## Business Group To Meet In January

Twelve local farmers and business men met last Thursday night at the Fire Hall to organize a business club of O'Donnell and area residents. After discussion it was agreed that another meeting should be held next week. Extremely severe winter weather was thought to have kept the attendance low. W. B. Mitchell, Dean Davis, John Criner and Elvin Moore were named to select a new meeting date and to draw up aims and organizational plans of the club. Mayor Hash and Councilman Shag Garrett told of how such a club would help the city in planning. The initial meeting was sponsored jointly by the Rotary and Lions Clubs. Mr. Mitchell was an early leader in trying to work out plans for such a club.

## Stock Show Feb 24-25

The annual O'Donnell 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show will be held here Friday and Saturday Feb. 24 and 25th. Committees are out this week and next making up premiums and money for operating expenses. This year's show is expected to be one of the best in history of the local show. About 24 calves are expected this year compared to six last year. An addition has been built on the south side of the show barn to house the calves.

## Falls May Be Serious

Statistics indicate that this year we can expect approximately 560 Texans to die from injuries sustained in falls. In 1959 there were 655 such deaths—down from 627 in 1958.

There is no guarantee that the downward trend will continue. The sad fact is that these are not injuries to workmen on telephone poles or oil derricks. Except for a few they are mostly same-level falls occurring to older persons.

Final tabulations are not available for 1959, but in 1958 a majority total of 420 accidental deaths from falls involved persons between the ages of 70 and 94.

This same pattern evolves year after year. Most deaths occurring among the rest of the age span are also the result of home accidents from falls.

Older people are naturally more prone to falls because of varying degrees of infirmity accompanying the aging process.

However, many home falls are preventable provided a sound plan of battle is followed to combat this number one home-accident killer.

For instance, in stairwells and hallways adequate light must be provided night and day to avoid tripping or missing a step. A lamp or flashlight should be handy by the bedside. Another safety factor is to have hand rails even for a one or two step stairway.

Carelessness with electric cords make ideal trippers for old people and high heeled ladies. Make sure no cords are exposed in walking areas.

Many a throw rug has thrown someone for a permanent loss. They should be tacked down or have non-slip pads underneath this all too common accident.

Spilled liquids need to be wiped up immediately. There is slicker than a kitchen floor with bacon grease spilled on it.

## Ice Storm Grips Area

"Old Man Winter" made the big news this week over West Texas with a tight grip of ice, sleet, snow and bitter cold weather. The show got on the road a week ago with an ice storm coupled with sleet which put a two inch coat of ice on the roads. Then a 5 inch snow Friday night put the frosting on Mother Nature. It was a beautiful snow. Traffic was at a minimum over the week end and more snow fell this Tuesday as index goes to press. Total moisture is expected to approach an inch—which means good plowing come spring.

### Bird Demonstration Slated Here

A Southern Assembly featuring Lou Gaeta presenting "Hunters With Wings" will be held at the local high school today, Dec. 14th.

Mr. Gaeta has spent more than ten years researching and practicing the art of training wild birds. During the summer months he is zoo director at Hiram House camp in Moreland Hills, Ohio.

His program will include the history of Falconry, the training and feeding of birds of prey, their natural instincts and habits and the methods and equipment that have been used to hunt with birds since medieval times.

### COURT RULES PROTECT RIGHTS AND INSURE FAIR TRIALS

Many people see court procedure as a mere tool of delay, of concern chiefly to lawyers and judges, but court rules are real tools of justice.

The law is made up of two parts—the "substantive" and the "procedural" law. The first defines rights, duties and remedies. It enforces contracts and rights wrongs. It describes crimes and sets up punishments. People can see its worth. Procedural law tells what steps to take to put substantive law to work for us.

Some of our most vital rights live in procedural law. A day in court means more than the right to have your say before a judge and jury. It means the right to be well represented before an impartial judge and jury, to have time to prepare for your trial. It means that you get due notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. Due process of law means that you shall meet your accusers face to face; to cross-examine them. It means that you can present evidence in your own behalf.

The law of procedure tells you how to appeal your case to higher courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial.

