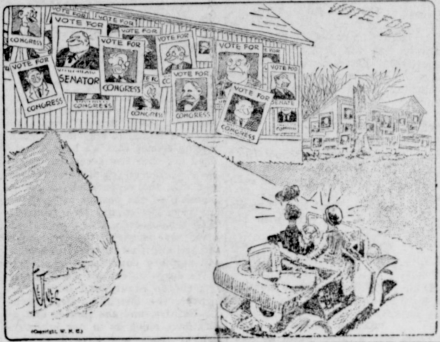
Eagles Win Again Over Seagraves 39-0

Teachers Should Notice Ailing School Children

Austin, Texas, Oct. 24.—The daily inspection of school children and the removal and isolation of those found ailing, constitutes one of the most important factors in the control of communicable diseases, declared Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Medical supervision of school children is, of course, the ideal method of disease control. However, in most communities this is not possible. Parents and teachers can do a great deal in preventing the spread of disease. If the parent notices anything abnormal about the child, he should be kept at home.

The teacher should notify the parents of children who show any of the following symptoms: loss of weight, pallor, pains, flushing of the face, breaking out of any kind color in the head, especially running eyes; evidence of sore throat cough, vomiting, etc.

If children showing the early signs of the common children's diseases are excluded and their family physician consulted early, many epidemics could be averted and loss of time prevented.

It is much better to have one child miss a few days of school, rather than run the risk of spreading the disease to his classmates.

NEW DEATH RULING BY BUREAU OF CENSUS

Austin, Oct. 23.—A new ruling by the Federal Bureau of Census has just been put into effect in Texas and will be of interest to every community in the State, according to Dr. W. A. Davis, Registrar, State Department of Health.

This new ruling is to the effect that the death of any person shall be credited to that person's legal residence. In the past the place where one died was charged with the death. New death rates for all towns and counties will show the true conditions.

The towns in Texas that have a reputation as health centers have been unduly credited with more deaths than have occurred among their citizens. Now, when ever a health seeker dies away from home, the place of his residence will be charged with his death.

The same holds true in the compiling of records for counties. In the past many towns had a death rate three or four times as high as the county. This was due to a variety of causes—principally, patients from the rural areas coming into town for medical treatment and hospitalization and dying while there and giving their addresses as the town without specifying that their home is outside the city limits. The State Department of Health requests everyone to give exact information for all birth and death records.

25,000 CLIENTS ELIGIBLE FOR RURAL REHABILITATION

Austin, Oct. 20.—More than 25,000 clients have been certified as eligible for rural rehabilitation in Texas, it was announced today by J. E. Stanford, head of the rural rehabilitation department of the Texas Relief Commission.

1,102 houses to be occupied by rehabilitated clients.

Stanford said 466 families already have been placed on these improved farms and are being furnished with the necessary capital goods for making a living.

Community work centers, an important phase of the rural rehabilitation program are being considered at 80 points over the state and approximately 20 are expected to be under construction shortly.

"In addition," Stanford said, "more than 2,000 relief relief farms both tenants and landlords already residing on the farm but who will not occupy leased houses and subsistence plots, have been contacted and taken actively into the program by rural supervisors. These families will receive the same consideration as those occupying leased and repaired residences."

REPORT OF LYNN COUNTY GRAND JURY

STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTY OF LYNN:

In the District Court of Lynn county, Texas, September Term, A. D. 1934.

To the Honorable Judge of Said Court:

We, your grand jury, for the above term of said Court, report to you that we have carefully inquired into all matters of law violations brought to our attention and have returned into open Court 14 felony bills of indictment.

It is our observation that crime is on the increase in our county since the last term of Court, and we find that all the officers of our county have been faithfully performing their various duties and bending every effort towards enforcing the law thereby making it very unpleasant for the criminal to stay in our county. The crimes that we have investigated are with few exceptions of the lesser degree of gravity and we feel that with the cooperation of the citizenship of the county our officers can keep the county free from the more serious crimes.

We have inspected the court house and jail and find the same in a clean and sanitary condition.

We desire to express our appreciation to the county and District Attorneys, the Sheriff's Department the Bailiffs, and the janitor and all who have aided us in our investigation of crime and have done their part to make our work a pleasant task.

Having concluded our labors we most respectfully request that we be adjourned for the term.



Study Constitutional Amendments Now

We need to study the constitutional amendments which are to be voted upon in the general election, November 6th.

Here is a thumbnail sketch of the eight amendments which will be called upon to consider:

S. J. R. No. 21. Create new counties or combine existing counties by a two thirds vote of both houses of the legislature.

H. J. R. No. 30. Taxing land belonging to the University of Texas for county and school purposes.

S. J. R. No. 2. Abolishing fee basis for payment of county officers in all counties of 20,000 population or more and paying them on a salary basis.

H. J. R. No. 41. Giving cities of 5000 population or more the right to adopt or amend their charters.

H. J. R. No. 42. Defining length of time elected officers shall serve.

S. J. R. No. 13. Setting the total amount of revenues that shall be collected any biennium at \$22.50 per capita.

S. J. R. No. 16. Reclassifying all property for taxation and relieving the heavy burden now placed on real estate by making property now escaping taxation pay its just share of government costs.

H. J. R. No. 14. Giving Commissioners Court authority to abolish and consolidate various county offices.

"Pretty Boy" Floyd Killed Monday

Monday afternoon at sundown on a farm near the little town of East Liverpool, Ohio, "Pretty Boy" Floyd the phantom outlaw of the Cookson Hills of Oklahoma "racked" crime trails' end. Fifteen slugs from the guns of Federal agents and police reached their mark as Floyd made a dash for freedom.

Melvin Purvis, Federal operative, who also led the forces of law and order when John Dillinger was killed, was the leader of the group of eight federal and local officers who cornered Floyd. Floyd had two loaded automatic pistols on his person when shot but was unable to fire a shot as he made his mad dash for freedom. Before he died he admitted to Purvis that he was Floyd, but died before he could give any information as to the Kansas City Station massacre which the Federal government had pinned on him. So end's the list of crimes for the Southwest's Public Enemy No. 1.

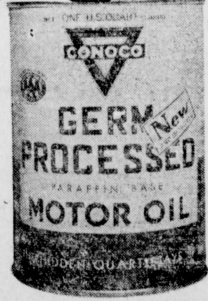
