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City Bond Election Saturday

Following are some facts and also questions and answers on the bond election of the City to be held here Saturday at City Tax Office —

What is the purpose of this bond issue?

Ans. The bond will be used for water, streets and fire equipment. What is the \$59,000 refunding bonds proposed?

Ans. The \$59,000 is the outstanding debt against the present Total Bond Issue — \$179,000.00 Refunding \$59,000 at 4 percent. \$111,000 — new monies — both total above \$170,000

How will the \$111,000 be spent? 6 in. pipe line, 13,720 feet \$33,000.00 To equip 3 wells \$15,000.00 Booster station, chlorinator, controls 21,500.00 200,000 gal. reservoir 15,000.00 Engineering, misc. 12,700.00

Right of way, drilling, testing, agent fee for refunding \$10,300.00 Total \$111,000.00

1. Will the project furnish an adequate water supply until the Canadian water arrives? Ans. — Yes. Facilities will be designed to furnish 260 gal. per minute with the best well out of service.

2. Will the new improvements reduce our fire insurance premiums? Ans. — Yes

3. Will wells be equipped to meet State Health requirements? Ans. — Yes. Present water does not meet health requirements.

4. How much land will be reserved for drilling rights? Ans. — 160 acres.

5. What will be the annual cost of water at the wells? Ans. — \$4,000 for 40 million gals. minimum 10c per thousand over 40 million until such time as Canadian water is available. After Canadian River water is here, the cost will be 11c per 1,000 gal. with \$1,000 minimum.

6. Will water rates be raised? Ans. — Yes. From 2,000 gal. minimum now at \$2.75 to \$3.50 minimum. After 5,000 gal. from 45c to 50c per 1,000 gal. Example — present 10,000 cost \$6.55. After the raised same amount will cost \$8.75

7. Will any tax money be used to amortize this issue? Ans. — NO. All monies come from revenue of water and sewer

7. What will be the quality of the water? Ans. — Compares (the 3 proposed wells) to present city water in chemical analysis.

8. Can reservoir, chlorinator, and booster station be used for Canadian water? Ans. — Yes. City would be required to furnish at least this amount of storage for Canadian water for peaking periods

9. Will City have to maintain a water supply to supplement the Canadian Water? Ans. — yes. For peaking periods and emergencies

10. Will the proposed rate increase be in line with area cities? Ans. — Yes. On the average

11. For what reason did the City Council recommend the bond issue to bring water from C. A. Moore property? Ans. — (a) two proposed wells have for several years a pumping capacity history. (b) It is the only available water field within feasible distance of O'Donnell

12. Has extensive engineering study been made as to quantity of water available on the 160 acres for City's use? Ans. — Yes. We only propose to pump 2 wells out of three at any one time at about 60 percent of the well's capacity.

Fire Fighting Equipment General Obligation Bond \$20,000 not to exceed 5 percent interest

1. How will the money be used? (a) To buy a new pumper truck and all equipment at estimated cost of \$15,000 — that will meet all insurance requirements.

(b) To install alarm system for new telephone exchange at cost of \$1,500

(c) Other equipment required by State.

2. Why is a new Fire Truck and other fire fighting equipment necessary? (a) The present Fire Truck is a 1947 model and does not meet insurance requirements and all equipment is obsolete for modern fire fighting.

(b) Alarm system must be changed when phone co. converts to dial.

3. Will the citizens realize a saving on insurance rates by buying proposed fire fighting equipment? Yes. Estimated saving will be \$2,000 annually.

4. Will taxes be raised to retire this bond? Ans. Yes. The valuation will remain the same and the rate will be raised about 9 cents per \$100 valuation.

Who can vote in this bond election? Ans. — the voter must have a poll tax or be exempt and have property, either real or personal, on the City tax roll.

CONFIDENCES PROTECTED

Under the law what you as a client tell your lawyer in confidence he may tell no one else without your consent.

Nor can a judge order him or his professional employees to reveal such communications in court.
 Why have such a privilege?
 Chiefly, to do justice; it encourages clients to tell their lawyers what they have to know to help and to advise them fully; things about their family, business and private affairs, their hopes, fears and ambitions.

No lawyer may speak of certain things, even after a client dies. For a client may well have to give his lawyer details which, if revealed, might harm those he most wanted to protect.

Yet, in some very rare cases, to help carry out the client's desires after death, a lawyer may have to reveal a confidence, under certain safeguards, to uphold his client's purposes.

What are confidential communications?
 Anything a client tells his lawyer when he seeks advice about his personal, business, or legal affairs — talks and letters, photographs, charts, and other documents and records.

Confidential communications protect you as the client, not your lawyer. If you break the confidence, a lawyer may also have to talk, for the communication is no longer confidential. You may break a confidence by testifying about it, or by having unauthorized persons hear or see what was communicated.

No lawyer may keep quiet about a crime or fraud a client has told him he plans to commit. But afterwards, an accused person may talk freely to his lawyer. Even if guilty, he has a right to have his side of the story presented to the court as it may affect his punishment. A person in trouble needs to talk to someone without fear that what he says will become public.

