School Bond Election Set For April 21st

Saturday April 21st has been set as the date for the school bond election to vote funds to build a new grade school and retire the \$12,000 of outstanding bonds. Labor Adopts Grass Roots Program; Revision of Farm Parity Suggested

GRASS ROOTS MANIFESTO—Seven hundred small town unionists met in Washington recently, adopted a seven point manifesto, and departed for the Main Streets of America determined to marshal the support of consumer groups, including ladies' clubs, service clubs and farm organizations behind their program.

The home town unionists based their manifesto on the thesis of "equality of sacrifice for all groups." In a statement issued at the close of their meeting the group stated: "We are shocked by the cruel disregard being shown for the interests of everyday American families. We are shocked by the privilege and favoritism bestowed on a single group—big business."

One of the major points of the "grass roots" labor program: "Labor, the farmers, small business and independent consumer groups must be given full representation on all mobilization and stabilization agencies at the policy-making and administrative levels. By so doing, the government can inspire renewed public confidence and public support of controls which otherwise will be hard to take."

MAIN STREET ECONOMY—Although the situation is not too clear at the moment, there seems to be shaping up in congress a battle over the administration's budget that will strike at the Main Street level of the nation before it touches many other segments.

The Big Show

The joint congressional committee, which reported on the nation's economy and the proposed budget, recommended a new study of farm-price supports and reduction of federal grants to states.

Specifically, the report cited next year's budget estimate of \$2,883,000,000 in federal grants to states for highways, public welfare, health, school lunches, agricultural-extension services and agricultural experiment stations, vocational rehabilitation, airports, and other services. All of these services are on the Main Street level and a cut will be felt immediately in the home towns of the nation.

Of all the questions considered in the report, farm parity was the most explosive. The report declared that legislative remedies must be sought to correct a condition which now exists by which prices increasing the cost of living and the cost of defense are geared to the industrial practices which have for many years driven up prices of industrial commodities.

Farm parity, invented at the depths of the depression, is geared to the price of industrial commodities. Revision and modernization of the law will undoubtedly be one of the big questions facing the congress.

HIGHER STILL—Every time the bureau of labor statistics announces its index figures on the cost of living they are always higher, even as administration officials repeat the old refrain that leveling off is "just around the corner."

The bureau's newest figures reported the cost of living up 1.3 per cent, setting another record. The figure was pegged at 183.8 per cent of the 1935-39 base period. This was 8 per cent higher than the level of June, 1950, before the Korean fighting began, and 9.5 per cent above a year ago.

Meanwhile, there were indications that the people in the home towns may be developing some consumer resistance to high prices. The commerce department reported a 3 per cent decline in retail sales. Department store sales were reported down 4 per cent.

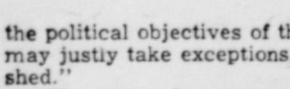
Unofficial reports told of a slackening of consumer buying, possibly because many persons had stocked up heavily last year and possibly because of price climbs.

THE BORROWER—Russia flatly refused recently to return 670 American naval and cargo ships she "borrowed" under the World War II lend-lease program. The Soviet went so far as to state that the United States really does not need the ships.

Reduced to a common denominator, it is like a home town neighbor borrowing your lawn mower and refusing to return it after he has clipped his lawn, and having the nerve to tell you you don't need it anyway, because your lawn doesn't need cutting.

The ships are only one of the lend-lease problems with Russia. The Soviet still has an over-all \$11 billion unsettled lease-account with this nation.

MACARTHUR UNDER FIRE—General Douglas MacArthur, who seems to have a knack of making controversial statements, again threw the state department and the United Nations into an uproar when he asserted he stood ready at any time to confer in the field with the commander in chief of the Chinese and North Korean forces to end the war and "find any military means whereby the realization of the political objectives of the United Nations in Korea, to which no nation may justly take exceptions, might be accomplished without further bloodshed."



and James J. Carroll, who told unsympathetic senators that television cameras scared him. The public liked the show too much to object when a few stations switched to a brief Easter religious service.

The state department immediately asked the defense department and the White House to curb the general's authority to issue diplomatic overtures. The controversy was taken up in the U.N. and MacArthur was criticized by British and French newspapers.

Strong-willed MacArthur, who does not believe in hiding his genius under a blanket, had nothing to say about the criticism of his latest statement. If the state department and the United Nations persist in their demands that MacArthur be silenced permanently, it might mean that pipe-smoking Doug will have his wings clipped for the first time in his long career.

