Wet Weather Continues

The current wet weather seems to be breaking as we go to press Tuesday afternoon. A slow mist and brief showers which started Sunday and continued thru Monday resulted in only minor moisture but was enough to keep the cotton pullers from the fields. Only a small amount of cotton has been ginned since the report last week. The harvest remains at only one half completed.

The greatest damage to cotton has been to the grade which is now turning out to be spotted and stained in many cases. Even greater damage has been done to the grain which is turning dark and in some cases, moldy.

Clear, sunny weather until the first of the year could still pull "the fat out of the fire" so far as the harvest is concerned. The fall rains are of much benefit to the dry land farms as the soil now has the most moisture since 1949.

A number of the Mexican National workers here for the harvest are leaving for home due to the cold, humid weather this fall. Machine harvesting of cotton is expected to go into high gear when the fields dry.

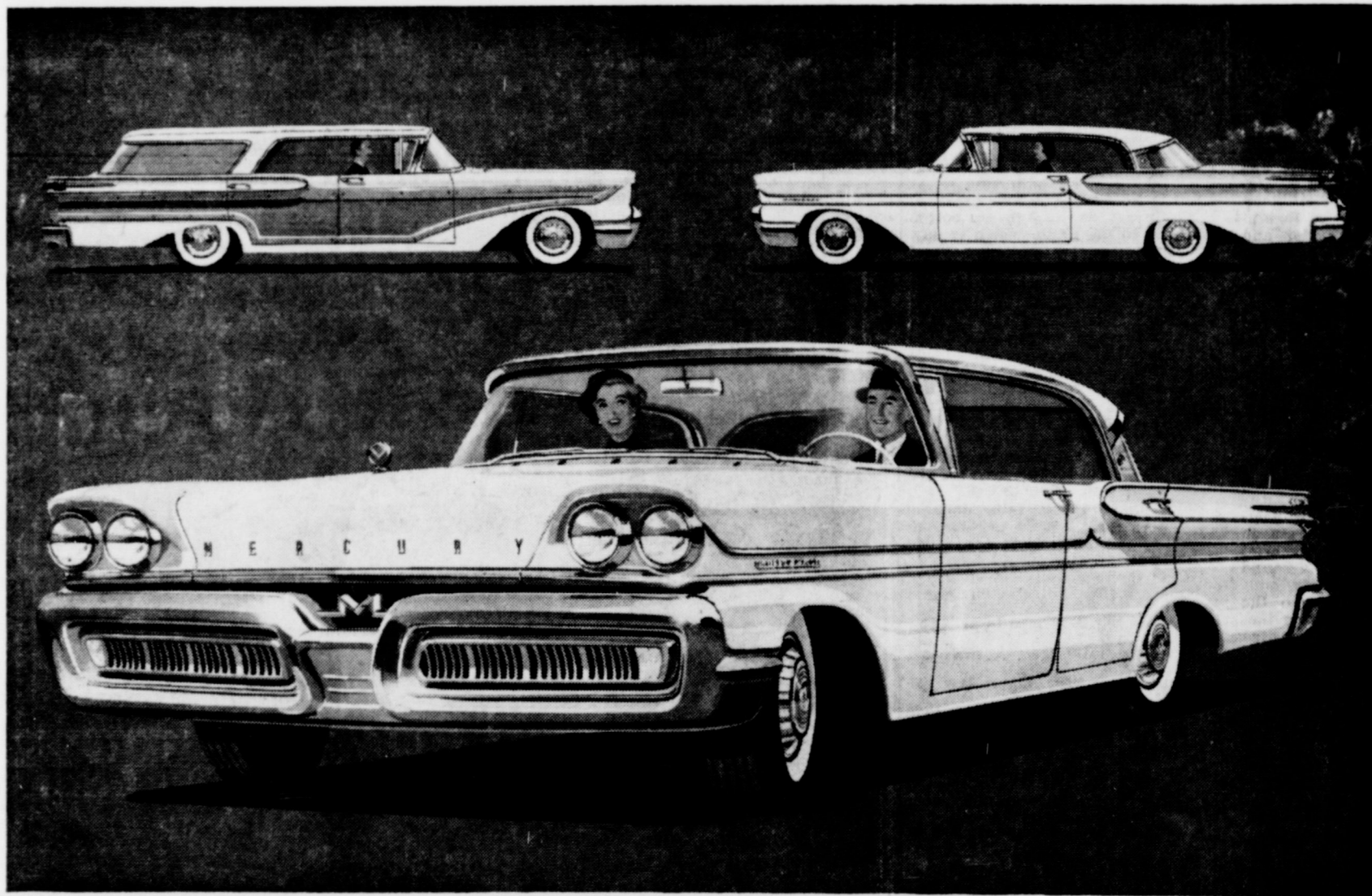

**COMMON SENSE IN HUNTING WILL SAVE HEAVYBROOK**

Fall is in full swing. The air is filled with falling leaves and flying footballs. Mom is giggling out the heavy blankets and sending the winter clothing off to the dry cleaners, while Dad is busy putting up storm windows and taking down summer screens.

During all this hub-bub precipitated by the crisp air descending down on Texas, a great many Texans take time out to litter up the living room with pieces of torn rags and smelly oil and cleaning rods. The reason being that hunting season is soon and it is time to get the old 30-06 out of the closet and start cleaning it so as to be ready on the first day to get that big buck you know is just waiting for you.

Just how many Americans and Texans are going to blow their heads off with an unloaded rifle is a matter of conjecture but it is a hard statistical fact that the death rate from firearms jumps up from an average of about 150 deaths per month to over 250 in October.

