New Electric Sub-Station To Be Built

According to James T. Crumley local manager of the Texas Electric Service Co., a new Sub-Station is being constructed and is expected to be in operation within the next two weeks. Mr. Crumley says that the Sub station will have sufficient capacity to serve the entire town should an emergency arise. Other wise about one half of the town will be served by each substation. Texas Electric Service Company is constructing a new power plant at Wink with one unit of 25,000 KVA already in service with an additional 25,000 KVA unit to be in operation soon. Texas Electric Service is spending enormous sums of money to provide a more dependable, economical light and power service for the people of O'Donnell and West Texas.

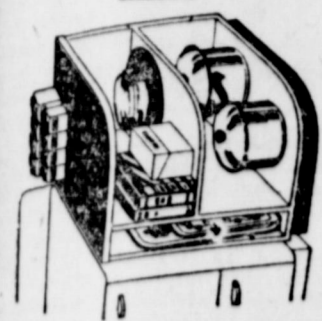

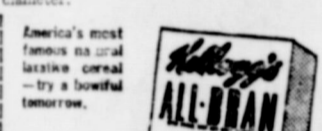

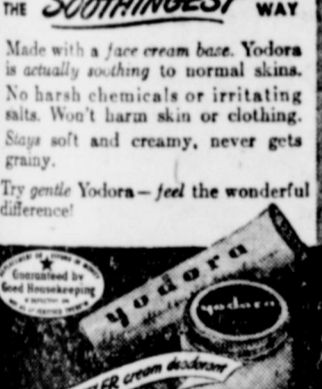

Then comes the matinee when Charley don't show. His seat's empty and Jake is gettin' nervous and the fellows are saying like they always do. "Don't worry, he'll be here." But he don't come, and the buzzer sounds. . . . and Jake makes me come up and take Charley's place. He looks down at me like he's sore and he says, "You'll do the solo. Get it?"

So I'm stuck with it. And I tell myself, all right, you got to. You ain't going to be a rabbit all your life. Think of Vingie. And remember, Marge is out there.

I ain't begun to twitch because I got my lips held so tight they're moving my teeth back into my mouth.

I KNOW the part all right. I always know all the parts. And I can play 'em like a million dollars at home. I can even play 'em for Marge. It's the audience that gets me. All them eyes.

Okay, I tell myself, you do it this time, or you're through. And I mean through.

My time comes and I stand up. I start lifting my sax. I'm not twitching. . . . But my lips has frozen solid over my teeth. I try, and get out of breath and my chest collapses. But my sax is up. The cue comes.

And the sweetest music I ever heard comes floating in from the wings.

I look quick sideways. Charley's

out there. Charley's playin' his piece.

I stand there and go through the motions.

First thing I know I find myself lookin' down at that audience.

You know, it's funny, but that's the first time I ever saw the people in an audience. It ain't an octopus any more. It's fellows and girls and women that look like the woman that runs the restaurant where I eat, or the one who sits across the way on the bus.

And what do you think I see. Why, right there in the front row is Vingie. With a grin all the way across her little pink face. And clear in the back is Marge, and she's watchin' me so hard her eyes are round and shiny.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When jelly or jam scorches, put into a clean kettle, add a cut-up raw potato and continue cooking. The potato will absorb the burned taste.

Use leftover duck in a rice or macaroni salad with celery and sweet pickle relish; serve on lots of shredded salad greens.

Crop Roots Require Oxygen and Water

Organic Matter Decay Helps Soil to 'Breathe'

Soils must "breathe" deeply if crop roots are to support high yields above the ground. These roots need oxygen to grow and reach out for water plant nutrients.

To breathe deeply, soils must have regular additions of organic matter. Without organic matter soils tighten up. Soil particles are jammed together. The soil becomes a compacted mass. There is little room for either air or water. Roots find it hard to forage in the tight soil.

When organic matter is added, it opens the soil for air and water to soak in deeply. As it rots the organic matter builds soil structure. The humus formed from organic matter swells and shrinks with wetting and drying. Compounds that form when organic matter decays help to stick these mineral particles together in small groups so that the soil is loose and workable.

Organic matter should be added deep in the soil as well as in the plow layer. Middle West Soil Improvement committee points out that the best way to drive organic matter down deep is through use



of tap-rooted legumes, such as alfalfa or sweet clover, regularly in the rotation. The roots of these legumes drill down 18 to 25 inches below the plow layer.