Procedural law comes down to us from years of experience in the courts of many lands. Through the centuries procedure tends to become cumbersome, but it has had great periods of reform. In Aleria, we have had many good changes in our court procedure. In the United States, we tend to give our courts the power to change rules.

Throughout its history, the State Bar has helped to study and improve court rules. The aim is a simple set of rules to do justice with speed, uniformity and fairness.

### Ag. Census Given

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Lynn County last fall counted 962 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census. U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 569, 074 acres. The average size of farm was 591.6 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$90,765.

Of the county's farm operators, 214 owned their farms, 249 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 499 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 45.9 years. There were 78 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 962 farms in the county, 830 were Commercial farms.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc. are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954. Copies of the county report may be obtained for 10 cents each from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

### HUMAN RELATIONS

These days in business and government we hear much of "human relations," the shiny skills new to the psychology labs which men and women work together in peace and understanding. Though not so new by a long shot, law arises from human nature. Does the law have anything much to offer?

Trouble often arises, as the human relation people say, out of a man's feelings of insecurity and justice. So the law seeks to adjust them and to give each person due under fair rules. Written laws set up courts to settle disputes fairly among men when they fall out, and to curb those who would overstep, their due and harm others.

Under such rules each one may stand where he stands. For the law is out his rights and duties, and being a family, in the pursuit of happiness and in seeking salvation. The law gives each one wide powers (or freedom) through contracts to work with others to serve these lawful interests. It seeks to give each man, woman and child an equal chance to learn, to make mistakes, think, and to talk and experience with others, so that we may find ways the better to live together.

The law tries to fit in with man's nature, giving weight to his hopes and to his shortcomings. Indeed, as one of man's achievements, the law itself takes care that it too may fall short—at judges and juries may err (hence courts of appeal), that laws may have flaws (hence legislatures to change them).

At any rate, these are things we had written into our fundamental law, the Constitution.

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**To Be Thankful**

It may have seemed tough to think of things to be thankful for during the past holiday weekend with the large rise in death. And we still have a longer season to go through which we will probably hear of large accident and death figures but still we have much to be thankful for. For instance: —

Over a half-million babies were born during the two year period between September 1958 and August 1960. That equals almost 700 new babies each day.

During the same time period there were 152,000 deaths—a ratio of three births per death, certainly something to be thankful for.

These records were disclosed from figures compiled for the latest biennial report from the Records and Statistics Section of the State Health Department. As a result of the birth to death ratio, Texas' population increased by 350,000 plus newcomers from outlying states, bringing the current population to more than 9,500,000.

Filing birth and death certificates makes up the major portion of the Section's workload which totalled 800,000 records and amendments.

This brought the over-all records on file at the State Health Department to a big 12,130,000 items. Since 1936, deaths—during the first year of life—have dropped from 71 per one thousand births to about 30 per thousand today. The maternal death rate has been cut 94 percent since 1936.

The amount of work needed to keep that many records and files accurate and up-to-date continues to grow.

USDA scientists have discovered a possible new use for wheat. In laboratory tests, acid-modified wheat flour has proved equal to commercial sizing material for imparting strength to paper.

With the rising toll of highway deaths in the state, many of them rural residents, the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council urges drivers to slow down when driving on rural roads. Because all roads intersections are not marked, they advise slowp to a stoppable speed before crossing any road. Farm traffic is considerably heavier at this season, and hence, the extra caution.

Extra income can result from well kept farm or ranch business records. C. S. Bates, extension farm management specialist, points out that good records can often help farmers and ranchmen make the right management decisions. Too, he adds, records are very important come tax paying time. Local county extension agents can supply information and publications on record keeping.

With the huge feed grain reserves now on hand and the large imports of pork into Texas, Lloyd Bergsma, extension livestock marketing specialist, suggests that an expanded swine feeding program might offer opportunities for increasing farm income in the state.

