Big 3-Day Rodeo Starts Thursday

Hundreds of visitors will jam our streets and western attire will be the order of the day. An hour long program of music and stunts will be presented each afternoon immediately prior to the street parade. Participants will be local and area talent.

The parade each afternoon of Thursday, Friday and Saturday will attract much attention as each float entry will vie for the judges' notice. The floats will be colorful, decorative and full of the creator's imagery. One of the highlights of the parade will be the queen's float, featuring four of our local and lovely girls and their consorts. Coronation of the queen and her prince and princess elect will be carried out in regal ceremony during the opening night rodeo presentation. Her majesty will receive the crown from the president of the group sponsoring her in the contest.

Rodeo stock will be furnished by Goat Mayo. Contests will be held in wild steer riding, ribbon and calf roping, saddle bronc and bareback riding and a cowgirl sponsored event. Performances will be at local rodeo arena and will begin at 8 p. m. each evening. Admission is \$1.25 and 60c.

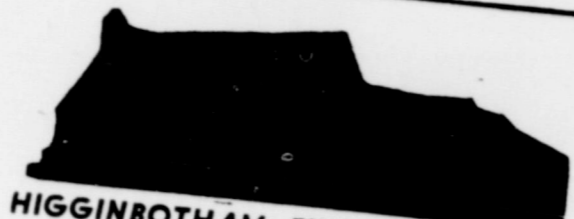

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems.

SECTION 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be numbered 63 which shall read as follows: "Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Teacher Retirement System shall be entitled to credit for all services rendered, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as an appointive officer or employee of the State. Likewise, members of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Employees Retirement System shall be entitled to credit for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have been printed thereon.

The Foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have been printed thereon.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes; and providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

SECTION 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows: "Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the qualified property tax paying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."

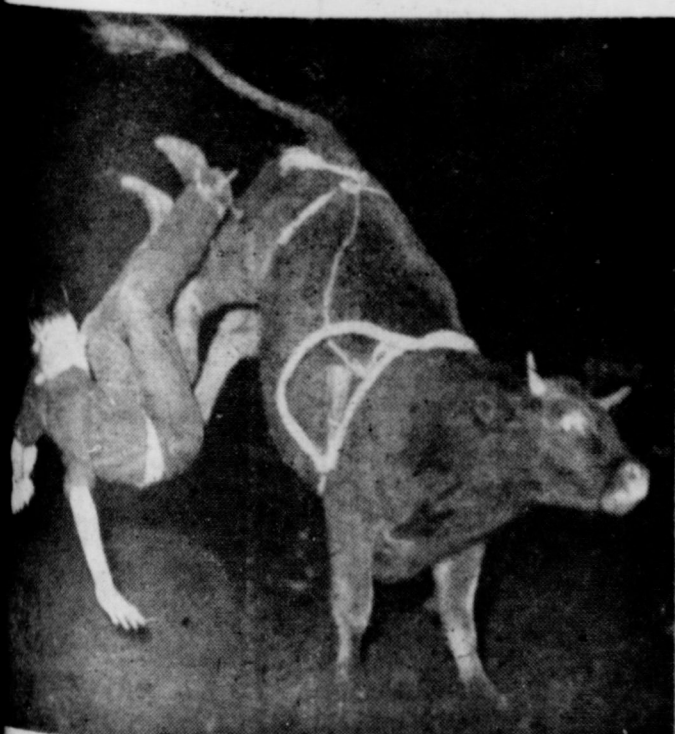
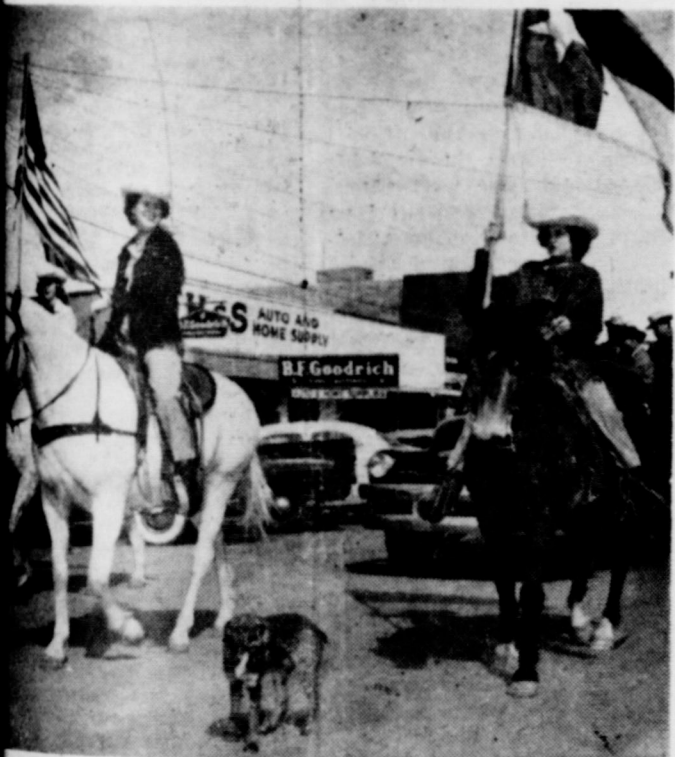