DRAFT CALL CUT—Home town draft boards were notified that their April quotas had been cut in half. The army ordered a quota of 40,000 for the month instead of the previously announced 80,000. Enlistments, running higher than were anticipated, and fewer casualties in Korea than had been feared were given as reasons for the change in the induction rate.

The army at latest reports was only about 100,000 men short of its present goal of 1,500,000 men.

Meanwhile, a congressional spokesman said the army should be able to halt the draft within 18 months and set up its universal-military-training program.

THE AMERICAN FARMER

Farm Plant Value Pegged at 91 Million

American farmers now own 91 billion dollars worth of land, buildings, live stock and equipment. This gigantic food "factory" turned out approximately 30 billion dollars worth of produce in 1950, or a third of the value of the "plant" itself. In 1900 and even in 1910, American agriculture produced only a sixth of its own physical value in a year. Even in prosperous 1929 it produced

a little less than one-fourth of its "plant value," a recent survey revealed.

The farmer has accomplished these gains through a 900 per cent increase in his investment in tools and machinery since 1900, and by use of better methods, better seed, better livestock, and more fertilizer, the report stated.



Congress Forgets Bills

THE MARKED tendency of this congress to resolve itself into an investigating body instead of a legislative body is causing some concern in congressional leaders because important legislation essential to the national security is going by the boards, concern over excessive expenditure of money, and concern that over publicizing through movies, television, radio and other mediums is focusing attention on conditions much less important, insofar as the nation is concerned, than whether our democracy is to survive Communist aggression.

Nothing this congress will do will stamp out gambling so long as the states retain their sovereignty and maintain control over their own laws. Reform elements in the congress fought through one session and could not pass a bill which would prevent shipping slot machines in interstate commerce. The law finally was passed in this congress. However, the manufacturers of slot machines will still make them and they will get around this law by establishing branch plants in states where conditions warrant their operation to evade the interstate shipment.

There is an old axiom that you cannot legislate faith or morale and the proposal of Senator Fullbright of Arkansas, chairman of the committee probing the reconstruction finance corporation, to set up a code of morals for government employees and members of the congress was simply ridiculed.

The question of jailing gangsters, gamblers and heads of crime syndicates is a matter for local police authorities. All are caught sooner or later. The bureau of internal revenue says it has under scrutiny the income tax returns of 2,500 or more gamblers and questionable characters involving some \$50,000,000. The "T" men will get them sooner or later. There are sufficient laws on the state books now to put every law violator behind bars. This congress will never pass a law to outlaw horse racing, nor to prohibit newspapers, or wire services from carrying race results. Good law abiding folks will still play poker and bingo and they'll bet on the outcome of football games and basketball games and other sports events.

Neither Maryland, nor Florida, nor any other state where racing is legal and where pari mutual betting provides a juicy state income will soon abolish their race tracks. The televising of the proceedings of the Kefauver senate committee in New York investigating gambling provided rich entertainment for millions of folks with eyes and ears glued to their sets. However, the televising of a rich, racy murder scandal would prove much more interesting.

McFarland Protests

In this connection, Sen. Ernest W. McFarland, of Arizona, Democratic leader of the senate, after listening to three hours of bickering and name calling over the political significance, if any, of these senate probes, said:

"The time has come when we should spend more time on legislation if we are to do what is expected of us. I say that in all kindness. One investigating committee alone has spent a quarter of a million dollars upon an investigation within the last year (the Kefauver committee), which is a considerable sum of money for one committee to spend. I hope this body will not resolve itself into a group of policemen to such an extent that some will suggest we should wear uniforms. I hope we can get down to the serious consideration of proposed legislation . . ."

82 Investigations

This congress has reached the half-way point and has not passed a single piece of vital legislation. It has probed and probed and probed. Someone figured there were 82 separate investigations and hearings going on by congressional committees.

RFC Probe to Continue

Senator Fullbright has finally decided to continue his investigation of the RFC, big government lending agency, after telling the senate his probe was complete. The probe unearthed no law violations. It did unearth some conflicting testimony and the fact that some government employees accepted favors after loans were made and that so-called "undue influence" was used to obtain these loans.

GOP Pushes Probe

Senator Fullbright was literally goaded into continuing the investigation by Republican senators who baited him with barbed shafts. These digs came principally from Senators Kern, of Missouri, Wherry of Nebraska, Bricker of Ohio, and Capehart of Indiana. Debate came over discussion of RFC loans of \$18,500,000 to a company of which Guy Gabrielson, GOP national chairman, was president and counsel.

THE READER'S DATE BOOK Housewives to Study Facilities During 'Demonstration Week'

Some 50,000 home towns across the nation will participate in Home Demonstration Week (April 29 to May 5) with programs highlighting the role of the home in preserving American ideals, supporting defense programs on the home front, and sharing their home-making know-how and leadership experience with other homemakers.

