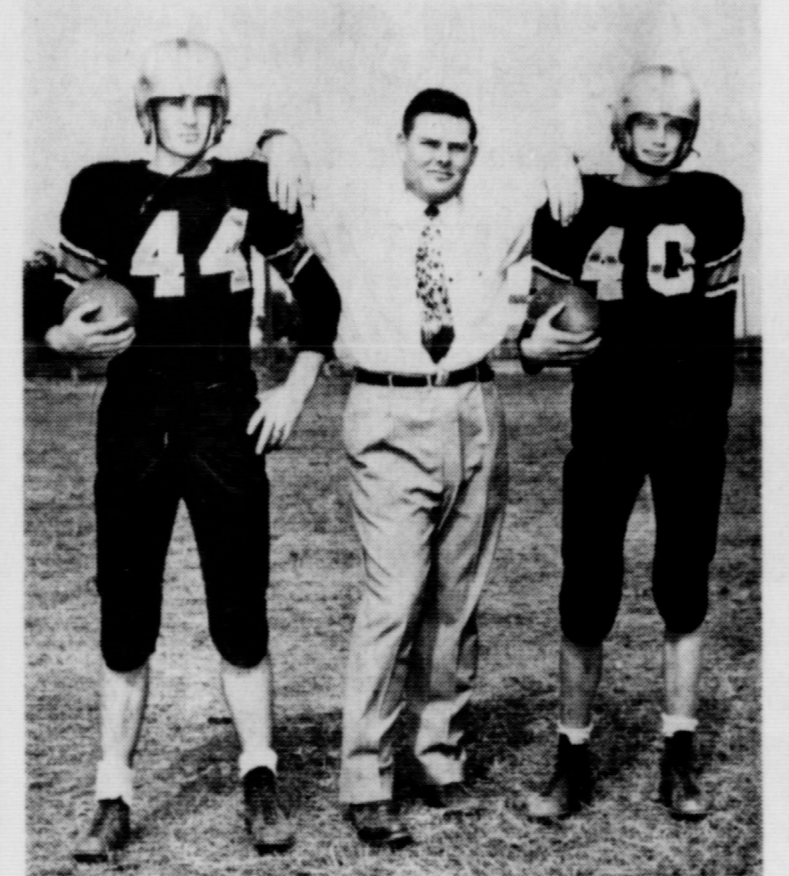
FHA CHAPTER TO ATTEND STATE FAIR

Funeral services were held Sunday at Tahoka at 1st Baptist church at 3 p m for Floyd Woodrow Walters, 34 year old resident of the Draw community who was found dead in a field near his home Friday nite, a gunshot wound in his head and a .32 caliber pistol beside the body. J. P. Server rendered an inquest verdict of death from a self inflicted gunshot wound. Only one shot had been fired from the pistol. Time of death was about 8 p m Friday.

Walters, a farmer, was born in Lynn county and lived here all his life. He had been in ill health for several years. Rev. W H Hughes of Whiteface and Rev. W H Ray of Redwine conducted the services and burial was at Draw cemetery.

ABOUT CHILD LABOR LAW

Farmers should take caution in hiring children under 16 to harvest crops during school hours unless they are the farmer's own children. Also they can only work an 18 hour week before and after school. This applies to negroes and Latins. Dep. Bairrington said the F B I were in this area checking as this is a Federal law. 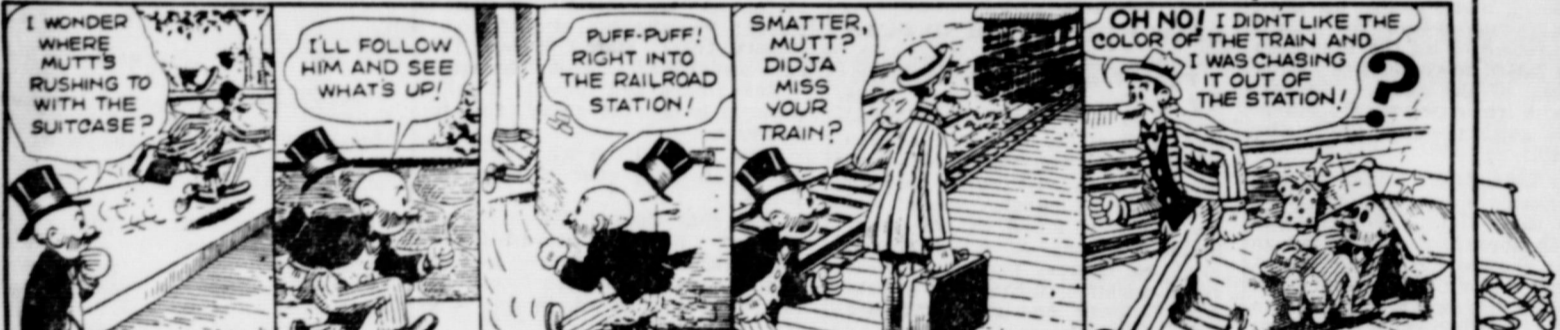