Heavy stands of legumes also can be secured by liming according to soil tests, and by making sure soils are well stocked with phosphate and potash for full production. When a good top growth is plowed under to go with the roots, these legumes will build the structure tilth soil needs for high yields.

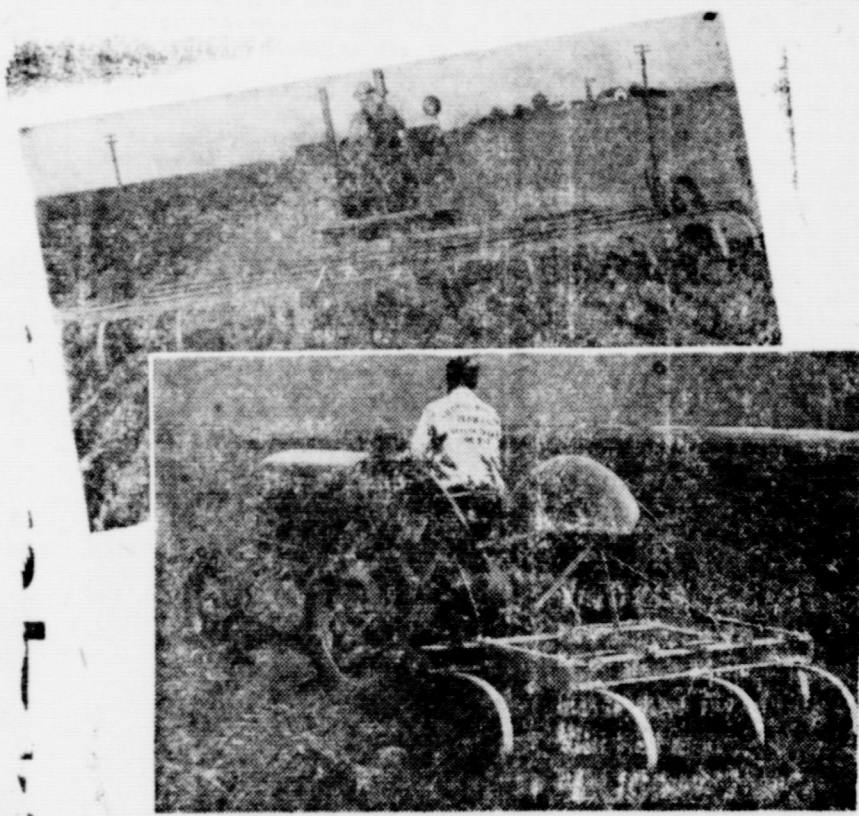

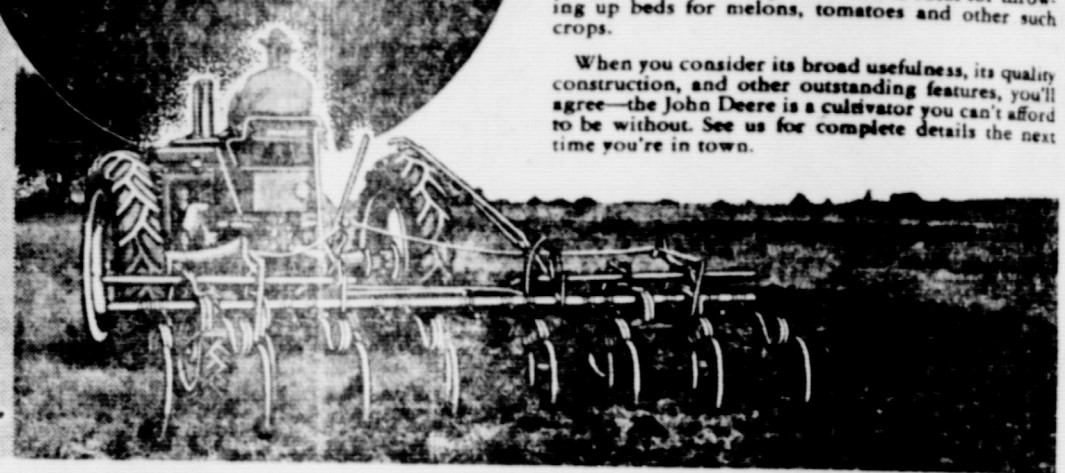

That Bogota Affair
 The bloody uprising which almost
 wrecked the Inter-American Confer-
 ence at Bogota recently was headlined
 in the American press. Most observ-
 ers thought it was just another South
 American political upheaval. Yet, when
 the smoke of pillaging, the looting, and
 the dynamiting had ceased, it was evi-
 dent that this rebellion had something
 different. The new ingredient was the
 amazing precision of timing and the
 speed with which the events moved.

