New Co-op Gin Sets Open House Sund'y

The Farmers Co-op Ass'n of O'Donnell is holding open house Sunday from 1 to 5 p. m. of their new Gordin Unit System gin. We don't Martin, gin manager, said this week it took about four months to build this new gin and it is the only one of its kind in the world. The gin was built as a demonstration plant. It is housed in a modern 146 by 50 ft. colored metal building. When operating at capacity it will gin 15 bales per hour or 700 bales per day.

There will be a number of Gordin men on hand to take the guests on a tour and explain the new ginning process.

Extension entomologists advise checking the grain supplies regularly for infestations of these pests. If they are discovered in the grain, the storage structure should be fumigated immediately. FLU IS DUE TO HIT AREA

Austin — Between now and mid-December is the critical period for taking immunizing shots against influenza J particularly for people in "high risk groups."

Health and medical authorities are in unanimous agreement as to the probability of an upswing in flu this fall and winter. Especially vulnerable are people with heart disease, pulmonary disease, diabetes and other chronic illnesses, persons over 65 and pregnant women.

Most of the \$6,000 flu-triggered deaths between September 1957 and March 1960 were among people in these categories.

Some Asian flu outbreaks are expected, since they come in two to three year cycles. Also Texas is due for Type B flu outbreaks which usually come in four to six year cycles. Asian flu has been dormant in Texas since March 1960 and it has been more than six years since Type B has caused much of a flurry.

State Health Department officials say susceptible persons should be vaccinated early for maximum protection. Generally the most troublesome time for flu in Texas is toward the latter part of December.

To reduce the hazards to persons in high risk categories, it is recommended that they be immunized with a multiple virus vaccine — a product which will protect against more than one form of the disease well before the beginning of the flu season. Protective antibodies usually develop within two weeks after inoculation so it is important that the vaccine be administered before epidemics occur.



Older farm workers find it easier to qualify for social security benefits because of recent changes in the social security law, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security office. Men who were 65 or women who

were 62 before 1958, for example now need credit for only six quarters (about one and half years) of work under social security to qualify for benefits. For each year after 1956, a man was under 65 or a woman was under 62, an additional quarter of work is figured. Mr. Hutton went on to explain that a farm worker who is paid

\$150 or more in cash farm wages in a year by an employer, or who works for a farm employer on 20 or more days in a year for cash pay figured on a time basis, receives social security credit for his earnings. Farm work doesn't have to be done all thru the year to get credit for the full four quarters of a year. Four hundred dollars paid during a summer harvest season give credit for four quarters of work for that year. The farm worker in general, and the older one in particular who is seeking enough credit to qualify for social security benefits should make sure his wages are reported to his social security account. Future benefits are based on the earnings credited to the social security record. Employers are required by law to

farm worker can help his employer in this respect by having his social security card available when he reports for work. The farm employer who has a record of each employee's number and the total amount of cash wages paid in a full year will be able to make up his social security return accurately at the close of the year when it is due. A worker can check on his social security account at any time to see if past wages have been credited properly. Keep accurate payroll records.



Older farm workers find it easier to qualify for social security benefits because of recent changes in the social security law, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security office.

Men who were 65 or women who were 62 before 1956, for example, now need credit for only six quarters (about one and half years) of work under social security to qualify for benefits. For each year after 1956, a man was under 65 or a woman was under 62, an additional quarter of work is figured.

Mr. Hutton went on to explain that a farm worker who is paid \$150 or more in cash farm wages in a year by an employer, or who works for a farm employer on 20 or more days in a year for cash pay figured on a time basis, receives social security credit for his earnings. Farm work doesn't have to be done all thru the year to get credit for the full four quarters of a year. Four hundred dollars paid during a summer harvest season give credit for four quarters of work for that year. The farm worker in general, and the older one in particular

who is seeking enough credit to qualify for social security benefits should make sure his wages are reported to his social security account. Future benefits are based on the earnings credited to the social security record.

Employers are required by law to farm worker can help his employer in this respect by having his social security card available when he reports for work. The farm employer who has a record of each employee's number and the total amount of cash wages paid in a full year will be able to make up his social security return accurately at the close of the year when it is due. A worker can check on his social security account at any time to see if past wages have been credited properly. Keep accurate payroll records.

Most Drinking Starts Before College Days

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the men students drink."
