

## 19th Hole

Why are standards of golf etiquette needed? What do these standards do for you, the golfer? Without these rules of courtesy on the golf course, we would all probably be running around in circles out there trying to finish a golf game in one piece. The rules of golf courtesy provide for your safety on the course and also are to add to the enjoyment of the game for everyone.

Recently I have become very alarmed at some of the problems we have had at Shady Oaks concerning golf courtesy. Our play is becoming quite heavy now that the weather has begun to get a little nicer. So it is becoming increasingly important that all of our golfers observe the common courtesies on the golf course.

Remember, please, that slower golfers should always allow faster player to play through. Many people seem to resent the fact that they often have to let people play through them. This is the wrong attitude. Always remember that you are not the only person on the golf course, and that others cannot enjoy their game if they are forced to stand around and wait between every shot.

Some of our cart players are already forgetting one of the most important rules we have at Shady Oaks, and that is that all powered golf carts and pull carts should be kept at least 50 feet from the green. Some of our bunkers and fringes around the greens are beginning to show the effects of people neglecting to keep their carts far enough away. The same applies to our tee boxes. It is very upsetting to see people riding carts, pulling hand carts and carrying clubs onto our tee boxes. The tee box should get the same treatment as a green. After all, they get just as much traffic as the greens.

A golfer should always leave the golf course in the same condition (or better) than you found it. Divots in the fairways should be repaired as well as possible. Ball marks on our greens are actually beginning to make putting difficult. A ball mark is really very simple to repair. All you have to do is punch a golf tee into the turf around the mark and push it toward the center of the mark. This should be done all around the damaged spot and then this should be pressed down with the head of your putter.

Two golfers playing out of one bag is strictly prohibited. This is something that has caused slow play here in the past, but the problem will be corrected in the future.

Groups larger than foursomes will not be allowed on weekends. During the week, players must check with the pro before teeing off with more than a foursome. Also if you are in a two-some and you see one or two more players waiting to play, ask them to join you. They will appreciate it and you will be helping to speed play by making one less group on the course.

## WAYNE BAIZE TO EXHIBIT WORKS IN WTCC ART SHOW

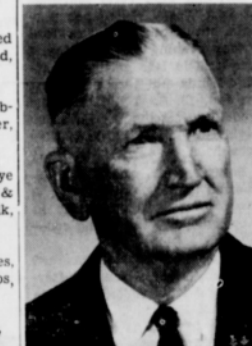
