City Health Officer James Toohey reported that 45 of the Nation's 55 Polio cases occurred in Texas last year. Texas' cases were in children under 4 years of age of which only 3 had a complete series of vaccines. Expectant mothers who have not had the vaccine are urgently urged to take it. Nearly all of the Texas cases were Latin Americans. This is from "Medical World News". See Dr. Toohey for places where the vaccine may be received. If demand is great the value may later be scheduled in the school.

No longer will Texas citizens pay poll taxes as a qualification for voting in national, state, or local elections.

But, all citizens eligible must now register between October 1. 1966, and no later than January 31, 1967, in order to vote in any election during the coming year.

Registration is free and may be done by mail on securing a prescribed form at the office of the County Tax Assessor and Collector, George McCracken. Registrant must sign his name to the blank, together with necessary information as to age, residence,

Other qualifications for voting remain the same as under the old poll tax system. A voter must have lived in the state at least one year, in the county at least six months.

In Lynn county, a county not having a city of 10,000 or more people, overage citizens do not have to register. This means a person over 60 years of age on January 1, 1965, does not have to register to vote next year.

Mr. McCracken suggests that citizens register to vote when they begin paying property taxes during October.