In November, when hunting starts in earnest, and normally sane men start blasting away at one another on deer leases or contriving intricate methods of suicide as climbing over barbed wire fences with their rifles off safety, the figure climbs to 349 deaths more or less.

In Texas 169 persons died from firearm accidents last year. It is only reasonable to assume that half of these were attributable to hunting mishaps of one kind or another.

However, death from firearms is not the only way to die during hunting season. A good many hunters slip and fall over precipices while gazing off into the distance instead of watching their steps on unsure ground.

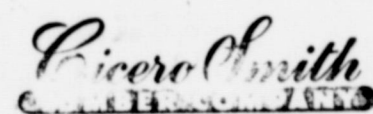
Some get killed before they get to their deer lease in their frantic effort to get there fast combined with a few warming drinks on a chilly pre dawn morning drive.

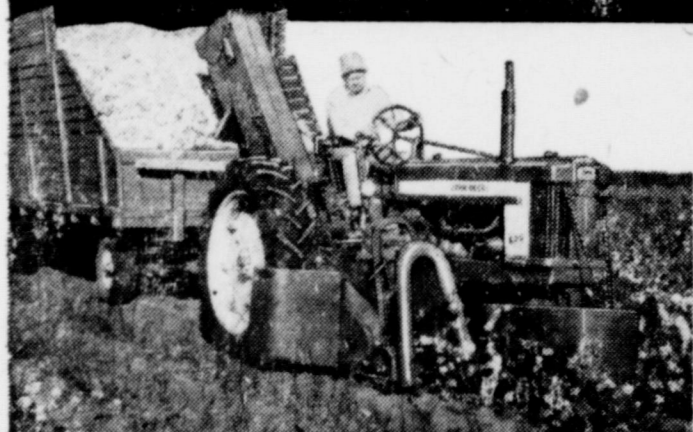

24 large marshmallows, finely cut (or 3 cups of the midgits)  
1/2 cup orange juice or alcoholic flavoring  
6 cups graham cracker crumbs (about 6 doz. 2 1/2-in. crackers, crushed)  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1 1/2 cups seedless raisins (1/2 golden and 1/2 dark are best)  
3/4 cup finely cut dates  
1 cup broken walnuts  
1 1/4 cups cut-up candied fruit, bulk or canned ready-mixed

Line with waxed paper bottom and sides of 9-in. tube pan or loaf pan holding about 6 cups. Put into 2-qt. bowl the milk, marshmallows and orange juice. Let stand. Put crumbs into a large bowl with the cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, raisins, dates and walnuts. Add candied fruit. Mix in milk mixture with a spoon, then with hands until crumbs are moistened. Press firmly into pan. If desired, top with additional nuts and candied fruit. Cover tightly. Chill 2 days before slicing. Keep in refrigerator. Makes 3 1/2 lbs.