When American newspaper men who
 were in Bogota had time to think about
 it, they discovered that this "revolu-
 tion" was pulled off with the same
 practiced techniques that European
 Communists have been known to use.
 It was also discovered, after the haze
 cleared, that our own State Depart-
 ment, including our Bogota foreign of-
 fice, had received warnings out of Chile
 that something was afoot. Yet, nothing
 prevented the uprising.

"Mass" Action
 First a liberal party leader was shot
 down on the street under circumstances
 that indicate the Communists may
 have killed one of their own, just to
 get things started. The assassin was
 stomped to death and mutilated so that
 identification was impossible. After
 that, just like clock-work, mobs in
 widely scattered areas got busy. They
 grabbed radio stations and asked the
 "masses" to go forward to the attack.

The Communists then really took to
 their soap-boxes. They openly identi-
 fied themselves as Communists and
 called for comrades to raid any place
 that might have weapons. Other mobs
 attacked public buildings, including the
 famed Capitol where the Inter-Ameri-
 can Conference was being held. Yet
 another mob dragged the assassin's
 corpse to the Colombian president's
 mansion, where it was flung across the
 doorstep for the rest of the afternoon.

Lawless Fanaticism
 What happened to the police? They
 had disappeared. Nor did the army
 show up. The mob, therefore, went
 about freely burning automobiles and
 wrecking buildings. Though the army
 was said to be critically short of gaso-
 line, yet plenty was available for the
 gangs. Plenty of dynamite also. While
 these things were happening in Bo-
 gota, key centers elsewhere were being
 burned and pillaged in the same man-
 ner.
 Why am I recounting all this? I
 want to demonstrate that Communism
 is not a law-abiding political party. It
 is a lawless fanaticism. We have had
 a demonstration right here in this
 hemisphere which shows the type of
 terrorism and force Communists use
 to gain political power. What Commu-
 nists have done in Russia and in
 European riots and uprisings, they
 will do again wherever they can, in
 whatever countries they find sleeping
 on the job.

Herd and Flocks

All night lights help to prevent stampeding of turkeys on range.

Blackhead of turkeys causes heavy losses. Phenothiazine powder mixed in the mash at the rate of one ounce daily for 100 birds, has been found effective in preventing losses, because it destroys recalcitrant worms which are carriers of the blackhead organisms.

To make lambs tick proof, spray them with DDT. Mix one pound of a 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 25 gallons of water and apply it to the back, belly, sides and around neck and ears. One application should last for two or three weeks.

Two essentials for livestock and poultry in late summer are shade and water.

DDT Proves Effective On Peach Tree Borer

DDT, when used as a trunk spray, will control the peach tree borer, according to the New York State agricultural experiment station. The new method of borer control takes the place of older methods using ethylene dichloride of PDB crystals, since it is non-injurious, labor-saving, time-saving and inexpensive. DDT is used at the rate of two pounds to each 100 gallons of water.

