person dosn't have to quit working completely or sell his business to become eligible for Old-Age Insurance benefits under the Soc-Security Act, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security district office.

The Law regired that deductions be made from benefits of eligible persons if their earnings from work or a business are over \$1200 in a year. However, even through earnings are over \$1200, the worker or self-employed person would be eligible for one or more monthly payments if the earnings were not more than \$2080 per year.

Hutton explained further that it is also possible for a beneficiary to receive payments when earnings exceed \$2080; no deductions are made for a n y month in which earnings are \$80 or less, or the beneficiary is 72 years of age or older.

Persons who meet the age and work requirements should inguire about benefits even though they are still employed, or are in business for themselves. Hutton stressed that the difference between being elifor beefits and actually rebenefits is only too often the mere filling of a claim.
