The Tahoka attorney is a member of the State Bar of Texas, having previously served in that organization as a Director, and as a member of the State Bar Unaffiliated Practice Committee. He is presently serving as a member of the State Bar on the Committee For The Administration of Justice. He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka and of the Masonic Lodge, Mr. Smith is married to the former Lucille Hunt, and has a son, Gordon, who is a student in the Southwest Seminary in Ft. Worth, and a daughter, Carol, who is a sophomore in Baylor U.

Spiderweb Business Proves Profitable In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.—Such precision devices as sunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed hairs. Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "hairs" are made.

Her business goes back to her childhood when, because of her frail health, her parents encouraged her to be out-of-doors as much as possible. She became interested in insect life—first moths and butterflies, then crickets, and finally spiders.

By 1930, when 27, she had been experimenting with extracting the stiken web from spiders for several years. The government was inquiring whether the web would be produced commercially.

Human hairs had been utilized for years in sunsights, bombsights and periscopes, but were susceptible to extreme temperatures. They contracted and broke in the sub-zero cold of the stratosphere—and sagged in high temperatures. An extremely fine, sturdy and elastic strand was needed—and the spider web was the answer.

Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer draws the silk from one of the spider's spinnerets and reels it on a metal frame for shipment.

EARLY FILING OF TAX URGED
 Requirements for filing federal income tax returns for 1961 were announced today by Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue Service, Dallas.

Briefly - "most people with \$600 or more of gross income for 1961 must file a return with Uncle Sam" the Director said. Every citizen or resident of the U. S. A. — whether adult or minor — who had \$600 or more gross income in 1961 must file: if 65 or over \$1200 or more.

However if you are self-employed, you file a return if your self-employment income was \$400 or more even if your gross income was less than \$600. A person with income of less than these amounts should file a 1961 return to get a refund if tax was withheld.

Area taxpayers are urged to file their returns for 1961 with their IRS District Director as soon after Jan. 1, 1962 as possible. Although the filing deadline is April 15, those who wait until the last minute find it more difficult to get technical help the nearer the final day approaches. Also last minute income tax filers make more costly errors in their returns. Taxpayers with technical problems may have them solved by phoning IRS at 1600 19th st. in Lubbock.

FAMILY HEALTH RECORD IS USEFUL

Sooner or later everyone needs a family health record. Dr. J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner, suggests you start yours now if you are not already keeping one. Kept accurate and current, it can be of permanent value for the children's school records, for insurance data and for your family doctor's use. The health official says. A school note pad makes a good record book, but don't use it for anything else. And remember it has to be carefully kept, if it is to be of full value.

You can start by jotting down the basic information you already have at hand concerning the injury and illness history of each member of your family.

Start it off with a brief listing of family history. Enter the date and place of birth of each person and the place and date and cause of death of any deceased. Also enter pertinent information and the medical facts about each family member such as the presence of chronic illness or physical handicap.

Next start a section for dates of immunizations, being sure to provide space for each member of the family. Allow room for entering dates of immunizations against whooping cough, polio, smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus, and typhoid fever. Don't forget to include the dates of booster shots.

In a section of general information list such things as the type of blood each member of the family has, and the drug sensitivities or special allergies of each. If the RH blood factor is known to be present in anyone, be sure to record it.

February 5 thru March 30th has been designated as sign-up time for producers who wish to comply with the 1962 feed grain program. Provisions of the 1962 program are very similar to those for 1961. Barley, which was not included in the 1961 program, has been included in this year's program. Local county ASCS offices and county agents can supply information on the 1962 program.

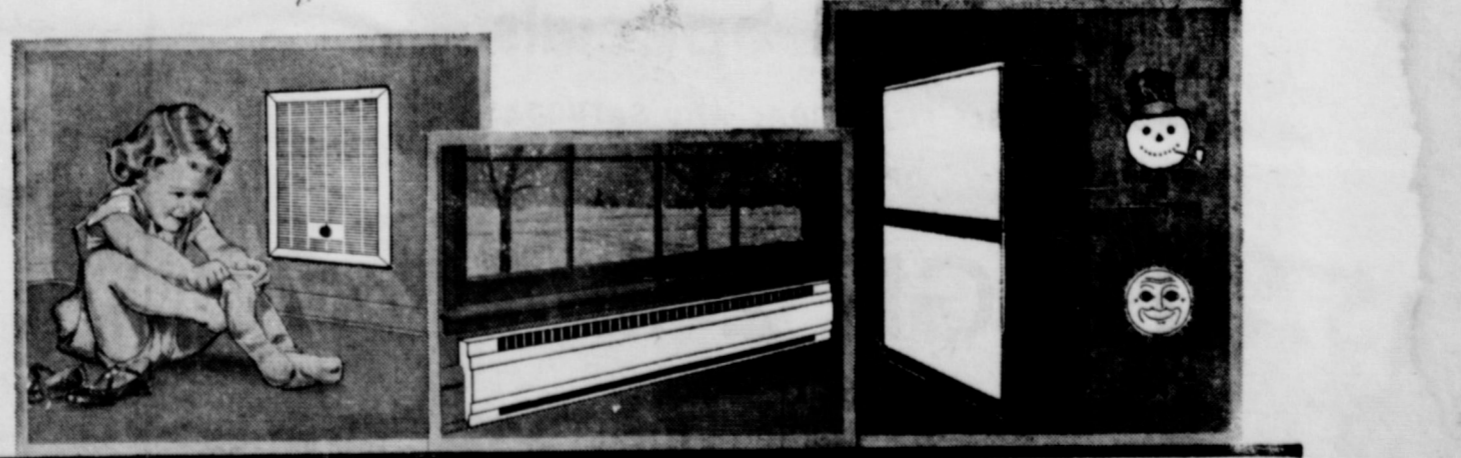