CONSERVATION DISPLAY SHOWS RUN-OFF PERFECT

A soil and water conservation display, powered by four electric motors, and designed and built by engineers of the Texas Electric Service Company, assisted by specialists from the Soil Conservation Service, has been installed at the First National Bank in O'Donnell where it will remain for two weeks.

After this the display will be moved to the First National Bank at Stanton and then to the banks at Midland. It will be installed in each of them for two weeks.

The display has already been shown in Wichita Falls, Eastland, Graham, DeLeon, Ranger, Big Spring, Lamesa and other areas in the state.

The four separate illuminated units making up the display have been made up from actual color photographs taken during a rain last fall, and picture the penetration or runoff of water on four types of West Texas soil.

One picture, the lighting effects showing the water actually penetrating the soil, is of rangeland in good condition with a heavy grass cover. Another shows the effect of a hard surface crust in an abandoned cultivated field when it rains. A third was made in a field devoted to crop rotation, and the fourth demonstrates the results from a plow pan.

Set with the display is a special made picture of the members of the Board of Supervisors of Dawson County Soil Conservation District and a supply of literature descriptive of approved soil and water conservation practices is on a nearby table. Visitors are encouraged to supply themselves with these pamphlets.

Last year TESCO engineers created another conservation display which was shown here but which mainly followed the theme of range conservation.

The Texas Electric Service Company works in close cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service, the Extension Service and the Vocational Agriculture program in soil and water conservation matters.

Visitors have described this display as one of the most unusual and attractive ones they have ever seen since it shows in full movement just exactly how the rainfall either penetrates the soil or runs off.