Along the Main Streets of many home towns the merchants will consolidate their efforts to display the latest appliances that make home-making a pleasure to the American housewife.

A strong America needs stronger homes, and during Home Demonstration Week rural women will take stock of their resources and plan to reinforce the most important segments of the home front. One-third of the million and a quarter homemakers who took part in home demonstration program last year live in villages and small cities. A home is the same on the farm or in the city.

Today's home is better equipped than it was five years ago. For example, five years ago about 48 per cent of the farm homes had electricity; now more than 75 per cent of them are wired for mechanization, and three-fourths of the current used goes for household operations.

Usually an electric refrigerator and a water system come first. Grandma's housekeeping tricks have given way to new and modern techniques and appliances.

Now about 57,500 home demonstration clubs in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico hold regular meetings to study and to acquire skill in homemaking. These women are constantly in search of new and approved appliances to make homemaking easier and more efficient.

Today 3,500 county home demonstration agents and assistant agents serve these clubs and organize other programs to meet the needs and desires of local women of the country.

During Sleep Show time (April 16-28) homemakers in the small towns of the nation will have a chance to view all the newest bedding styles and learn how to sleep better.

Local furniture and department stores throughout the country will have on display the latest and best bedding for 1951. It will be a concentrated effort of Main Street merchants to introduce new models, new styles and new construction in sleeping equipment to their communities.

The small town homemaker will see the remarkable advances made in dual purpose bedding since last year. Smartly styled davenport and chair beds with inner construction that can quickly convert them from handsome sofas and chairs to comfortable beds will be displayed.

THE RURAL TEACHER

Community Indifference Causing Teachers to Leave Rural Schools

Much has been written about the small town and rural school plant, the need of new construction, expansion, and new equipment. But little has been said about the small town and rural school teacher, after all the most important part of any school system.

Today rural areas are finding it increasingly more difficult to keep good teachers in their schools. Low pay alone is not responsible. Unpleasant living conditions, lack of social life, public indifference to the job they are doing, are all a part of the dissatisfaction that accounts for the frequent resignation in many communities.

Today, with the shortage of rural teachers so critical, they can afford to be independent, an article in the March issue of Successful Farming magazine points out. They will pick the community which offers pleasant working conditions. They will refuse to stay among people who do not accept them as equal and who do not cooperate in the aims of education.

The physical discomforts of the low salaries, the restricted social life, are definite drawbacks to teaching. But even they shrink in importance if the people a teacher works with are cooperative and friendly. In the teacher's eyes, educating young people is a satisfying and rewarding job. But this can only be so if parents, school boards, and the children themselves show a disposition to work with her toward this end, rather than being a block to it.

Some schools have an active and progressive Parent-Teacher association that helps thresh out some of the problems. But even among these groups there is too much emphasis placed on general rather than specific problems. Speakers may be imported to give their views on sex education, or parents and teachers may discuss such questions as whether or not girls should wear jeans to school. But individual problems seldom come to the surface.

Here's what could take place. After coming forward to introduce himself, a father remarks: "My boy has been pretty much of a problem at home these days and I judge he may be at school, too. I wonder if we could work together and try to understand him." Or, "My Tim's grades show he isn't doing well in English. Is there any way I might help?"

Most of the problems teachers face stem from simple misunderstanding and thoughtlessness on the part of parents and the community. Little courtesies, and expressions of friendship and cooperation will make a good teacher want to stay in your school. It will also help turn an ordinary teacher into a true educator, one who brings out the best in your child.

Teachers Desire Normal Community Life

Teachers still are looked on in the community not as individuals, but as a group. Most often they are invited "en masse" to social functions. Actually, a teacher is just as anxious to make friends outside her work as anyone else. She's eager to join clubs and organizations and to lead a normal life in the community in which she works.

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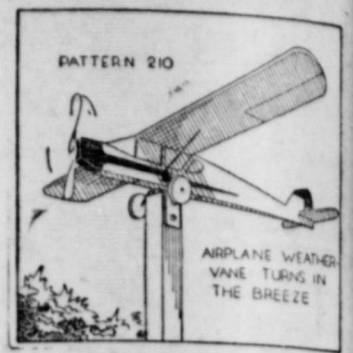

