Cancer Killer That Spares Life Sought

BERKELEY, Calif.—What would be the ideal chemical to kill cancer cells and at the same time leave normal tissues of the body unharmed?
 A new approach to this difficult question will be undertaken by a team of scientists in the University of California School of Medicine, San Francisco, with the aid of a \$10,000 grant from the Damon Runyon Fund.
 At the present time the trial and error method usually guides the search for cancer-fighting chemicals. Chemicals are made in the laboratory, then tried on cancerous mice. If they have some effect on cancer, they are then tried on human patients.
 There are at present two chief classes of cancer-fighting chemicals.

In each case the chemicals that inhibit cancer growth so far tried have not been able to make a sharp enough distinction between cancer cells and normal cells.
 The scientists will study the basic chemical reactions that take place between the chemicals and both cancer and normal tissue.
 Their goal is to learn enough about the reactions to be able to write specifications for chemicals that would carry out the desired inhibiting reactions with cancer cells but not with normal cells.

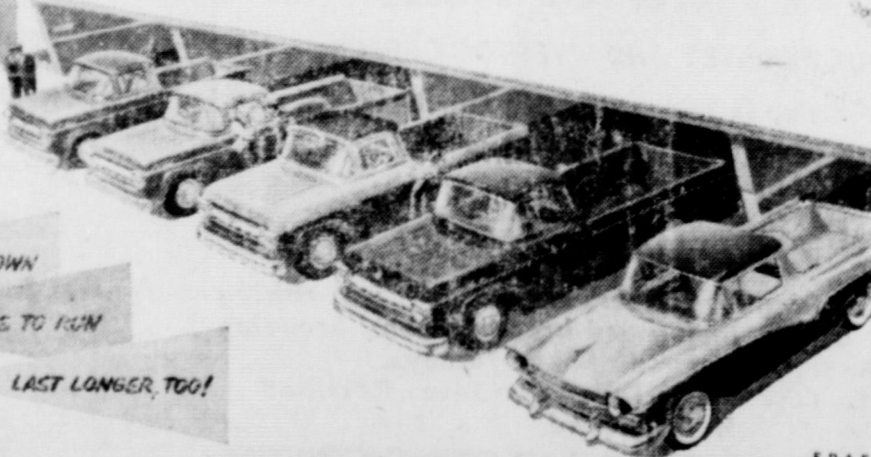

and make possible better water distribution on the farm.

Recently made field observations have shown that the use of some insecticides directly on the skin of poultry is causing severe skin burning and discoloration. Chlorinated hydrocarbons are not recommended for direct application.

A systemic insecticide, Thimet, was used last year by a number of Texas farmers to treat cotton planting seed for early season insect control. Research showed that protection against aphids, thrips, spider mites and leaf miners was obtained for periods of 4 to 6 weeks and that the seed treatment will replace the first two early season spray applications. It was not effective against overwintered bollweevils.

Extension dairy husbandmen say it is not too early to start a fly control program. Good damage around the dairy barns and hauling manure to the fields on a regular basis are two practices which will eliminate fly breeding habitats.

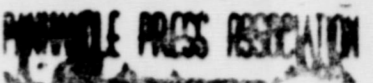

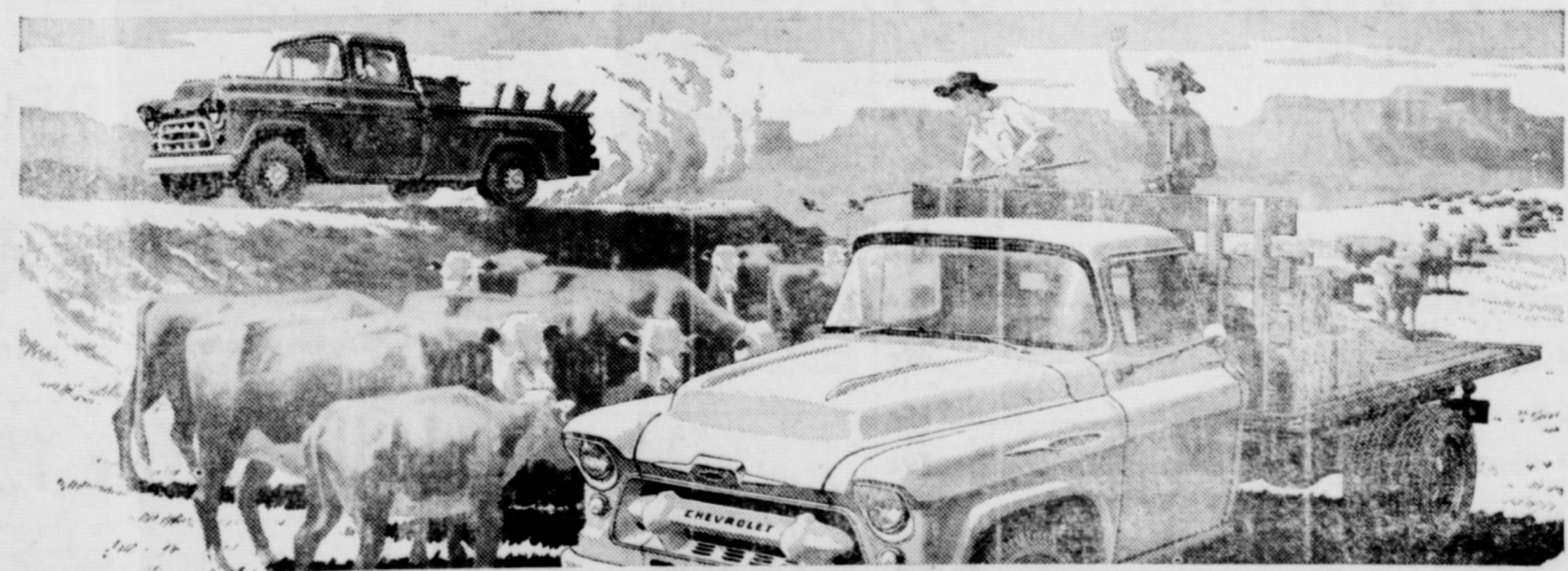