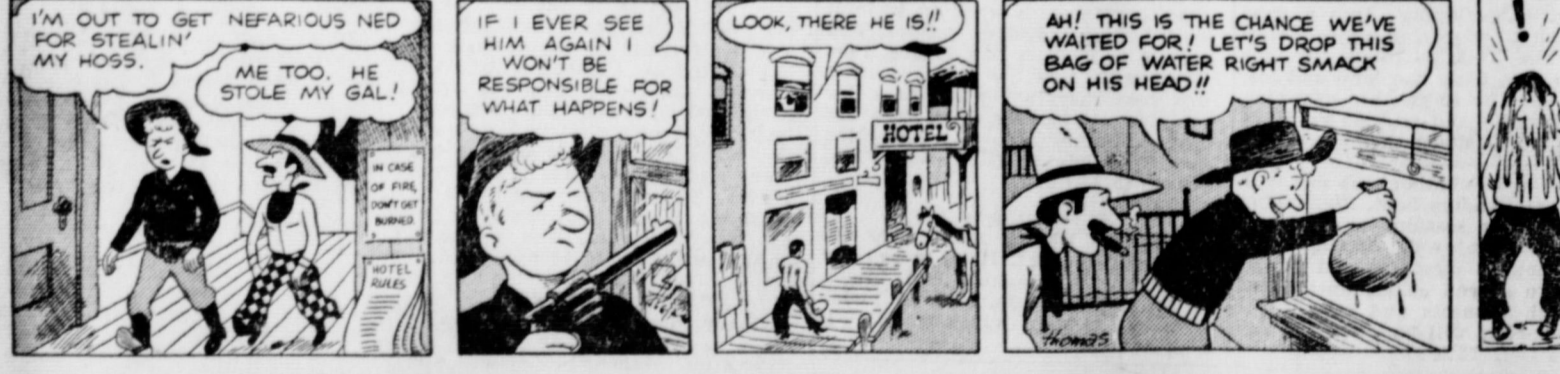

Simple Adjustments Give Longer Life to Old Clothes

By Erta Haley

AT THE BEGINNING of each new season, before they buy any clothing, smart women check over their wardrobe. Many of last year's clothes are not as hopeless as they may have thought, once they take another look at them. Worn dresses and blouses can become favorites with just a bit of simple adjustments or the addition of some interesting detail.

You don't have to be expert to give new life to clothes, either at designing or with the needle. Clever remodeling depends on study and analysis of the clothes, and after that it's usually only simple needlework to put your ideas to work.

One important thing you should realize about making over clothes: don't put work and thought on fabrics which are badly worn. Unless the material will take you through a season or several months of wear it will not be worth remodeling. You can, however, use parts of clothing which are not worn in putting new touches into other old clothes provided it's done with taste, care and proper styling. Fabrics should harmonize both in color and texture.

Holes and worn spots can be reworked; if this proves impractical, they can often be camouflaged. Some faded materials can be dyed if the fabric will take it. Some dresses are perfectly correct as to style, but they do not fit, and as such they represent a loss to you. Many times a simple adjustment will fit the dress to you beautifully and enable you to get the wear required.