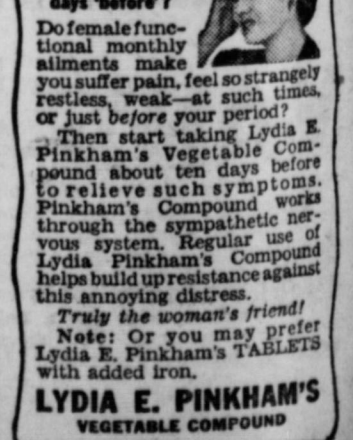

University of Minnesota Develops Two New Fruits

Two new fruits, a sour pie cherry, and an apple, have been developed by the University of Minnesota agricultural experiment station and are being introduced to home gardeners this year. W. H. Alderman, chief of the division of horticulture, reports.
 Named the Northstar cherry (Minn. No. 58) and the Lakeland apple (Minn. No. 978) because of their adaptability to conditions in that state, both are winter hardy enough to succeed in southern Minnesota and possibly farther south.
 The Northstar cherry should be a valuable addition to the home garden for beauty as well as fruit, according to Alderman. It is the first pie cherry developed by the university and probably will prove to be the hardiest and best adapted of any of the pie cherries grown in Minnesota. The Lakeland apple has promise of becoming an important commercial variety.
 Introduction of the two new fruits brings to well over a hundred the number of fruits, vegetables and ornamental plants developed by the University of Minnesota to meet the climatic conditions of that and other northern states.

Garden Plan



Many gardeners never plan their gardens. As a result, they sometimes find themselves space-short and loaded with an unbalanced variety of vegetables. The above plan perhaps contains too many varieties for the average home gardener, but it gives a general idea of what garden planning can do. From it the average gardener can draw his own plan and eliminate those vegetables he does not wish to bother with or which his family does not particularly like. Every gardener will find that planning pays big dividends.

Vegetables Good Method To Increase Farm Income

Farmers in North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia who want to earn extra income during 1951 might do well to try producing vegetables, fruits or nuts, farm management specialists report.
 Continued high employment and high income are expected to create a stronger demand for vegetables during the coming year. The increased demand is expected to continue next year.

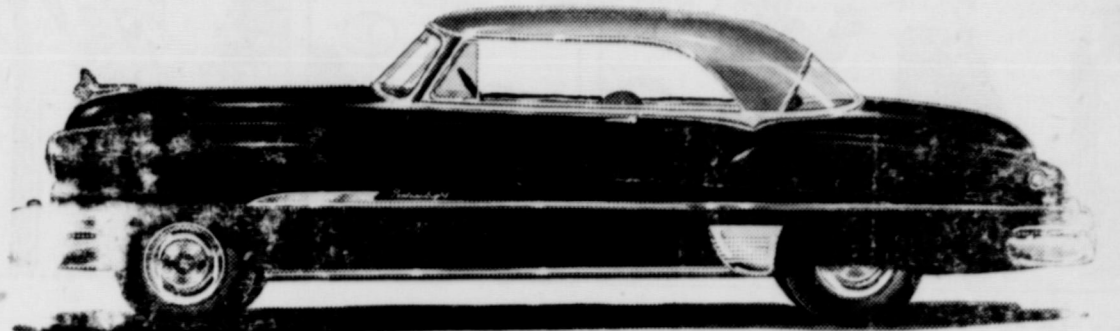

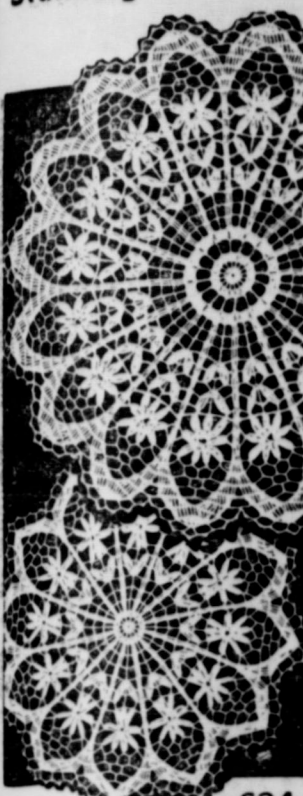

Spring Permanents Will Cut Summer Grooming Task

NOW'S THE TIME to do something about your hair, before the heat is here in earnest, and the humidity makes you feel too tired to do something constructive.

There's time to acquire a new and becoming style, to get or give yourself a permanent, and to practice managing a new style so your hair can be at its very best. Do it now, and you'll have one less grooming and beauty problem for the summer months.

If you've ever gone through the summer with a wilted head of hair that soon becomes the bane of your existence with its stringiness, its lack of easy management, you'll realize the importance of getting it into training now.

Then, too, if you haven't changed the style of your hair-do since slightly longer hair came into being, it's high time you took your head into competent hands, your own or a professional's. You may have your curls, or a softly tapered look, you may have bangs, or a hair-do that sweeps to the side, a chignon that gives you dignity, or anything that makes you feel prettier and more glamorous.