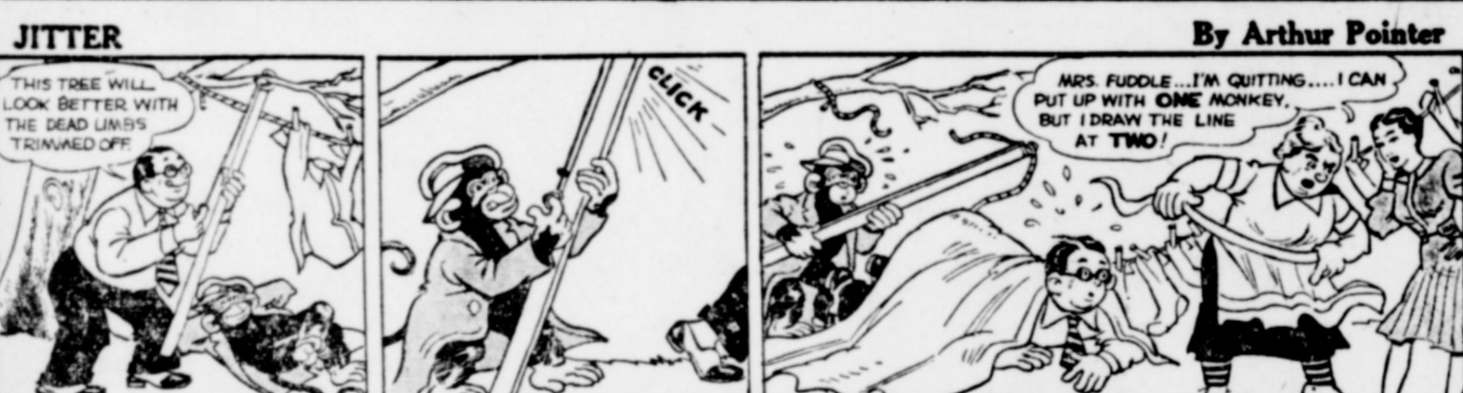

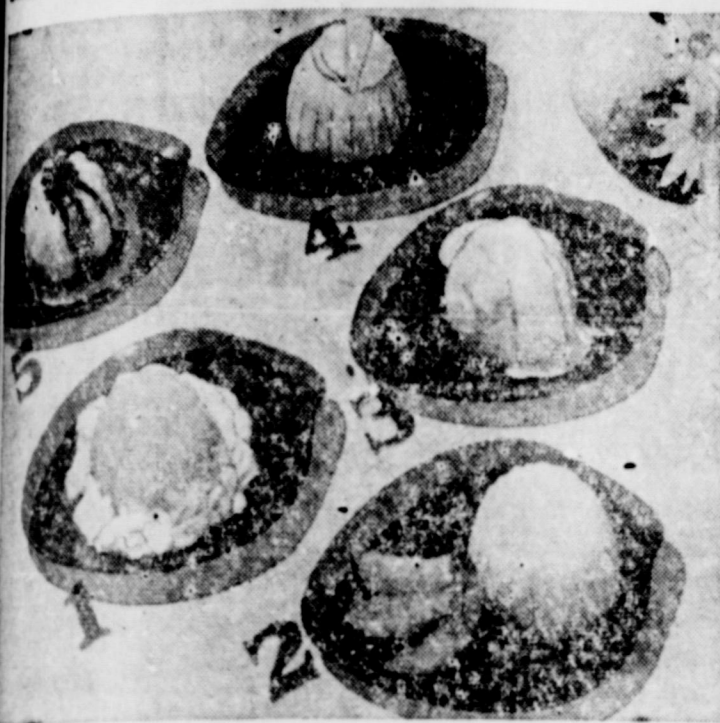

Varying Basic Recipes Assures Interesting Meals
(See recipes below)

Basic Recipes

"IS THERE any simple way to learn how to be a good cook?" asks a young woman now starting out to keep house. Older homemakers have asked me the same question just as often, so the problem seems to be a common one.

The answer is simply yes. The method is to learn certain basic food preparations, then to vary these, and you certainly will have a good storehouse from which to select for meals of all kinds—for family and for guests.

The idea is to learn the basic recipe so well that it becomes as much a part of you as any simple habit. You'll memorize the ingredients if you repeat the recipe often enough, and the method is even easier to learn.

Then it's no trick at all to make an infinite variety of variations of the basic recipe.

Once you have learned a recipe in this way, you'll always remember it, no matter how rushed you are or in whose kitchen you are making it. You will have arrived at perfection once you polish the technique of making it, and that is true satisfaction.

Perhaps you've heard that Mrs. Jones is the muffin maker of the community, especially because of her orange muffins. You can become famous for any one of several of your recipes just by learning to follow basic recipes, and trying out their variations.

HERE ARE SEVERAL good basic recipes with their appropriate variations which can form a good backbone to your collection:

Plain Muffins
(Makes about 14)
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
4 tablespoons melted shortening or salad oil

Sift together dry ingredients. Combine all remaining ingredients. Add all at once to flour mixture, stirring, not beating, quickly and vigorously until just mixed but still lumpy in appearance so that muffins will have good texture. Fill greased or oiled muffin pans, one-half full, and bake in a hot (425-degree) oven about 25 minutes.