Give Dresses a Complete Analysis

Start at the top of your dress and analyze it point by point before doing any remodeling. Then you'll

know exactly what needs to be done, and will have an estimate of the time, material and work necessary to making it over.

Do the shoulders look smooth and well-fitted? Bunchy tops, heavy padding and gathered sleeve tops are out of fashion. If the garment is tight around the shoulders, see if the elimination of padding and readjustment can make the garment comfortable and sleek.

Does the garment have the new sleeve styles? There are many types of sleeves at present. For daytime wear you can have a sleeve that comes an inch or so above the elbow; another kind is the three-quarter type, and still another is the slender sleeve that is bracelet length.

Is the neckline flattering and new? Necklines of dresses should fit smoothly. Collars are very dra-

matic this season, and may be used to alter the neckline.

Does the bodice fit? This should fit smoothly and easily without being too large. Remove fussy details for fashionable look.

Is the waistline right? Removing tucks or putting them in can easily adjust this. If too tight, you'll wrinkle at the waistline; if too loose, the dress hangs on you.

Is the skirt too full or long? This is common and very easily adjusted because very full skirts can be cut to moderate fullness, and shortened, thus giving you the new look.

Slender skirts on tailored and semi-tailored clothes are the style current.

Is the fabric fashionable? Luxurious fabrics are in the limelight, but many of the less luxurious ones

can be styled with velvet or velveteen, satin or taffeta.

It's Easy to Change Worn or Short Sleeves

If you have a long sleeved dress that is worn at the elbows, shorten the sleeves to an inch or two above the elbow. Use the dress material or a luxurious contrasting material for cuffs. Plan to use contrasting material on collar, belt or pockets also.

Sleeves too full at the shoulder should be ripped at the seams and then cut according to a new pattern to give a smooth, neat look.

For torn or worn sleeves, you can add inset bands of rayon faille, taffeta, lace or velveteen in crosswise fashion.

Contrasting yoke and sleeves may be added to the dress if the sleeves are worn or torn. It's usually difficult to find matching material, but a good contrast in both fabric and color is sound fashion sense.

Here are Remedies For Dress Bodice

There are three good treatments for the too tight bodice. With today's styles you can use any of them effectively. One is a feminine way in which you open the dress down the center front and add a flattering dickey, either made or purchased, which will give you extra width and a new freshness.

Another treatment is more radical, but very flattering, especially if the dress is for a teen-ager. It consists of removing the front and back of the dress, but saving the sleeves. Then make a new bodice

and back and stitch to skirt and sleeves.

If the dress is plain velveteen you can add a plaid in wool or velveteen for the new portion. If plaid, use plain velveteen.

A third way to remedy the bodice is the addition of a contrasting yoke to the dress.

If you're just tired of the bodice, make a new top for the dress of contrasting material; or, add some interesting fasteners. Another solution is to make the dress into a jumper to wear with a pretty blouse.

When bodices are worn or torn, they may carry applied pockets to hide worn spots. You may also add contrasting band trimmings or braids, popular right now, to increase the wearing qualities or to camouflage worn spots.

Shorten or Lengthen Skirts as Necessary

It's doubtful that last season's skirts will be too short for use now, because most of them were the same length as now being used. If you have older skirts which were too short, you can trim the hem with rows of ribbon, a wide contrasting piece of plaid to match the wool or taffeta of the dress.

Cummerbunds are an excellent skirt lengthener. This is a wide contrasting piece of fabric draped about the waist, and is very dramatic as a decorative detail, especially if you're tall.

Skirts which are too long can be cut down to the proper length without much difficulty. Make certain, however, that the hem is even.