You'll want to look your prettiest, too, comes the long-awaited vaca-

tion. If you make beauty preparations now, you'll have the routine set easily as well as the advantage of preparations that will make you look your very best.

If the hair is not in condition, then spend a week or two getting it groomed for a permanent. Banish the split ends, bring life and luster to your locks with a nightly brushing that's thorough and stimulating, get oil treatments to help along any dryness that may have appeared, and your hair will soon shine like a halo in its new beauty.

Healthy Hair Points Up Style of Coiffure

Neither personalized and well-styled hair nor the best available permanent can do something for your hair if its condition is poor. Well-kept hair on the other hand will do more than can possibly be imagined for any style or permanent.

Hair which is too dry and split at the ends will benefit from scalp massage, brushing and some oil treatments. The latter may be given at home, or they may be sought professionally.

Only hair which offers just as many problems in its own way, as dry hair, will do well with frequent shampooing. Be certain to get it something more towards normal in condition before you attempt styling or a permanent.

Lack-luster hair will benefit from exercising the scalp by means of massage, as well as daily brushing. You can do much to bringing it back to life with simple treatments faithfully followed.

Pin Curl Permanent



If you want to give yourself an easy permanent that yields a very soft, natural looking wave, set the hair in pin curls, as you would after shampooing. Apply waving lotion, process, then neutralize. This method saves winding the hair on curlers as well as re-setting after the permanent.

For hot weather it's advisable to choose a style which is easily managed. Choose something which will take well in its stride swimming, tennis, golf or in whatever sport you engage. Remember, too, that the weather is going to be warm, and you don't want to fuss constantly with a coiffure that's elaborate enough to need this kind of attention.

The style of your clothes and hats may help determine the coiffure, too, but mainly it's a problem of fitting hair to your type face. At any rate choose something that will make you more attractive than usual, and it will be a happier you who looks from the mirror when shining, alive hair is put in place.

Give Permanent a Chance By Following Directions

You can give yourself a permanent in the not so busy after dinner hours, while you're sewing, mending or doing any of the odd jobs that come up for attention. It's a simple and easy process, and the secret to success lies in following directions.

Paste or tape these directions to

your mirror before you start, or prop them on the dressing table. Set the materials for the permanent on a surface which is handy to the mirror.

Before you actually start the permanent, have in mind just what will transpire. You might even try underlining the important points with a bright crayon so that you can find them at a glance while you're busy winding, saturating or neutralizing.

Just as with a professional permanent, clean hair is a pre-requisite of every permanent. Any dirt

or excess oil in the hair fiber interferes with the action of the waving lotion. Two good sudsings and a thorough clear water rinse will leave the hair clean and ready for a wave.

Parting off correctly sized curl blocks is important so that the curl all around the head will be smooth and even. Too much hair in the curlers results in bunched curls which will be difficult to smooth properly on the head. With too much hair in each curl, you'll also find that waving lotion and neutralizer cannot penetrate properly.

Timing is important for it may vary from permanent to permanent as the condition of the hair is a guide to how long it needs to be processed. Take the test curls as specified, and never go over the amount of time for your type of hair.

Blot off any excess waving lotion before applying the neutralizer. It's possible to over-wave, but not to over-neutralize, so allow proper time for the latter.

Pin Curl Permanent Gives Natural Wave

Those with fine, soft hair would do best to give themselves a nice firm curl which results from winding the hair on the curlers. Those with more body in their hair and those who like a very soft, easily managed wave will like the new pin curl permanent.

The time to give one of these permanents is shortened from the other process since it eliminates the wind-

ing and re-setting process of most home permanents. No end papers are used since the strands of hair are simply dampened with waving lotion and rolled into a pin curl, just as you do for an "after-shampoo" set.

After all curls are wound, wet them again with the remainder of the waving lotion. No time or test curls are necessary. It takes 45 minutes for any type of hair, and after that you just start neutralizing. This process is the same as with other home permanents.

It's not essential to remove the pin curls after neutralizing, as the hair has been set in its original pattern at the start. When the head is dry, simply remove the pins and brush the curls out into a soft, smooth wave.

Care for Hair After Permanent

The soft, glossy appearance of the hair after permanents, both professional and home types, is not merely an accident. It's the result of healthy hair before and care after the permanent.

Brushing does more to bring back natural oils to the hair than any single thing. This takes a bit of work, but it's easy if you split the brushing into two sessions.

They may be morning and evening sessions, or if you prefer, split the evening sessions into two parts.

