Plans On Foot To Pave Highway No. 9

A. Brashear, president of the Board of Commerce, this week received a communication from the Secretary of the Board of City Development of Amarillo suggesting a meeting be held in Tahoka on July 11 to discuss plans for the surfacing of state highway No. 9 from Amarillo to San Angelo. Representatives from all towns through which highway No. 9 passes between Amarillo and San Angelo are expected to be present.

Brashear called a meeting of the Board of directors of the Tahoka Board of Commerce on Tuesday evening and at this meeting action was taken inviting representatives of the towns to meet in Tahoka as requested. This invitation has been communicated to the secretary of the Board of City Development of Amarillo.

It is not known how many gentlemen will be here for this meet, but it is expected that the towns along the line send delegates there will probably be quite a number.

Highway No. 9 is recognized as one of the most important highways in the state, connecting San Antonio, Austin, Dallas, and the Gulf Coast with the South Plains and extending westward to Denver and the Northwest. Randall and Hale counties have recently voted bonds to build this highway. A campaign is being conducted in Lubbock county. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the paving of the highway for its entire length. Lynn county is one of the important links in the route. The meeting to be held here will doubtless serve to bring the sentiment not only in Lynn county but in counties to the west of us in regard to paving the highway and it is expected to be a most important meeting.—Lynn County

Hard Work Being Done On Streets

City Marshal and Street Comptroller J. Y. Everett is doing some hard work on the streets of town all this week. All the streets of town are being repaved and all low places filled in will leave them in first class condition when the work is completed. Through the courtesy of County Commissioner T. J. Yandell, the City Comptroller used one of the new tractors and graders which are more capable of putting up a grade than the city tractor and which has proven to be of great value in some instances.

**What's Doing In West
Texas By W. T. C. C.**

BRADY—The City Council of
Brady has provided a market square
adjacent to the business section
which is to be used by farmers and
other producers to market their pro-
ducts in this city. The market place
is to be free to all who grow or man-
ufacture the products which they
sell, but it is to be closed to others.
An ordinance has been passed pro-
hibiting the peddling or marketing
of products on the streets of the city.
The market plaza is to be provided
with sanitary facilities and will have
a competent care taker to enforce
the rules of the city ordinance.

SPEARMAN—The new ice plant
of the Inland Utilities Company has
been placed in operation here. The
plant has capacity of ten tons of
clear pure ice every twenty four
hours.

CROSBYTON—Franchise has been
let to the West Texas Gas Company
of Amarillo to supply this city with
natural gas.

WINTERS—S. W. Cooper, former
secretary of the Crosbyton Chamber
of Commerce has taken over the du-
ties as secretary of the Winters C.
of C.

CISCO—A mammoth crowd esti-
mated at more than thirty thousand
people attended the opening cere-
monies of the Lake Cisco Bathing
Beach said to be the largest in the
world. Visitors also inspected the
new bridge built over Williamson
Dam, and the new State Fish Hatch-
ery just completed here.

LEFORS—A large swimming, fish-
ing and boating resort has been open-
ed here on the M. B. Davis Ranch.

TULIA—Eleven business men of
Tulia have purchased a ten acre
block of land for the site of the new
Swisher County Hospital.

SAN SABA—The new fertilizer
factory of the American Fertilizer
and Chemical Works has been placed
in operation here. The plant grinds
fertilizer from raw material obtained
at the company's mine here. A big
barbecue was given to celebrate the
opening.

MEGARGEL—A new \$40,000
high school building is under con-
struction here. Other development
in this city includes organizing of a
volunteer fire department; putting
over a \$150,000 road bond, and the

organization of a new chamber of
commerce.

VAN HORN—The county com-
missioners of Hudspeth County have
begun court action in an effort to
force sale of the 600 sections of
University land located in that coun-
ty.

HERMLEIGH—A city water sys-
tem is to be established here and the
city council has already begun pre-
liminary work on the system.

SWEETWATER—The gypsum in-
dustry of Texas is assuming large
proportions. Figures just announced
show that in 1926 the output was
418,324 tons valued at \$4,059,367.
Practically all of the Texas gypsum
mills are located in West Texas. The
gypsum is manufactured into neat
plaster, stucco and wall board. Some
plants manufacture tile and building
blocks.

SAN ANGELO—Claude Wild, former
president of the Cisco Chamber
of Commerce and for the last year
assistant manager of the Amarillo
Board of City Development has taken
the post of manager of San
Angelo Board of City Development.
Millard Cope has been appointed
publicity manager of that organiza-
tion.

MATADOR—A campaign to er-
adicate coyotes in this section has be-
gun here. O. L. Coleman of the
U. S. Department of Agriculture is
in charge of the work.

COMANCHE—Ninety dollars per
acre was realized by J. B. Allcorn
from his Comanche County grape
farm. The vines producing these
grapes are but sixteen months old.
