Lifeboat Race Began With Sea Battles of Old

NEW YORK—Had they lived centuries ago, seamen who rowed in the International lifeboat race held this year on the Hudson river might have been pulling an oar for their lives in a battle at sea instead of racing against friendly competitors for glory and exercise.

The Winner
 While thousands watched from the Manhattan shore, a Norwegian crew beat an American boat by three lengths over a mile course from Grant's tomb to the soldiers and sailors monument at Riverside drive and 89th street. Great Britain, the Netherlands, and Israel trailed in that order.

Roman triremes, the galleys of the Barbary corsairs, the long ships of the Vikings—all were powered in battle maneuvers by oars. Rowers often were convicted criminals or war captives, galley slaves chained to their benches.

Sailing Days
 When larger ships were built and sails replaced manpower, seamen still rowed. Oars moved the small boats that shuttled between anchorage and shallow beach and out of congested harbors.

Old records of naval battle contain references to instances where rowing boats were launched from warships to tow them to safety or into better position for attack. Oars and brawn took George Washington across the Delaware to surprise the Hessians, helped Sag Harbor whalers to run down their quarry and still help Grand Banks drymen get about in search of cod.

With rowing a universal skill in the days of sail, it was natural that competition should develop wherever shipping gathered. Writers of the sea speak of gig and whaleboat races between windjammers' men of many nations in such farflung ports as Hong Kong, Le Havre, and Valparaiso. There is a record of a rowing race on the Hudson in 1824 between New York ferrymen and a boat's crew from the British frigate Hussar.

This sort of racing, sometimes intentionally international in character but more often a matter of rivalry between individual ships or shipping lines, never became formalized.

Kitchenettes Make Music For Town Park

BIGLERVILLE, Pa.—There's a March Gras air today in this thriving little community, not far from historic Gettysburg. And it's the women of the town who are responsible.

The girls have banded together to form the novel Biglerville Kitchenettes, members of which use all manner of kitchen utensils to produce music.

Community Betterment
 The 40 members of the band have one sole aim—community betterment. Right now, the town needs a new playground or a public park.

While the serenade is going on, non-playing girls pass bread-baskets and tureens among the audience, wheedling and cajoling contributions from the delighted audience. This money, quite logically, is transferred into a tremendous kitchen pot. To date, the Kitchenettes have raised the levee of the pot to a hefty \$3,000—more than enough, they figure, to purchase the land for Biglerville's newest play area.

Unique Auctions
 Unique auction sales also further the Kitchenette cause.

Famed writers, painters and other civic-minded persons, intrigued by the Biglerville project, have contributed valuable items.

Last Spring, the Kitchenettes undertook to present a musical performance based on the various seasons of the year and the seasons' effect on apple-growing, one of Adams County's principal sources of income.

The play was so popular that it played to standees for three consecutive nights—quite a pat on the back for the Kitchenettes' talents. For Biglerville has a population of 890 and the town auditorium seats 700. Receipts totaled \$800.

Another unique custom of the Kitchenettes is the serenading of brides and grooms, often after the newlywed pair returns from the wedding trip.

MAGNETO CENTER
Town of 4,700 Makes Vital Airplane Parts

SIDNEY, N.Y.—An electronic airplane instrument made in this community of 4,700 population is bringing aviation officials here from all over the world. So widespread is interest in the instrument—used on airplanes to pinpoint trouble anywhere in the ignition system—that 167 officials, representing 43 domestic and foreign airlines plus builders of planes and engines, recently came to watch the electronic units being manufactured here by the scintilla magneto division of Bendix Aviation corporation.

Take Over Hotel
Because Sidney has but one small hotel, a nearby resort was taken over in its entirety for the record number of visitors, who conferred for three days on the role of the Sidney-built device in aviation safety and reliability.

In addition to the principal U.S. airlines, such foreign operators as Trans-Canada Airlines, Air France, KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, SABENA Belgian Airlines and Linea Aeropostal Venezolana participated in the conference and plant tour.

Ralph S. Damon, president of Trans World Airlines, Inc., said at the meeting that the instrument, called an ignition analyzer, is making a major contribution to aviation safety, which has increased 30-fold in 15 years and is expected soon to topple the safety records of any other form of mass transportation.

The analyzer, slated for application to passenger cars, trucks, tractors and other automotive vehicles as well as aviation, uses a cathode-ray tube like the "big tube" in TV sets to show engine performance in various electrical wave patterns. It will, for example, quickly locate a poor sparkplug among the 224 carried by some of the larger multi-engine planes.

