# SHALL O'DONNELL HAVE BEER

## BEER AND BUSINESS

Under the disguise of "Business" the proponents of beer are seeking to legalize its sale in our town. Will it help business? We contend that it will not. It is the height of folly to contend that it will cause people from other towns to come here to buy their groceries or dry goods or any other poducts that we are now legality selling when they can get the same in larger towns nearer home. If this beer will not intoxicate they will not drive for miles just to get a so called "harmless" drink. There is only one class of persons who will be drawn here and that is the class who are seeking something stronger than this beer. The only business that it can possibly help is a few beer joints that will illegally sell booze. The experience of other towns is that the sale of 3.2 per cent beer without stronger drinks does not pay.

## BEER INCREASES DRUNKENNESS

We do not have to guess or to theorize about this. We have the records of the beer cities for proof. Since beer became legalized in the following cities they show an enormous increase in drunkenness: "New Yory City, 55.5 per cent increase; St. Louis, 23.5 per cent increase; Loa Angeles, 95. 5 per cent increase; Minneapolis, 16.2 per cent increase. Denver, 116.8 per cent increase; Deluth, 69.4 per cent increase. Worchester, Mass, 64 per cent increase." This is the story all overthe country, Last, year beer was permitted to be sold in Lubbock pending the outcome of an election to determine whether or not it should be sold legally in the county, and police records show that the increase in drunkenness during this time was about 65 per cent greater than during a similar length of time before the State voted for beer.

## BEER MAKES BOOTLEGGERS

Here are the facts again stated by Mr. Joseph H. Choate, Jr., Director of the Federal Alcohol Control Administration. He says: "Bootleggers are more active today than they were before prohibition was repealed, and the rising flood of outlaw liquor is apalling." Mr. Choate is not a prohibitionist. He is appointed by the Administration and is in sympathy with repeal, yet he must admit the facts. The fact is that since we legalized beer we made more bootleggers.

## BEER A BLIND FOR BOOZE

It is a fact that the bootleggers of O'Don-nell are in favor of beer. Why? The only reason is that they believe that beer will help their liquor business. These will put up beer joints and will sell their bootleg products, and if their customers get drunk there is no way to prove that they did not get drunk on beer. Thus there is no way to check up on booze sold.

## BEER INCREASES AUTO WRECKS

Since the legalization of beer in our country automobile wrecks have everywhere great-ly increased and in many localities they have doubled, thus killing and crippling insoes at me, women, and children. Shall we further endanger the lives of our families by legal-

## BEER WILL WRECK BUSINESS

In view of the above established facts we contend that beer will wreck business. Since the sale of beer here will increase drunkenness in our town and will fill the highways and byways with people who are lit up on boore, people who care for the safety and security of their families will go to nearby sober towns for trade. Those especially on the dividing line of trade between our town and other towns, will go elsewhere. Remember these people in the country as a rule are dry-and sober and they will seek a dry and sober place to do their trading. They will gin their cotton, and buy their groceries and other things they need in a town where they will not be endangered on account of drunk-enness. They will go too their towns to clurch and to the picture shows because they will be afraid to meet our drunks on our highways. We are proud of our public school. Many people have moved here for the benefit that it offers. If we legalize beer, many of these highclass citizens will move to other towns because they do not want their chilren to grow up in a beer town. It will mean that real estate will depreciate in value, and that we will have many more vacant houses and business buildings. With Lamesa and Tahoka to draw the cream of our citizenship away and also the cream of our trade, away, we will become the rendezvous of the riff-raff of the country and our little town go into dilapidation.

## WHY LIMIT VOTE TO INCORPORATION ONLY?

Why did not the proponents of beer call for an election to cover the entire Commissioner's precinct? They had a reason. They knew better. They knew that the precinet would vote against beer. They knew that it voted against beer last year by an overwhelm ing majority and hat it would do so again this time. Are not these people living outside our city limits members of our community? Do not they support the town? Do not they pay taxes and help to make this splendid school that we have? In the name of fair play why do not they have a voice in this election? Taxation without representation brought a revolution once. These good citizens on the outside will rebel and they will have a right to rebel if we put beer over on them against their protest. If the business men of O'Donnel have no respect for their rights, they will carry their business to other towns where their rights will be respected. Let us save the good name of our town by voting down this unfair, undemocratic, movement to bring to our town this thing that will wreck our business, create strife among our citizenship, endanger the lives of our people, and debauch our youth.