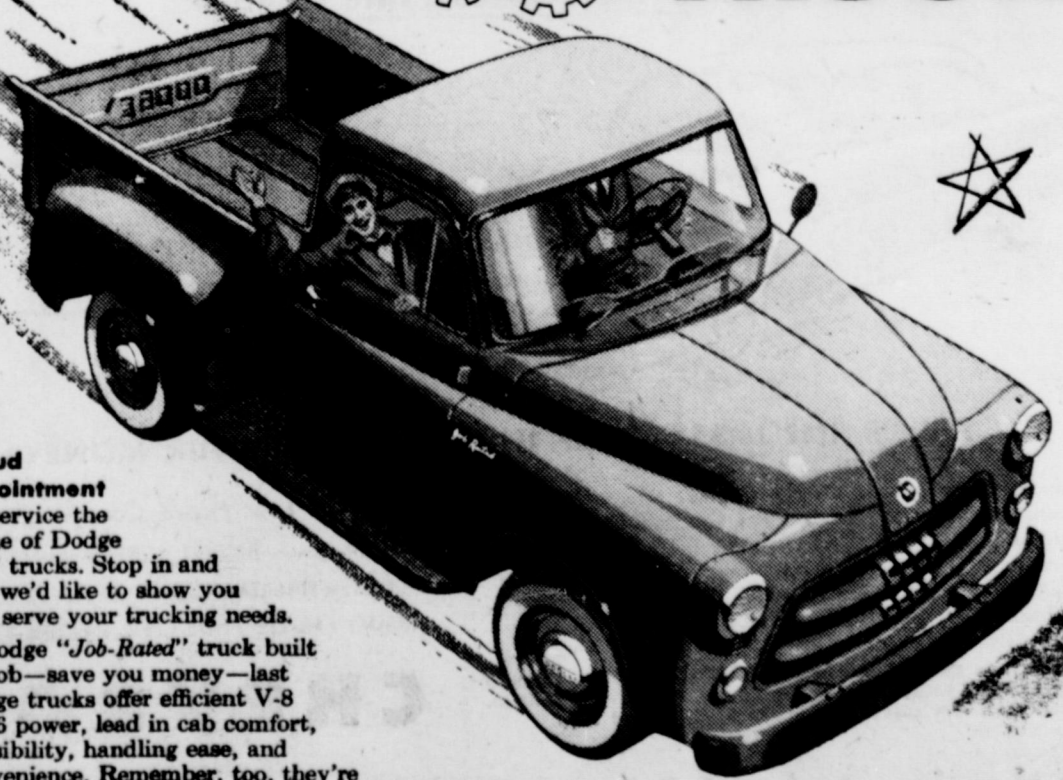

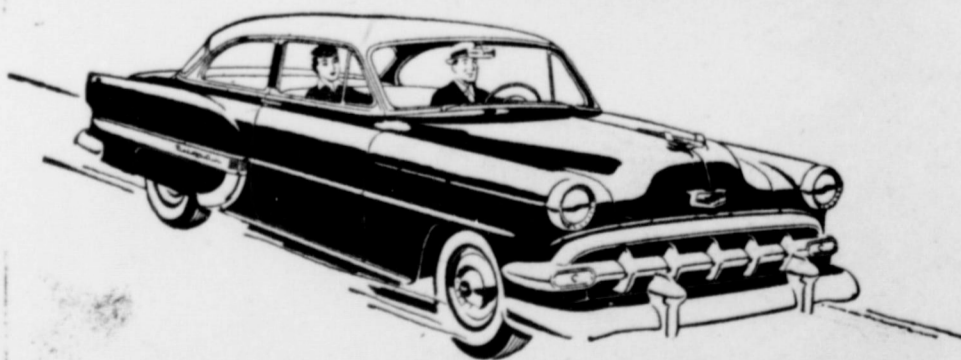

Lenore Tunnell Makes Statement

Mrs. Lenore M. Tunnell makes the following statement in regard to her race for re-election as County Superintendent of Schools:

When I asked the Index to announce for me in January, I said I would later make a statement for the press.

First of all, I should like to tell the people of this county some of the facts about the office.

There will be, in the very near future, I believe, a change in the office. There has been since the Gilmer-Akin school law was enacted devious plans introduced in the Texas Legislature to abolish entirely the office of County Superintendent. In fact, that was the plan when the office of State Superintendent was done away with. The pressure to keep the office was great enough that, to pass the Gilmer-Akin bill, the office of County Superintendent was left as is. For the past four years, the County Superintendents of Texas have made a research study, "We Study Ourselves." It is my understanding that this study will be presented to the Legislature to see whether the office of County Superintendent in Texas is justified. Many think that counties will be grouped and a Superintendent appointed over the unit. Roy Boyd of Lubbock and I are co-chairmen of this study for West Texas.

In 1947, I organized the Lynn County Vocational School where between 475 and 500 returned World War II and Korean veterans have had on-the-farm training with subsistence allotments ranging from \$97.50 to \$130 per month paid them. This way my contribution toward rehabilitating and aiding these young men and their families to make a new start in life after the war. Under Public Laws 346 and 550, I could have hired a \$500 a month coordinator, but I felt the money could be used for equipment and supplies, so I served in the capacity of coordinator without pay. I feel my work in this capacity unfinished.

I have always tried to be efficient, accomodating and progressive in handling the office. I am associated with the following state, national, and local educational organizations: American Association of School Administrators, Texas Association of School Administrators, Texas Association of County School Superintendents, Secretary of County Superintendents Ass'n. of District 4, Texas State Teachers Association, committee member of West Texas State Teachers Association and a delegate to TSTA by virtue of this fact, Delta Kappa Gamma, honorary teachers' fraternity, and American Association of University Women.

I hold A. B. and M. A. degrees in Government, having done my pre-law work in Texas Tech College.

I have been a classroom teacher, a principal in both two and three teacher schools, and I have served as County Superintendent of this county four terms. I hope I have served Lynn county well. Never has a school, a club, a church, a fraternal organization, or an individual asked me to do a job that I have not done it to the best of my ability.

I have made an effort to contact in town or at home each voter in Lynn County. I have not been able to see everyone of you and I am taking this means of seeing you and asking you for your vote on July 24.

I appreciate my friends in Lynn County for the marvelous support they have given me in the past, and I shall never cease to be grateful. I hope I have never violated the trust you have placed in me.

I have done my best to see each of you but I have had to carry on my work in the office and I have had to carry on my work for the war veterans of the Lynn County Vocational School and my time has been somewhat limited. Always I have tried to serve the schools and the school children of Lynn County well. You may be assured that if I am elected, the best interest of the schools and the school children of Lynn County shall be my paramount and outstanding objective.

Thank you for your vote and your help.

HUMAN CONTACT FACTOR IN POLIO

This is the season of when an increase in polio can be expected and Dr. R. H. Holle, State Health Officer, is urging the public to cooperate in preventing the spread of this disease.

