

Local Teachers Asked To Attend Meeting

Labbock, May 5.—Local officials of the Texas State Teachers Association have issued a call for a regional rally, to be held at the Labbock Senior High School from 10:30 a. m. next Saturday, May 6, M. Duncan, superintendent of the public schools has announced.

Dr. J. T. Hutchinson, president of the Labbock school board, will preside. President Bradford Knapp of the Texas Technological College, and Garrard, member of the State Board of Education, Hon. W. H. Blood, secretary of the State Board of Education, Hon. W. B. Collins, president of the Lamesa school board and others will appear on the program as speakers.

Object of the meeting is to adopt resolutions and to otherwise take action to petition the Texas Legislature to provide adequate revenues to enable the public schools to get a \$250 per capita apportionment for each school year. Duncan has announced.

All school people in the South Plains section interested in public school finance are invited to the meeting. Duncan said. This is one of 24 meetings being held in various sections of Texas under the sponsorship of the Texas State Teachers Association.

After the set program, which will last about an hour, discussion of financial problems will be open to anyone attending it will be held.

County Vital Statistics Show Birth Increase

Reports issued recently from the Texas vital statistics show that the county's population has increased by 244, or six more births recorded than in 1931 when only 238 were placed on record.

As has been previously published in the Index the number of births far exceeded deaths, there being only 42 to the county for the year.

These statements were issued as a part of the campaign for more careful recording of vital statistics so that Texas may be included in the Federal registration area.

Cards were mailed out from Washington last week to box holders throughout the state with the request that they be filled out and returned to be used as a guide in determining whether or not the state could qualify for this. We understand that this request met with gratifying response in this territory, all three carriers reporting almost 100 per cent response from their routes.

Enrollment Begun In Reforestation Work

B. P. Maddox of Tahoka, chairman of the Lynn County Employment Relief Committee, announced Monday that application blanks have been received, and that applications will be received for enrollment in the Emergency Conservation Work in forestry and other outdoor projects.

These applications are being taken this week at both O'Donnell and Tahoka. Mayor W. S. Cathy is taking these applications approved here will be submitted to the army recruiting station at Lubbock for physical examination. Those accepted will then go to Ft. Sill at Lawton, Oklahoma, for two weeks training, and then into actual conservation work. The boys are cared for by the government as soon as the examination is passed, their meals, clothing, shelter, medical care, and other things being at the expense of the Government. An enrollment for six months is necessary but if an emergency should arise and any boy be needed at home, he will receive either a leave of absence or an honorable discharge.

The working week will be five days, eight hours, and the boys will receive one dollar per day and their living expenses. Care and medical attention, just as regular soldiers do.

This, however, is the only resemblance to the regular army. Those young men accepted for the peace-time army will not carry GUNS OR OTHER WEAPONS. THEY WILL NOT BE SHOT AT, and they will not be abused or imposed on. They are not connected with the U. S. Army in any way. They will be asked to give forty hours honest labor each week in exchange for the payment listed above, with the opportunity of spending six months in the hunting and fishing grounds of the nation. There will be certain rules and regulations under which they will be expected to conduct themselves. However, continuous and flagrant disobedience to these regulations will not be punished other than by a discharge.

When the period of service is ended, the Government sends him back to the recruiting station, unless the boy's home is nearer his camp than the station. In other words, if a boy enlists at Lubbock, unless his family moves, during his service, to a point nearer his camp.

**Strawberries Arrive in Quantity;
Jam and Jelly Making Get Under Way**



It's a short step from strawberries in the box to strawberry jelly in the glass, if modern methods are used.

EXTRA—a—awberries! Nice, fresh, stra—awberries! Once more the huckster's cry echoes through the town heralding the approach of Summer and the promise of the earth fulfilled. Strawberries are here again, large, ripe and delicious even to look upon. They're crowding the counters of the local stores, overflowing their baskets in the fruit dealers' stalls, and riding the street vendors' wagons like triumphant hosts.

Good news for housewives who have been waiting, with preserving kettles in readiness, for the first fruit of the season to convert into jams and jellies. They know that fruit, in some form, should be included twice a day in the family diet and that this is a hard condition to meet in Winter when prices are prohibitive. For that reason they put up adequate stocks of preserved fruits during the Summer when fresh fruits are plentiful and inexpensive.

Right now berries are as cheap as they are likely to be at any time of the season. And experience has taught women to start on their jam shipments early if they want to secure an adequate supply of spreads and garnishes for all year. Winter table requirements are most women nowadays use the shortest method of jam and jelly making, here are some recipes which embrace this popular way of "putting up" fruits.

Strawberry Jelly
4 cups (2 lbs.) juice
7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin
To prepare juice, crush thoroughly or grind about 3 quarts fully ripe berries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and add fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove from fire, skim over quickly. Paraffin at once and cover. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

Sliced Strawberry Jam
4 1/2 cups (2 lbs.) preserved fruit
3 cups (1 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin
To prepare fruit, cut about 3 quarts fully ripe berries in halves lengthwise; large berries in quarters. Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, mix well and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 3 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 1 minute to cool slightly. Paraffin coating liquid. Pour quickly. Paraffin at once and cover. Makes about 10 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).