In some states certain other professional people, such as physicians and clergymen may receive privileged communications. However, Texas law makes no provision for privileged communications with physicians and clergymen.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

A red hot issue which will bring the country boys of the Legislature out of their seats is the recommendation of Gov. Daniel that the farm to market road program be transferred from the State's general fund to highway funds.

Daniel insists the transfer, whether for two years or permanently, will not damage the program. But the transfer of the \$15 million annual obligation will cut the Texas highway program by that amount annually. The goal will be the primary and state road system, the in-between of the farm-to-market construction program which is perpetuated by the mandatory "mud to pavement spending program and the gigantic interstate highway construction program which is sustained mostly with federal funds.

A joker in the state highway program consistently pointed out by the highway department is that after spending earmarked funds for farm to market construction, and the state's 10 percent matching funds for the interstate construction, there remains the state obligation of maintenance on the entire farm to market system and the largely federally financed interstate system. But with practically all of the money earmarked for building,

there is very little left to keep them from deteriorating thru lack of maintenance.

The farm to market road program was one of the most important ever adopted by Texas in the development of its outstanding highway system. Texas has something over 30,000 miles of this relatively inexpensive construction, but roads located where traffic would not justify the building of the US-designated highways or state-designated highways.

No proposal has been made, and none will be made, to abandon the program bearing the name of farm to market roads. It has too much support for that. Significantly, much of the support comes from business and industry interests of the cities, which share with the farmers and the ranchers the benefit of good transportation to and from the remotest rural areas.

The program will continue, and more roads will be linked up as needed, whether the money comes out of the general fund's deficit or the highway fund's surplus.

Actually, one of the main problems of the highway department, increasing the load of maintenance costs of the farm roads, is that these roads are so much more convenient in many instances that the heavy truckers insist on using them. The roads are not built heavily enough to support the heaviest legal traffic and often a truck will seriously damage a strip of farm

road by a single trip over it. Thus maintenance is made more necessary and more expensive.

This is the time when the great sport of kite flying is enjoyed by many of you. In order that you may fly your kites safely, Texas Electric Service Company has outlined for you some safety rules which will help you get more fun out of flying your kites and at the same time, keep you from getting hurt or losing your kites.

- Fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees.

 - Fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked.
 - If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.
- We and Texas Electric Service Company want you to enjoy your kite flying and careful observance of these safety rules will do away with the possibility of accidents.

dation, streets that would serve for surface drainage facilities would be considered first with the approval of the majority of property owners.

(b) People who are interested in paving their property may come to City office and so designate on the map. When enough interest has been shown on block or blocks, efforts will be made to pave.

Can present strip paving be salvaged?

Ans. — Yes. Prior to sealing and repairing existing streets, the City Council will consider and contact those who might be interested in curb and gutter type construction. Some salvage may be realized from existing pavement.

What would be the cost of new curb and gutter type of paving?

Ans. — About \$4.25 per foot on abutting property. The city proposes to participate in 10 to 15 percent of cost as required by laws of the State.

The annual Cage Clinic for those connected with the commercial egg industry in Texas will be held on March 29th at Texas A and M College. Producers, salesmen, servicemen, hatcherymen, feed and supply dealers and egg merchants have a special invitation to attend.

Fertilizer nutrients, if properly applied in the correct amounts, will lower cotton disease losses, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. Balanced fertility is important.

Planting seed bought at a bargain price can be very expensive, R. J. Hodges, extension agronomist, advises farmers to buy the best seed available. They are the cheapest in the long run, he adds, for better yields and top quality crops are most likely to come from fields planted with the best seed of recommended varieties or hybrids.

A soil test will help take the guesswork out of buying and applying fertilizers. Do not guess, soil test.

water system and must be called in for a refunding program before the City can issue any more water revenue bonds.

What is the present Assessed Valuation and tax rate of the City?
Ans. — The A. V. is \$2,402,190 and tax rate is \$1.25.

How is this rate broken down for use by the City?
Ans. — 75c for maintenance and 50c for bond retirement.

Will the tax rate be raised if the Street and Fire Equipment Bonds are voted?
Ans. The City has an authorized rate of \$1.50 which was cut to the present \$1.25 some two years back. This 25c will be added back of which 10c will be used for maintenance and 15c for bond payments.

If and when the proposed bonds are voted, will this be all the bonds that can be issued by the City?
Ans. — No. The City could issue about \$50,000 more General Obligation Bonds and about \$25,000 more Revenue Bonds at any time you had the necessary coverage from water income.

Street Improvement Bond Issue
A general obligation bond of \$40,000, interest not to exceed 5 percent. Repair and sealing on existing streets \$15,000. City's share of 40 block of new proposed paving \$20,000. Other uses, misc. \$5,000.

What type of paving program does the City propose?
Ans. — Assessment program for curb and gutter, design based on 2 to 3 year program.

How will the City Council determine which streets should be paved?
(a) Using engineer's recommen-