Children should not visit where poliomyelitis or other diseases are present. One of the most important factors in its control is direct contact between the child and the patient.

Direct contact between the child and the patient is the chief factor in the spread of poliomyelitis and other diseases. It is difficult to determine the exact number of human contacts during any one of these seasons.

Dr. Holle stressed the fact that a rigid program of sanitation is always advised. He added that flies and other insects may convey the virus. He added that the mission has not been demonstrated but pointed out that sanitation is always advised. Controlling disease and poliomyelitis is likely to prove dangerous.

Early symptoms of poliomyelitis are headache, fever, unusual drowsiness, and stiffness in the neck and back. Children under 12 years are most susceptible. Children under 12 years should be watched for suspicious symptoms.

VA Quik

I'm planning to take training under the Korean GI Bill but I found out I'll have to pay \$30 a month tuition. My World War II veteran and the Government paid for my training under the Korean GI Bill. You pay all the expenses yourself. But under the Korean GI Bill, you pay a single monthly allowance to do this. Under the World War II GI bill, the VA paid a training cost.

My husband was killed in Korea and I have been receiving monthly indemnity payments of \$92.90. Will those payments stop if I remarry?

No. Remarriage will not stop your continued entitlement to indemnity payments.

I am a Korean veteran and am thinking of opening a business. I will have to wait for several years in order to accumulate cash. When I'm ready, will I be able to get a GI business loan or program due to expire soon?

I am planning to take training under the Korean GI Bill, the same as veterans. Will I be allowed 30 days of trade and vocational course?

No. Under the Korean GI Bill you will be paid on the basis of flight instruction actually received -- and nothing more. You will not be paid for absences.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
 NO. 2

Proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property taxpaying voters at an election held for that purpose within such District; prescribing the powers of such District; providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of 1954; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as follows:
 "Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 190,000, and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any county owned hospital or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, building or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness theretofore issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities; to levy a tax not to exceed seventy five (75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of all taxable property within such dis-

trict provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property taxpaying voters in such county shall vote therein; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county and there after such county and cities there in shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes; and provided further that should such Hospital District construct, maintain, and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or

improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."
 Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to pass laws authorizing the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 190,000

and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax;" and ...
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County and to levy a hospital tax."
 Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

 When you get that new card - use it - show it to your employer and be sure he copies both name and number exactly as they appear on the card.

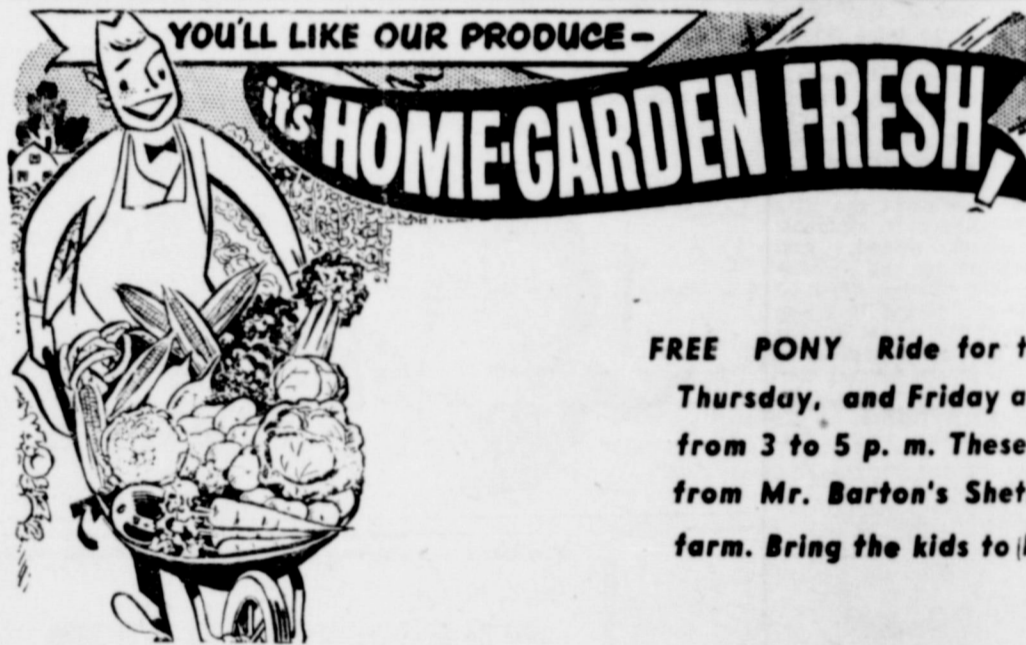