Brush the hair by blocks, and get the brush close to the scalp with each stroke. In this way you assure an even exercising of the scalp with natural oil flowing to the hair.

Such chatter as is heard today was unknown: "Jen says Tom's crazy for one; she won't. I think you're terrible not to have another, Connie. Fran says that as soon as they're home she's thinking of having one."

50 Years Ago

Young wives 50 years ago did not relate in detail to their intimates everything that went on in their own apartments. Young women and girls did not eagerly exchange books that plunge to the very roots and elaborate upon the most frightful abnormalities of human living. Every corner drugstore did not display all of the who-dun-its, the westerns, the dictionaries and Bibles, those sinister, filthy little volumes whose contents drip like

contests on the screen. Burlesque shows aren't as popular as they were; they degenerated into mere displays of stupid fat girls so obviously morons that all excitement and beauty went out of the show. But there are "peep" shows beginning again, and if your town is threatened with one, do what you can to prevent its coming.

Lift A Protest

When you come across a coarse, salacious, immoral paper-covered book, speak to the druggist. When a movie shows, as one did lately, a stupid looking man sitting immersed in a small tub of suds, and looking as bewildered and bored as was every sensible woman who saw him, drop the manager a line. Wear strapless gowns if your figure is young and flawless—not otherwise. They may look all right in the shop, but when you force that roll of 35 or 40-year-old flesh up into a collar above them, they look all wrong. Wear a sensible bathing suit, of course. But don't squeeze falsies into the top of it and shorten the tights so that every time you move lumps and folds of your person threaten spontaneous combustion.

Modesty is a lovely thing. But like everything else worth while it is a slow and delicate growth. You can't be careless and coarse and enjoy whispered filthy jokes and shocking freedoms in your speech and your reading until you are 35, and then turn around and drop all your associates and attempt to join any group of really fine women.

It seems to me we American mothers and grandmothers might do something about this, because indecency in these superficial ways does lead to permanent danger for the rising generation.

Ozone Blanket Protects Life

Form of Oxygen Absorbs Ultra-Violet Sunlight

Washington, D.C.—New equipment for measuring the thickness of the earth's ozone blanket, upon which probably depends all life on this planet, is being tested by astrophysicists. Their equipment measures the amount of a single narrow wave band of infrared light that gets through to the earth's surface.

Despite the extreme importance of the ozone blanket, all means of measuring its thickness in the past have had serious drawbacks. The new equipment, if it performs as well as hoped, should make possible accurate ozone measures from day to day, and possibly also indicate the height of the blanket in the atmosphere.

Ozone is a molecular form of oxygen. It is created in the upper atmosphere, 15 miles or more above the earth's surface, by the action of ultraviolet light from the sun on the molecules of ordinary atmospheric oxygen. An extremely thin layer is formed—about two to three millimeters at surface pressure.

