"Make sure that your employer reports your cash wages correctly." was the advice given to domestic the per workers by Jorn G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security disease. District Office. Mr. Hutton pointed out that social security reports on household workers are due in October for the three month calendar quarter which ended September 30tr. The amount of your social security benefits is based on your yearly earnings as credited to your social security account," he added. "The amount of your future bene-

fits depend on correct reporting.' Because it is so important that wages be properly reported, you should discuss the matter with your employer to determine if there is any misunderstanding about th coverage of your wages under the Social Security Act. The test on such work is very simple. If you are paid as much as \$50.00 in cash wages in a three month calendar quarter, the work must be reported by your employer. He should deduct 2&1-2 percent of his own. making a total of 5 percent which willbe paid at the time he files the tax return. This return is due in the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas,

by October 31st.

The necessary tax forms for reporting domestic workers are mailed out each calendar quarter by the District Director of Internal Revtax matters can be obtained from the local Internal Revenue office.

The local Internal Revenue office. Domestic workers who are not being reported for social security purposes by their employers are encouraged to contact their nearest social security office. The necessary investigation will be made to determine if their wages should be reported. No. 1 Killer

During a recent conference devoted to orientation and experience for people in the field of heart disease, some interesting facts were discussed.

The Division of Cancer and Heart Diseases of the Texas State Department of Health revealed figures on the prevalence of the nat-ion's number one killer. In 1958 there were 25,042 deaths

from heart disease in Texas. Adding the 11.158 fatalities from vascular lesions (primarily strokes) equals a total of 36,200 deaths attributed to cardivascular disease. Last year there were 73,443 deaths in Texas from all causes. This means that 49 per cent of all persons who died did so as a direct

esult of some cardiovascula dition. To further dramatize the effect of this condition, subtract the total deaths the number killed

by accidents (5,214) This leaves us with the cold fact that 52 per cent (well over half) of the persons who died from natural causes did so from cardiovasclar

Accurate information concerning the occurrence of the different types of heart disease in the popu-

lation is not readily available.

It varies in different parts of the world and even in different parts of the United States and in different peoples or ethnic groups. However, Dr. Paul Dudley White's estimate is perhaps as good as any. (He was one of the specia-

lists attending President Eisenhower.) He found the occurance of the different types of heart disease in 3,000 organic cases to be as fol-

lows: Coronary heart diease accounted for 48 per cent, hypertensive heart disease (high blood pressure) claimed 26 per cent, rheumatic heart disease took 23 per cent, convenital heart disease rook 23 per cent, congenital heart disease made up six per cent, and all the other types caused seven per cent of the deaths from cardiovascular disease.

Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.-Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court," State's Attorney Edwin C.

Mills. Members of the Good Govern-ment Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeas-

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

Most Drinking Starts **Before College Days**

NEW HAVEN, Conn .- Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents.

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink.

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor 'closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the men students drink. S. S. News

"Make sure that your employer reports your cash wages correctly." was the advice given to domestic workers by Jorn G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security District Office. Mr. Hutton pointed out that social security reports on household workers are due in October for the three month calendar. tober for the three month calendar quarter which ended September 30tr. "The amount of your social security benefits is based on your yearly earnings as credited to your social security account," he added.
"The amount of your future benefits depend on correct reporting."

Because it is so important that wages be properly reported, you should discuss the matter with your employer to determine if there is any misunderstanding about the any misunderstanding about the coverage of your wages under the Social Security Act. The test on such work is very simple. If you are paid as much as \$50.00 in cash wages in a three month calendar quarter, the work must be reported by your employer. He should deby your employer. He should deduct 2&1-2 percent of his own, making a total of 5 percent which willbe paid at the time he files the tax return. This return is due in the office of the District Director of office of the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas, by October 31st.

The necessary tax forms for re-The necessary tax forms for reporting domestic workers are mailed out each calendar quarter by the District Director of Internal Revenue. Information on all Federal tax matters can be obtained from the local Internal Revenue office.

Domestic workers who are not being reported for social security purposes by their employers are encouraged to contact their nearest social security office. The necessary investigation will be made to determine if their wages should be reported. The social security office representative will be in O'Donnell on Wed., Oct. 28, 1959 at 2:00 p. m. at the Elementary School and will at the Elementary School and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social security.
