-0-"Make sure that your employer reports your cash wages correctly." was the advice given to domestic workers by Jorn G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security District Office. Mr. Hutton pointed out that social security reports on household workers are due in October for the three month calendar quarter which ended September 30tr. "The amount of your social security benefits is based on your yearly earnings as credited to your social security account," he added. "The amount of your future bene-

fits depend on correct reporting." Because it is so important that wages be properly reported, you should discuss the matter with your employer to determine if there is any misunderstanding about the coverage of your wages under the Social Security Act. The test on such work is very simple. If you are paid as much as \$50.00 in cash wages in a three month calendar quarter, the work must be reported by your employer. He should deduct 2&1-2 percent of his own, making a total of 5 percent which willbe paid at the time he files the tax return. This return is due in the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas,

by October 31st. The necessary tax forms for reporting domestic workers are mailed out each calendar quarter by the District Director of Internal Revenue. Information on all Federal tax matters can be obtained from

NEW MAIRIAGE LAW --0-

Effective Thursday, Oct. 15th a ney Texas law goes into effect on issuance of marriage licenses to parties under age — that is a female under 18 years of age or a male under 21 years of age, according to County Clerk C. W. Roberts.

The new law, H B 48 passed by the recent 56th Legislature, provides that if either party, or both, is under these ages, applications for under these ages, applications for a marriage license must be made three days before the license can be issued. It provides that a parent or guardian must accompany the under-age applicant for a marriage license and give his or her consent or the under-age applicant for a

stating that such parent is not able to accompany the couple, together with an acknowledged statement

with an acknowledged statement of consent from a parent or guardian. Under certain conditions, the county judge may approve the marriage of underage parties.

Others making application for a marriage license may present birth certificates, poll tax receipts, driver's license, ect., and if the clerk is thereby satisfied that the applicant is of age and otherwise qualified, he may then issue a marriage license. marriage license.



For prevention, you must re-move or withhold the material which might serve as a possible

-0-Of all farm animals, the dairy cow in milk production requires the greatest amount of water in proportion to her size. The amount of water she will drink depends on her size, her daily milk yield, the air temperature and humidity and the amount of water in the feed she eats. From 12 to 15 gallons per head is an average daily consump-

Using the high energy feed formulas now in practical use, it is possible to produce a broiler weighing more than three pounds in eight yeeks on less than six pounds of feed. This is possible if no disease outbreaks occur, if the chick available that is capable of obtain-ing such standards and if proper management procedures are follow