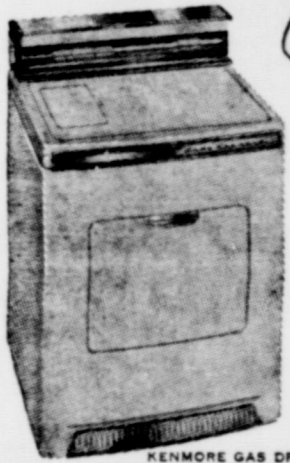

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**Contracts Are Important**

At this time of year, many land-owners and tenants are thinking about farm rental arrangements for the coming year. While some operate from year to year on the basis of verbal agreements regulated largely by local custom, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the parties.

Farming is a business and should be conducted in a businesslike manner for best success. Rental contracts involve a full year's work by tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn lease is good business economy.

A farm lease is not a simple paper. Printed lease forms often turn out to be traps if not understood, and if not properly executed. A farm-tenant contract is intricate and of such importance to both parties concerned that amateur draftmanship is risky.

Fixing of cash rent or designation of length of term are relatively simple. Yet, even in these matters, ambiguity or incompleteness can cause bitter disputes and expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property description in a lease may have consequences entirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate description is doubly important.

In addition, there are legal rules which substitute for some omissions in written leases. For example, a landlord by the tenant may automatically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts' interpretation of the language used. There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share basis, it should be taken to define what expenses are to be paid by the par-

ties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cover such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped, whether the tenant can cut timber, whether loss of a building by fire or other cause frees the tenant, or whether the landlord must accept a sub-tenant.

One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreements can cause disputes between persons even though they are both honest and generous.

Many of the possibilities that should be covered by a properly drawn lease will not occur to inexperienced persons. The renting of land deserves a written contract, and it is a contract too important to be entrusted to anyone other than an expert.

Make sure the cotton planting seed which you store on the farm doesn't become infested with insects which can severely damage the seed between now and planting time next spring. Extension Entomologist C. F. Garner and Fred Elliott, cotton specialist, suggest the local county agent be contacted for information on seed treatment.

Accidental farm death rates connected with machinery, drownings, firearms and electricity are increasing and the Texas Farm and Ranch

Safety Council suggests that its not too early to make plans now for preventing farm accidents in 1961. In fact, they say, accident prevention would be a good starting point for New Year Resolutions.

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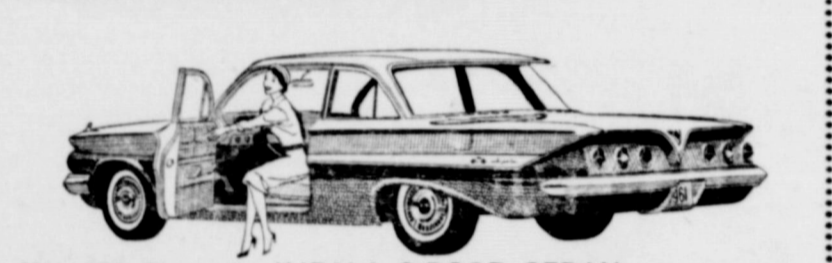

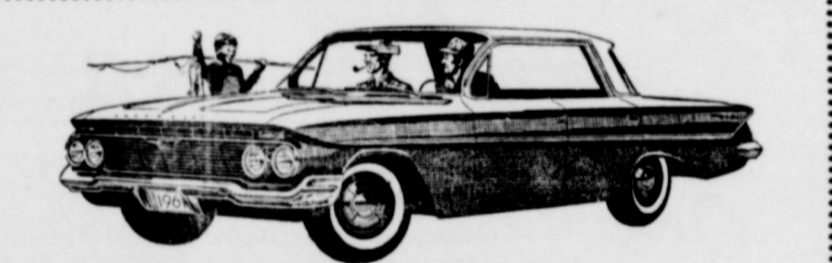

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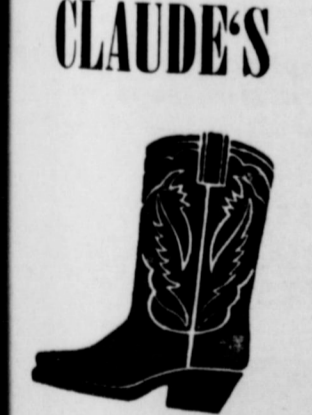