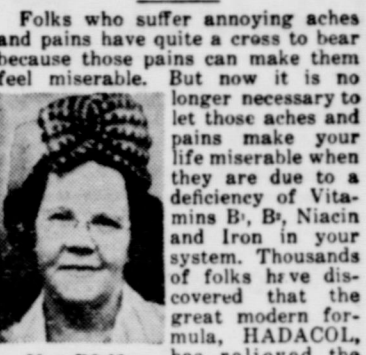

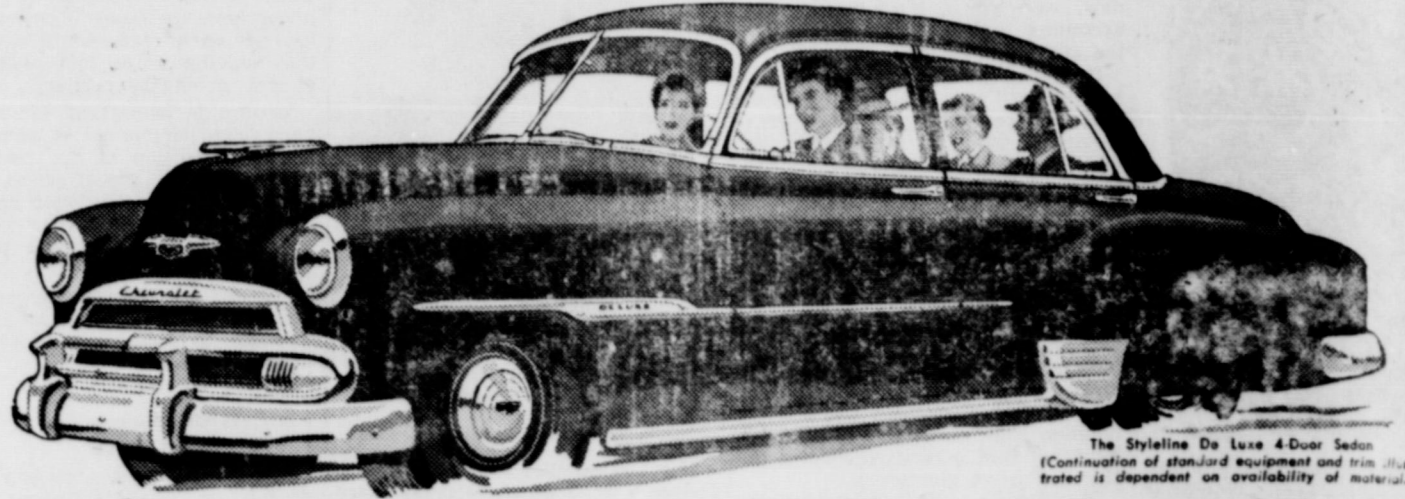

Let Salads Provide Zest to Mealtimes On Warm, Lazy Days

PROVIDING APPETITE stimulating zest in family menus is the goal of every thoughtful homemaker when the lazy days of spring arrive. Since the best of appetites lack enthusiasm at this season, the tonic of good food nicely served can be the most effective of tactics.

Gay salads, bright as the first spring flowers, are one good way of reviving food interest. Let them be menu accompaniments, main dish salads or dessert-salad combinations.

Keep them fresh, crisp and cold. Chill the plates for the salad as well as all the individual ingredients for several hours before preparation time. Handle as little as possible to prevent a wilted look, and the natural goodness of the foods will do the rest.

CITRUS SALMON SALAD (Serves 4)
1 pound canned salmon
1 cup cabbage, finely shredded
1/2 cup pineapple, cut in pieces
1/2 grapefruit sections
1/4 cup green pepper, cut in strips
2 hard-cooked eggs, quartered
Lemon juice
French dressing
Flake the salmon in large flakes. Arrange a bed of shredded cabbage on salad plates. Place salmon flakes, four grapefruit sections, pineapple, green pepper strips and hard-cooked eggs on cabbage bed. Sprinkle lemon juice lightly over all. Serve with French dressing.

Baked Sea Food Salad (Serves 6-8)
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup minced onion
1 cup chopped celery
1 cup cooked flaked crab meat
1 cup cooked shrimp
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 cups corn flakes
1/4 cup butter
Paprika
Combine green pepper, onion, celery, crab meat, shrimp, mayonnaise, salt and Worcestershire sauce; mix well. Place the mixture in individual shells or shallow baking dish 9"x9". Cover with corn flakes; dot with butter, and sprinkle paprika over top. Bake in a moderate oven (350°) about 30 minutes. Serve with slices of lemon.

Continental Salad Bowl
Watercress
Lettuce leaves
Curly endive
Peas
Raw cauliflower tips
Kidney beans
Julienne American cheese
Salad dressing
In separate sections of a salad bowl place watercress, lettuce leaves, curly endive, peas, cauliflower, and kidney beans. Serve with a bowl of julienne American cheese and a bowl of salad dressing.

***Chow Mein Salad (Serves 6-8)**
2 cups finely cut cooked chicken (or pork and veal)
1 cup drained, canned bean sprouts
1 small can water chestnuts, sliced
1/2 cup diced pineapple

Frozen Cranberry Peach Salad (Serves 10)
3 cups diced peaches
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 packages cream cheese
1 cup canned cranberry sauce
1/2 cup whipped cream
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Drain and dice peaches. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Blend together mayonnaise and cream cheese. Then blend in cranberry sauce, mixing thoroughly. Fold in whipped cream, salt, peaches, and chopped nuts. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm. Garnish with walnut halves. Cut in squares. Serve on lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise or whipped cream.

Dressy salads never fail to please the palate. Try black cherries in hearts of lettuce, pineapple spears, avocado slices, balls of cream cheese and black olives.

A chilly salad that looks as cool as it's meant to be includes orange slices, sliced, Bermuda onions and cucumbers. Have the greens chilly, too, and serve with Thousand Island dressing.

Flake the crabmeat and blend with diced cucumber and mayonnaise. Serve on thick ripe slices of tomato perched on thin slices of toast.

Cream your lobster for a change and serve on top of rice. A sprinkling of slivered almonds and coconut makes an epicurean dish of this.

For a lovely seasonal dessert that's pretty as well as delicious, place scoops of lime sherbet in meringue shells and serve with thickened pineapple syrup.