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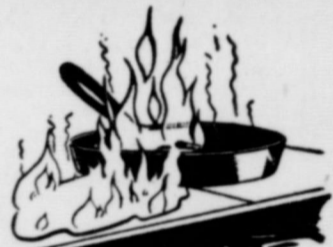

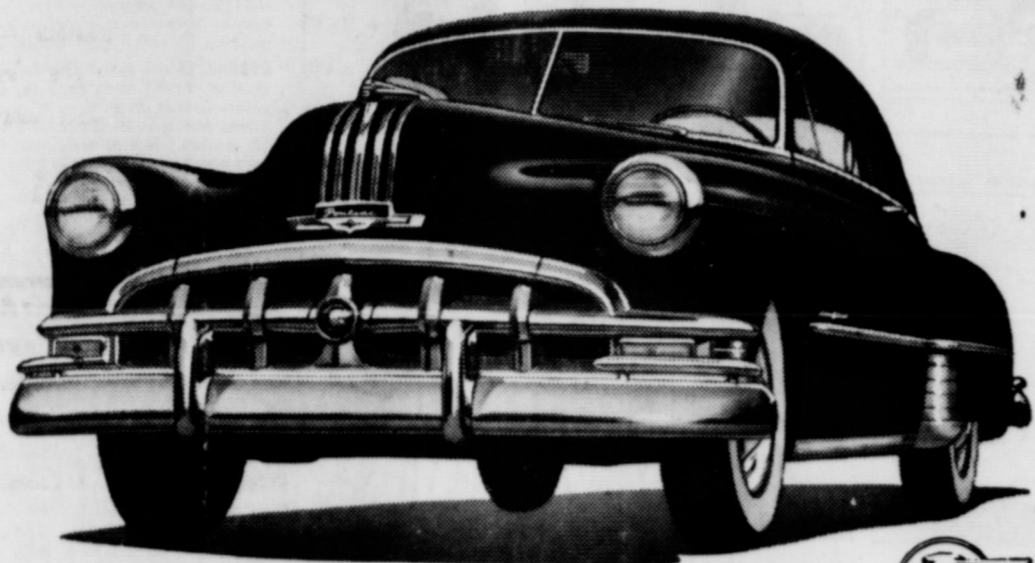

Transform Prosaic Kitchen Windows With New Curtains

RECENT YEARS have seen the addition of many time-saving appliances to the kitchen, and much has been done to kitchen decor to save it from the sanitary, all-white look which was once popular.

Soft decorator colors are being used in kitchens. Wallpapers of distinction, too, have added a lot of interesting color and pattern to the kitchen.

The time is past when we think of kitchens being correct only in ruffled net curtains. Almost any fabric may now be used, as long as it's in harmony with the kitchen. Every kitchen can be curtained with style and color suited to its own individuality.

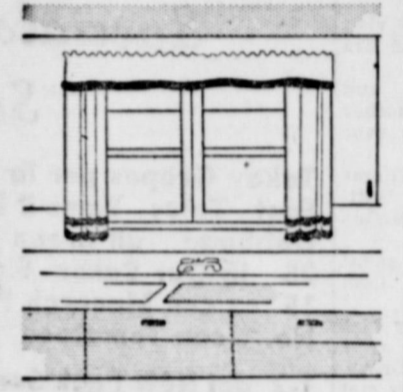
Most of us know how much attractive draperies can lend to any room, but have you ever thought of how much the right style of curtain can do for your kitchen? The answer is, just as much as it does for any other room.

Kitchen window decor, unlike other rooms, can be very inexpensive because the windows are usually smaller, and materials can be in the budget class.

Resolve now to do something about kitchen windows. It'll lend a lot of cheer to a room which so easily becomes only a cold, efficient laboratory.

Use Organdie to Get Crisp, Airy Effects

Fine, sheer permanent finish organdie, dotted Swiss or extra fine muslins and marquisettes will give

the kitchen a crisp and airy look. With ruffles and dainty tie-backs, curtains such as these can make windows extremely interesting.

Though these materials are usually found in white, there are many ways of adding color to them when used for curtains. You may emphasize the color notes in the kitchen by edging the ruffles in immaculate white curtains in brightly colored rick-rack, binding or washable ribbon.

For the average sized window, use a 5-inch ruffle of double fullness with a 3/4-inch heading. If you are binding the curtains, use bias tape for easy sewing. The narrow tape is best, not more than 1/4-inch wide. You may bind both edges of the ruffle, and it will look twice as pretty as with one edge bound.