Began in Garage
Sidney, builds magnetos and jet igniters for the aircraft industry as well as additional ignition and electrical equipment for automotive and industrial engines. Described in a national magazine article as "The Village We Can't Do Without," the community was the source of most of the ignition units for World War II military planes, tanks and PT boats.

Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—The first municipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., administrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when it passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay or time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when—and if—employees reported it.

According to Leask, replacement of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been a decided "plus" operation for the city.

The purpose of making the coffee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and economy in the conduct of city business," he said. "After several months of observation, it certainly seems to be working out that way. Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city regulations have ended time-wasting 'sneak outs' and other abuses which were costly to taxpayers."

Hold Reunion of 2,000 Member Family

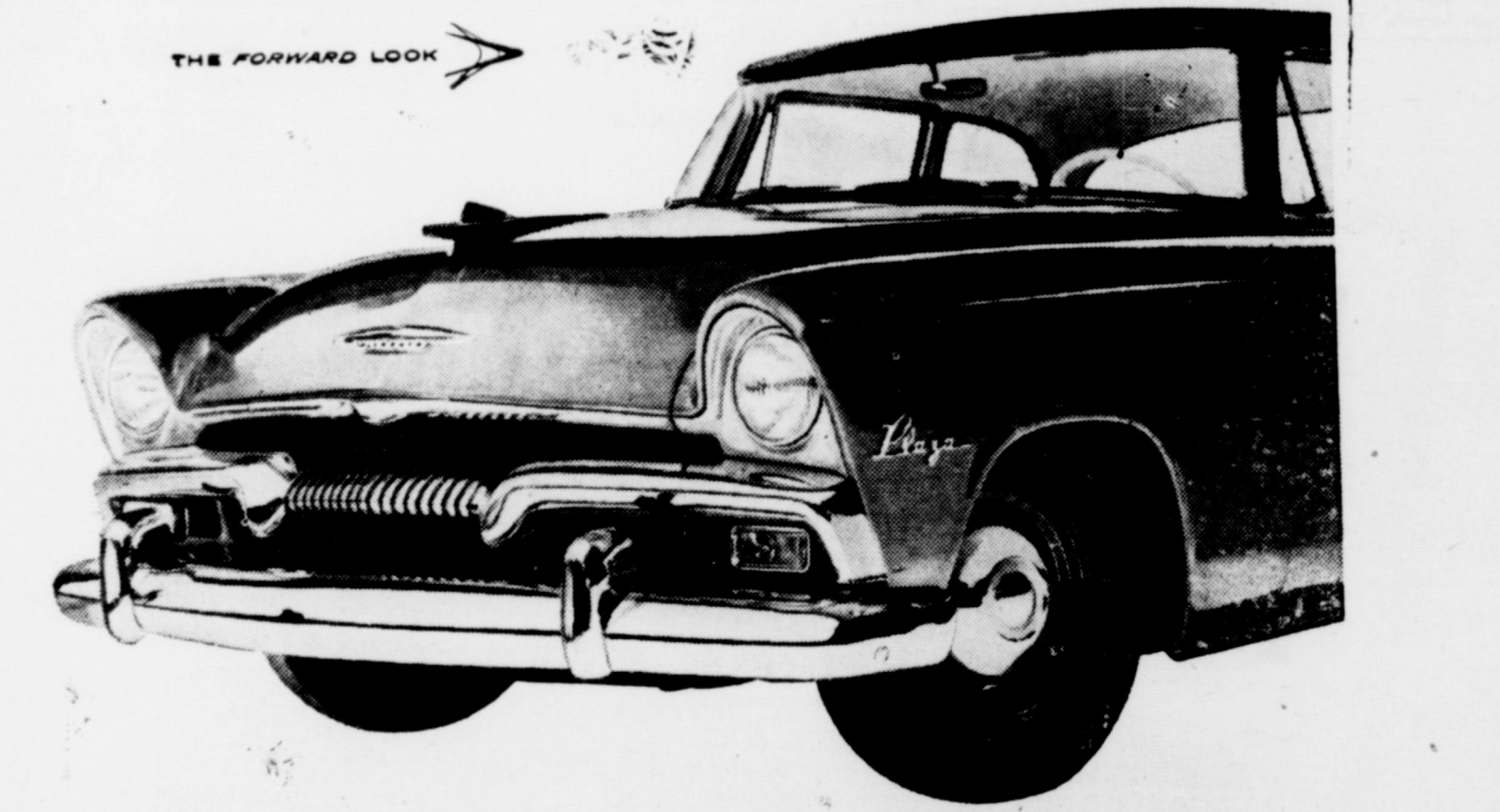

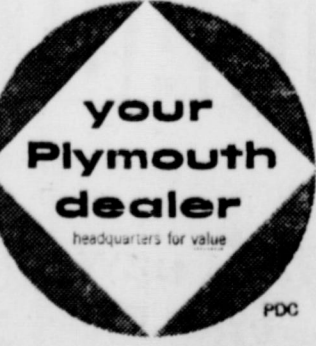

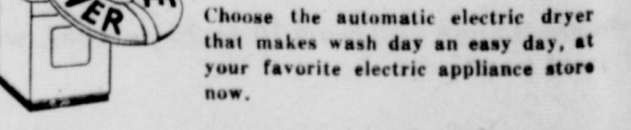

8. PAYABLE IF WAGES ARE MORE THAN \$100 YEAR

Are you a seasonal or part time worker in agriculture? If you are, you should have a social security card because your employer is required to report your agricultural wages if you receive cash pay of as much as \$100 in a calendar year. **longer do you have to worry** about qualifying and working on a certain number of days in a quarter as of Jan. 1st, 1955 the only qualification is that your cash pay on farm work is at least \$100 a year from the same employer. You earn \$90 in a year from one employer and 90 from a second employer, these wages would not count toward social security. Neither would it count if you were paid part of a crop amounting to several hundred dollars. But if you earn \$100 from one employer and \$125 from another, then both employers will report your earnings for social security. Whenever your pay from any one employer is less than \$100 a year, he should return to you the amount he took out of your pay for social security for that year at the time you start to work as a farmer, neither he nor you know exactly how much you will pay. It is best to defer deductions until \$100 is reached, then if it turns out that