Salad-Dessert Loaf (Serves 6)
1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
2 egg yolks
1 tablespoon melted butter
1/2 cup mild vinegar
3 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
Few grains cayenne if desired
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons canned pineapple juice
1 cup prepared fruit
1 cup evaporated milk, whipped
Soften gelatin in cold water. Beat egg yolks and salt. Add vinegar, sugar, butter, cayenne, paprika, and pineapple juice gradually. Whip lightly. Add milk and cook in top of double boiler until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Remove from fire and dissolve softened gelatin in hot custard mixture. Chill, stirring occasionally while cooling. When mixture begins to set, fold in whipped evaporated milk and fruit, cut in small pieces (orange, cherries, canned pineapple, grapefruit, peaches, pears, or any desired fruit combination.) Turn into a large mold that has been rinsed out in cold water first, and chill. When firm, unmold on platter and garnish with green pepper. Trim platter with salad greens. Serve with open-face sandwiches, if desired, for dessert luncheon.

Warm weather salads that have style, zest and flavor are easy to create when you start with a macaroni base. This one uses thin apple wedges, orange sections and avocado slices, and may also have a small mold of jellied fruit salad.

THE LIVING GOD
THE FULL meaning of what the Bible has to tell us about God can be discovered best by coming toward an understanding of what the covenant idea means. What is meant by the Covenant God, one who makes covenants with men?

First of all, it means that God is living. He is not a mere observer of events with which He has nothing to do. If we could put it into modern American language, God does not sit in the bleachers; He plays the game. He does not, as it were, read the newspapers to see how the war against evil goes on; He is out on the field directing the battles.

God is not something to be talked about, a problem, an X; He is not a creation of men's minds, God is not a name for an idea. He is more alive than any one who thinks about Him. He is more real than any who ever doubted Him.

Only Persons Make Covenants
THE GREAT difference between things and people is that people have wills of their own. And God is a person. You will not find in the Bible any statement directly saying that God is personal, or a person; but every time a Covenant between God and man is mentioned, the idea of personality is there.

No one who ever knew God would think of calling Him "It" even with capital letters. If we say "He" about God it is not because we think He is masculine; it would be quite as true to call Him Mother-God as Father-God.

As Dr. Reynolds, Presbyterian missionary to Korea, has pointed out, all the best qualities we associate with motherhood are in the Bible attributed to God. So if we call God "He" what we are emphasizing is that He is personal. That He has intelligence and will of His own, no vague It or That or "All."

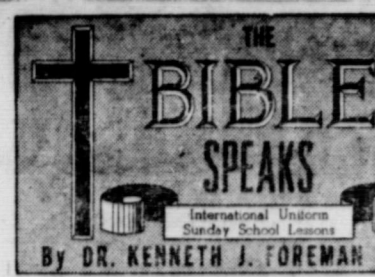
Then the Covenant God is one who takes the initiative. The Bible tells of a God who does not wait on a snow clad peak of eternity till lost mankind somehow breaks a trail up the vast ranges to His lofty throne. It tells of a God who walks in the valley of the shadows, seeking men. All religions have gods, some of them very "high and lifted up"; but only the Bible reveals the true God, whose mercy does not have to be bought or coaxed, but a God who approaches man in mercy, a God who is all-giving Love.

God Makes His Own Terms
AT THE same time, God remains God. He is not on a level with man. He takes the initiative, but also He makes His own terms. We cannot dictate to Him. We cannot draw up our own contracts, so to speak. God made promises to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and we are "heirs of the promises."

But these promises are not promiscuous. To put it quite simply: God is not on friendly terms with every one. He is a friend to all who will be His friends. But with those who turn their backs, who go their own ways, who care little or nothing for His great purposes, who do not seek His will, God makes no covenants.

God's will is the welfare of mankind. God's will is the destruction of evil, the creation and triumph of good. God is light and in Him is no darkness at all. If we love darkness rather than light, we have no right to be called His people. We cannot call ourselves His people because we are Americans, or because we belong to some church; we can call ourselves His people only if our hearts are in tune with His.

'We Are His People'

Lesson for April 15, 1951

WHEN A Christian today in church repeats the ancient Psalm, "We are His people," if he knows what he is saying he is associating himself with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The God of the Bible is not a "great first cause" or a "principle" of any sort. First and always He is the God of the Covenant. Over and over again He is called the "God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob."

The stories of these men are not mere campfire tales of legendary ancestors. They are the story of how these men were related to God in a solemn covenant; they were "God's people" in a special way. In the New Testament we find the strange yet stirring declaration that God was "not ashamed to be their God."