Ruffling and edgings are sold by the yard, and many of these may be used to dress up plain curtains. These edgings are usually sold for bedroom curtains, but they can be used effectively in the kitchen, especially if you will apply some colored stitching to them, the color to match the scheme in the kitchen.

Mother-Daughter



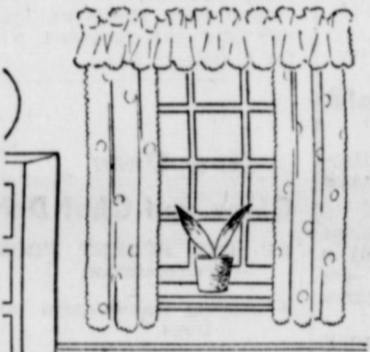

Interesting Tie-Backs Add Charm to Any Curtain

Distinctive tie-backs, designed and sewed by you, and added to ordinary curtains will lift them into their own high class. Cut flowers or fruit from patterned chintz, line them and stuff with cotton. They are then sewed on a band to make the tie-back.

Keep tie-backs fairly short in order to hold the curtain securely in a nice, full fold. Twelve inches is a good length for most tie-backs unless the windows are much smaller than average. Sew brass rings on the ends of the bands and fasten in place on the window casing with cup hooks or thumb tacks.

Tie-backs should be placed between two and six inches below the



or printed edges on kitchen curtains.

half-way point to look best. Try several different placings to see which look the best.

Make Straight Hung Curtains In Soft Materials

If you like the soft appearance of straight hung curtains, then choose soft materials such as voile, dimity, fine muslin, percale, chintz, gingham, poplin, broadcloth, dotted Swiss or scrim. These are excellent

when chosen in a color that is proper to the kitchen. This type may be used with or without a valance.

Straight hung curtains should be made very full to add a luxurious note to the windows. Then, too, when full, they may be drawn or pushed back to the sides.

All kinds of trimmings may be used on straight hung curtains to add more interest. For example, cotton voile is very charming with an inset band of eyelet embroidery. The valance, too, has the eyelet band.

To apply the eyelet band, turn and press to the right side of the material a 2-inch hem along the front edge and bottom of the curtain. Mitre the corners. Since the raw edges are to be covered with the band trim, press only a single turn. Sew on the band (1 1/2 inches wide) covering only 1/4 inch of the raw edge. Treat the bottom of the valance in the same way.

Along the untrimmed edges of the curtain and ends of the valance, press and stitch in a 1-inch double hem. At the top of the curtains and valance, put in a 2 1/2-inch double hem for rod and heading.

Braids, edgings and the various peasant trimmings are as pleasing and effective as the eyelet band just described. If you put them to the inside of the hem of the curtain, rather than at the edge, they are much more effective.

Plaid Paper Kitchens Can Have Matching Windows

Are you one of the many who has her kitchen done at least part-

ly in plaid wallpaper? If one wall or part of the walls of the kitchen are treated in this way, the kitchen gains a lot of distinction if it has matching plaid curtains.

No, you probably can't buy plaid curtains to match, but they can be made very easily by applying colored bands which match the colors in the plaid paper, to curtains with the same background as the wallpaper.

If the background of the paper is white, then use white muslin. Buy material or bias tape which matches the colors of the paper plaid exactly, and cut the bands to the same size used in the paper. Space them exactly as is done on the paper—you can use your ruler to find out just how they are placed and draw in lines where the bands are to be stitched.

The most prominent color in the plaid can be used as a 1 1/2-inch facing on the front and bottom edge of the curtain, and the same color is used in the valance. This treatment will frame the plaid curtain to best effect, because it separates it from the duplicate wallpaper.

For the all-white kitchens with colored borders of ivy and other flowers, effective curtains can be made very simply by using white at the windows, with ivy or flowers to match the kitchen decor cut from printed chintz and sewed to them, an inch or two from the edge. If you have flowered chintz draperies in breakfast or dining room, these can be carried into the kitchen curtains for trimming, thus tying the rooms together very nicely.

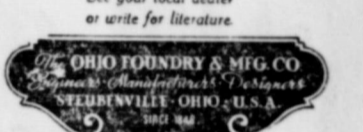