you do not earn as much as \$100 in a calendar year there is not the problem of returning erroneous deductions. If you are a harvest hand, or a cotton picker, your wages count just the same as if you were a regular worker. You must have cash wages of at least \$100 before your employer is obligated to report you. If you are a harvest hand, you may be employed, supervised and paid by a contract harvester who may be your employer instead of the owner of the farm. But you still must show your social security card to your employer so he can make the proper reports.

Clan Memorializes Man Hanged 200 Years Ago

EDINBURGH — Stewart clanmen met recently at the site near Ballaehulish, Argyll, where James Stewart was hanged 200 years ago for taking part in the murder of Colin Campbell to protest the injustice of Stewart and to commemorate the bravery with which he met the hangman. An oration was made and the Very Rev. Duncan McInnes, dean of Argyll, held a memorial service.

The Stewarts say that James Stewart was a victim of the most outrageous frameup in history. The murder remains the most celebrated crime case in Scotland. Stewart was tried by a jury consisting of eleven Campbell and four others and the presiding judge was the chief of the Campbell clan, the Duke of Argyll.

Robert Louis Stevenson immortalized the murder in "Kidnapped."

Noah's Ark Still Is Lost on Mt. Ararat

ISTANBUL—Not even a pair of animal tracks was found by a French expedition which battled its way to the top of Mt. Ararat looking for traces of Noah's Ark.

The expedition, led by Jean de Biquier, polar explorer, hoisted the French flag atop the rugged peak after climbing through snow, rain and heavy winds.

An American expedition led by Dr. Aaron Smith, a retired missionary from Greensboro, N. C., tried fruitlessly to find Noah's fabulous boat in 1949.

Turkey's big Soviet neighbor charged that neither group really was looking for the Ark but just wanted to peer down at Russian defenses on the other side of the mountain.

Age, Circulation Of Blood Connected

BERKELEY, Calif. — The discovery of a progressive reduction with age in the circulation of blood in the muscles, which may turn out to be the major cause of aging, has been reported by Dr. Hardin Jones, associate professor of medical physics in the Donner Laboratory of the University of California.

Dr. Jones found that between 18 and 25 years of age, the blood circulation to the muscles of the average person is cut 40 per cent. Between 25 and 35 years, the supply of blood to the muscles is reduced by another 33 per cent, and so on.

The scientists explained that the circulating blood supplies the nourishment necessary for maintaining the various tissues of the body. With reduction in the nutriment the tissues can get, these tissues function less efficiently, which is a characteristic of aging.

Dr. Jones said that there are wide differences between individuals of the same age in the amount of blood circulating to the muscles. For example, the same 60-year-olds with the highest circulations match the rates of 20-year-olds with the lowest circulation rates.

He said this is pertinent to the knowledge that people's bodies age at different rates. The body of one person of 30 may actually be as old as another person of 40 or 50.

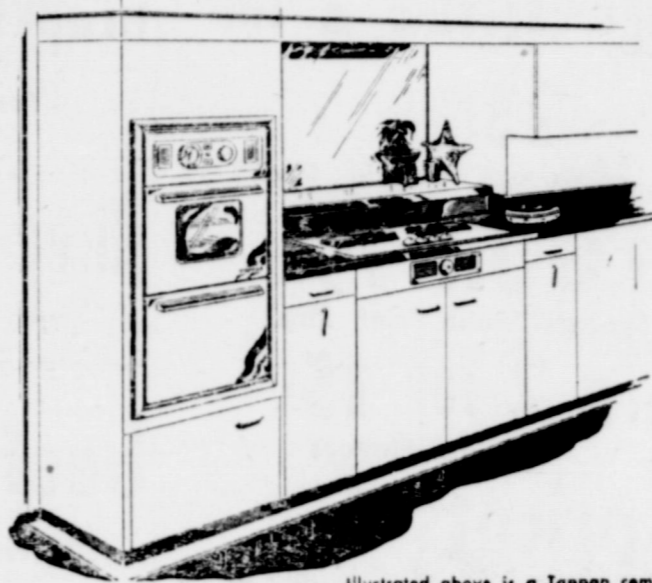

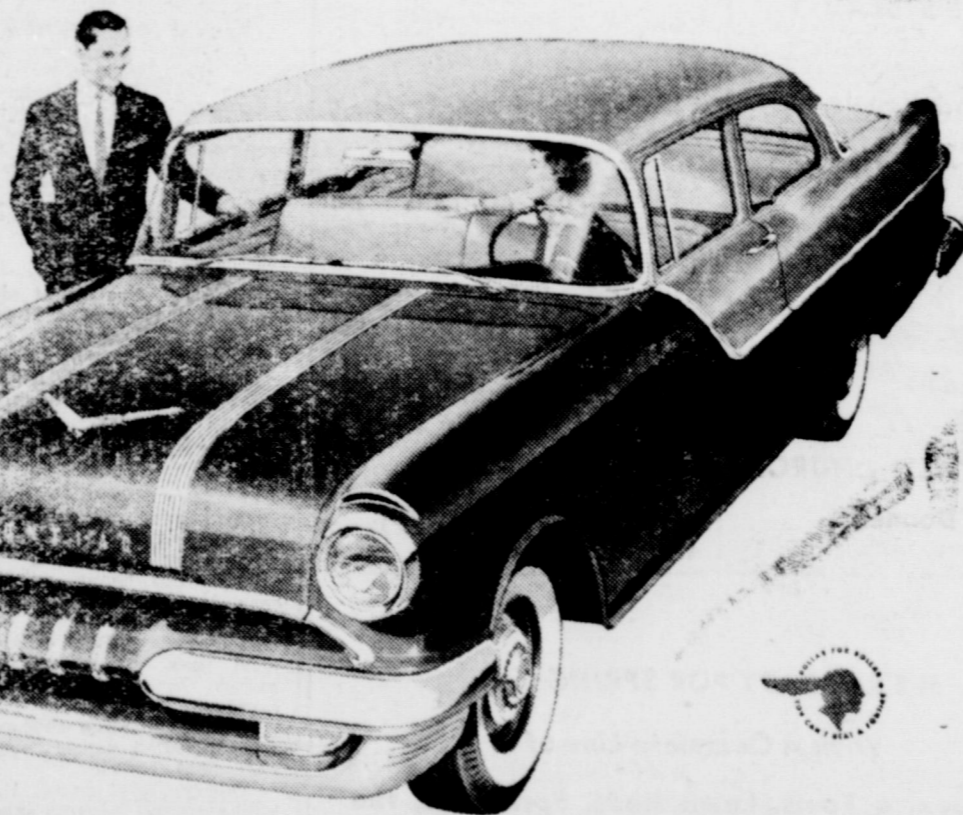