WHOLE WHEAT MUFFINS: Use above recipe, reducing flour to one-quarter cup, adding one cup unbleached whole wheat flour. Increase sugar to four tablespoons and use four teaspoons baking powder. Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven for 35 minutes.

NUT MUFFINS: Use plain muffin recipe, adding one cup finely chopped nuts to other ingredients.

ORANGE MUFFINS: Use plain muffins, increasing sugar to four tablespoons, reducing milk to three-quarter cup, and adding one-quarter cup orange juice and one-quarter cup grated orange rind.

CHEESE MUFFINS: Add one cup grated American cheese, lightly packed, to dry ingredients.

BLUEBERRY MUFFINS: Mix three-quarter cup of fresh blue-

Coarsely grated potatoes may be mixed with chopped onion and hamburger, skillet fried, to give you meat and potatoes all in one quick-to-fix dish.
Beef or calves' liver dipped in french dressing and bread crumbs is pan fried for just a few minutes to get done. Add some canned sweet potatoes heated in a dusting of brown sugar and butter in a skillet for the accompaniment.

berries or thawed, frozen blueberries in plain muffin batter.

A SIMPLE DISH like macaroni and cheese has several good variations that you can use frequently. Here, again, when you learn how to make the dish to perfection, you can be certain to enjoy the food no matter what variation you use.

Macaroni and Cheese

- (Serves 6)
- 1 8-ounce package macaroni
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups milk
- 1 1/2 cups grated American cheese

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Melt butter in top of double boiler, blend in flour and seasonings, then add milk and cook until thick. Add grated cheese and stir until melted. Combine sauce and macaroni and turn into a greased casserole. Bake in a moderately hot (400-degree) oven until golden brown, about 20 minutes.

HAM AND MACARONI: Take one-third package macaroni, place in casserole, top with thin slices of leftover ham, sprinkle with a little dry mustard, dot with butter and pour some of sauce on top of that. Repeat with layer of cheese, ham and sauce twice. Bake as above.

MACARONI WITH MEAT: Use basic recipe, with one cup slivered tongue, chicken or corned beef in layers.

***BAKED TOMATO MACARONI:** Arrange three skinned, thinly sliced tomatoes in layers with macaroni and cheese sauce in casserole.

MACARONI WITH CHIPPED BEEF: Shred one-quarter pound of dried beef and cover with hot water; let stand 10 minutes. Arrange beef on macaroni layers. Use cheese sauce on top.

Scrambled Eggs
(Serves 4)

- 2 tablespoons fat
- 6 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Pepper
- 1/2 cup rich milk or cream

Melt butter in skillet; beat eggs and add remaining ingredients. Cook slowly, stirring gently until mixture sets. Serve with ham, sausages or bacon.

WITH CHEESE: Make scrambled eggs, adding one-half cup of grated cheese with two teaspoons minced onion before cooking.

WITH MEAT: Use recipe for scrambled eggs, adding one-half cup of diced ham or tongue, shredded dried beef or chicken before cooking.

Bake popovers while you heat some creamed chipped beef on top of the stove. Split the popovers and serve with the creamed beef.

Sliced leftover roast heated in gravy extended with tomato sauce is excellent when placed over piping hot noodles.

Lamb stew takes on a different character when you add two cups of canned tomatoes in place of the water. A clove of garlic, placed on a toothpick so that it's easy to remove when cooking is finished, adds a touch of delicious flavor.

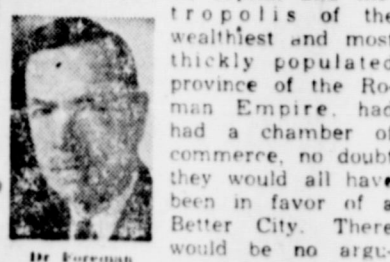

DEVOTIONAL READING: Romans 13:1-10

For a Better City

Lesson for September 19, 1948

"FOR A BETTER CITY" is a good slogan. No one would think of objecting to it. If the great city of Ephesus, capital and metropolis of the wealthiest and most thickly populated province of the Roman Empire, had had a chamber of commerce, no doubt they would all have been in favor of a Better City. There would be no argument about that. The question is: What makes a city better? Four different ideas on that line—two very bad ones and two good ones—can be seen in the story of Acts 19.



You should read the story itself before looking over these comments. Because we are beginning toward the end of the story, with the very lowest and silliest of the four ideas how to make a city better. It is a very simple idea. Just "holler," yell, make a demonstration. Make it long, make it loud, and the city will be the better for it. For two mortal hours that absurd mass-meeting kept the uproar going: "Great is Diana of the Ephesians!"

A curious thing, the mob-mind. If something is true, how can noise make it truer? If a thing is a lie, how can all the shouting in the world make it respectable? But the mob-mind thinks that if a thing is said loudly enough and by enough people, it is bound to be true. So that theater-full of fools wasted a good afternoon shouting a lie into the deaf blue heavens. It did Diana no good. She was as dead as Marley's ghost, she had never lived, in fact. It was no use drumming up the decibels. Do you know people who think they can make your town better by shouting about it? It won't work. You can make a town or county famous if you shout long enough; but you won't make it better.

Making Money
THE SILVERSMITHS there in Ephesus had another theory. The way they looked at it, the big thing is money. They used to make money selling their little silver shrines. Now this fellow Paul had come along, persuading people that hand-made gods are no gods at all, and the trade in "sacred" trinkets had fallen off. It looked like a bad year for the silversmiths. To make things better, they decided, they needed more money. More business! More production! The fact that what they produced was not only worthless but actually harmful, did not seem to bother them. Do you know people like that today?

Abiding by the Law
THE TOWN CLERK of Ephesus had a simple idea, vastly better than these other two. He saw no sense in the mass meeting, he seems not to have been taken in by the silversmiths' crocodile tears. If anything was wrong in Ephesus, he said, the courts were open, and trials were open, and trials could be held. We have laws—let us live by them; that was the gist of his idea. That is not bad advice.

All honor to the honest servants of the public who now as then give their best efforts to seeing that good laws are made and well enforced.

Changing Lives
SPEAKING OF LAWS, there are three kinds of people in the world. One kind will not obey the laws whatever they are. These are the criminal classes. A second kind stay "inside the law" but they never advance a step beyond them. A third kind, too rare, will go far beyond the law's requirements in personal living and in social helpfulness.

Now Paul had been in the city of Ephesus for some months, and he had nothing to do with the laws of that city. Yet what he was doing was more effective in making that city better than anything the courts could have done.

For what he was doing was nothing less than changing lives. "The trouble with people is that they're people," and the business of Christianity first of all is changing people. It is no use hanging out the slogan "For a Better City" unless you are working for better people.

A tree is no healthier than its roots, and a community's roots are the characters of her people. And from St. Paul's day to this, the one and only organization which sets out to change people from the inside, is the Christian church.

Korea's Isle of Amazons Lives on Ocean Harvest

As shallow-sea divers for pearls, shellfish, edible seaweed, and various items of commerce, women of Oriental coasts for centuries have outdone the men.

Those of Cheju, 50 miles off Korea's southern tip, have been notably adept. An estimated 10,000 today live by harvesting ocean acres, while their men in some cases tend the children and prepare the meals, notes the National Geographic society.

From this feminine monopoly has grown the tradition of Cheju as an Amazon isle. It took positive form in the West about 1860 when a traveler brought back the tale that the island until 1850 had been populated solely by women and young children in storied Amazon style.

In the 1948 census, Cheju counted 270,148 inhabitants, virtually all on the coasts of the 45-by-20-mile oval of land. There were 113 women to each 100 men on Cheju in 1946, whereas on the Korean mainland men outnumbered women.

Cheju port on the north coast is the island's capital and chief center, counting 23,000 inhabitants. They live largely in crude, thatched-roof huts of mud and stone. Ancient walls to defend against pirate attack still stand along the shore.

Life of Samuel Colt

After being expelled from America, Samuel Colt was sent to sea. The ship's paddle wheel gave him an idea for the revolving pistol cylinder. At the age of 14 he whittled out a model and it worked. Later he quit his father's dye plant to seek his fortune as "Dr. Colt". In 1832 he sent his plan of a gun to the U. S. patent office, and was awarded a patent in 1836. After the original company failed, Colt invented the submarine "mine", while still in his twenties. He died wealthy at the age of 48.

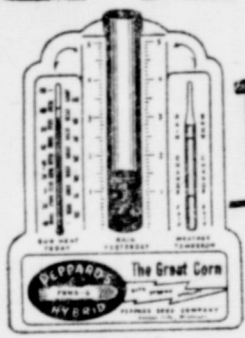
