Most of us take our hearing for granted. It probably has never occurred to us what a change it would make in our lives if we were suddenly deprived of it. We seldom think of the numerous sounds we hear during the day, sounds which keep us in close touch with the world about us. For those who can't hear, or who have difficulty hearing, it's almost like living in a different world, declared Dr.

A. Holle, State Health Officer. There are many children, mor than a million it's estimated, who live in this other world. They have either been born deaf or have lost much, or maybe all, of their hearing since birth. Being somewhat cut off from the world, the deaf child is frustrated because he can't communicate his feelings and needs to others. A sense of inferiority and hostility is frequently the result.

Most hearing loss in children the result of repeated colds and infections in the ears, nose, and throat. Such infections can cause what we know as conduction deafness If such infections are not treated early, a child's hearing may receive permanent damage. Hearing loss may follow measles, scarlet fever, influenza, or meningitis. These diseases may result in what is referre to as nerve deafness.

Enlarged adenoids, the result of infections, account for many cases of partial loss of hearing. The overgrown adenoids block up little tubes that lead from throat to the ears. These tubes must be open and clear for good hearing. For these children, curing infection isn't enough. Their ade-noids may have to be removed. Otherwise, they may suffer permanent hearing loss.

Not all children with a hearing loss can regain it. A serious infection, such as meningitis, can completely destroy the patient's hearing ability. As soon as deafness suspected the child should be taken to an ear specialist for a complete examination







Lifeboat Race Began With Sea Battles of Old

NEW YORK-Had they lived centuries ago, seamen who rowed n the International lifeboat race held this year on the Hudson river might have been pulling an oar for their lives in a battle at sea instead of racing against friendly competitors for glory and exer-

The Winner While thousands watched from the Manhattan shore, a Norwegian crew beat an American boat by three lengths over a mile course from Grant's tomb to the soldiers and sailors monument at Riverside drive and 89th street. Great Britain, the Netherlands, and Israel trailed in that order.

Roman triremes, the galleys of the Barbary corsairs, the long ships of the Vikings-all were powered in battle maneuvers by oars. Rowers of en were convicted criminals or war captives, galley slaves chained to their benches.

Sailing Days When larger ships were built and sails replaced manpower, seamen still rowed. Oars moved the small boats that shuttled between anchorage and shallow beach and towed great square riggers in and

out of congested harbors. Old records of naval battle contain references to instances where rowing boats were launched from warships to tow them to safety or into better position for attack. Oars and brawn took George Washington across the Delaware to surprise the Hessians, helped Sag Herbor whalers to run down their quarry and still help Grand Banks derymen get about in search of

With rowing a universal skill in the days of sail, it was natural that competition should develop wherever shipping gathered. Writers of the sea speak of gig and whaleboat races between windjammers' men of many nations in such farflung ports as Hong Kong, Le Havre, and Valparaiso. There is a record of a rowing race on the Hudson in 1824 between New York ferrymen and a boat's crew from

the British frigate Hussar. This sort of racing, sometimes intentionally international in charac'er but more often a matter of rivalry between individual ships or shipping lines, never became formalized.

airplane instrument made in this community of 4.700 population is bringing aviation officials here from all over the world.

So widespread is interest in the instrument-used on airplanes to pinpoint trouble anywhere in the ignition system—that 167 officials, representing 43 domestic and foreign airlines plus builders of planes and engines, recently came to watch the electronic units being manufactured here by the scintilla magneto division of Bendix Aviation corporation.

Take Over Hotel

Because Sidney has but one small hotel, a nearby resort was taken over in its entirety for the record number of visitors. who conferred for three days on the role of the Sidney-built device in aviation safety and reliability.

In addition to the principal U.S. airlines, such foreign operators as Trans-Canada Airlines, Air France. KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, SA-BENA Belgian Airlines and Linea Aeropostal Venezolana participated in the conference and plant tour.

Ralph S. Damon, president of Trans World Airlines, Inc., said at the meeting that the instrument. called an ignition analyzer, is making a major contribution to aviation safety, which has increased 50-fold in 15 years and is expected soon to topple the safety records of any other form of mass transportation.

The analyzer, slated for application to passenger cars, trucks, tractors and other automotive vehicles as well as aviation, uses a cathode-ray tube like the "big tube" in TV sets to show engine performance in various electrical wave patterns. It will, for example, quickly locate a poor sparkplug among the 224 carried by some of the larger multi-engine planes.

Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES-The first mu-nicipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., admin. istrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay or time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when-and if-em. ployees reported it.

According to Leask, replacemen of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been decided "plus" operation for the

"The purpose of making the cof-fee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and econom in the conduct of city business." he said. "After several months of ob servation, it certainly seems to be working out that way.

"Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city rest periods have ended time-wasting 'sneak outs' and other abuse which were costly to taxpayers."

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



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Age, Circulation Of Blood Connected

BERKELEY, Calif. - The discovery of a progressive reduction with age in the circulation of blood in the muscles, which may turn out to be the major cause of aging, has been reported by Dr. Hardin Jones, associate professor of medical physics in the Donner Laboratory of the University of

Dr. Jones found that between 18 and 25 years of age, the blood circulation to the muscles of the average person is cut 40 per cent. Between 25 and 35 years, the supply of blood to the muscles is reduced by another 33 per cent, and so on.

The scientists explained that the circulating blood supplies the nourishment necessary for maintaining the various tissues of the body. With reduction in the nutriment the tissues can get, these tissues function less efficiently, which is a characteristic of aging.

Dr. Jones said that there are wide differences between individuals of the same age in the amount of blood circulating to the muscles. For example, the same 60-yearolds with the highest circulations match the rates of 20-year-olds

with the lowest circulation rates. He said this is pertinent to the knowledge that people's bodies age at different rates. The body of one person of 30 may actually be as old as another person of 40 or 50.


