## Monday Nite Fire Hits Pharmacy, Clinic

Fire Monday nite starting at about 9 gutted the Annex of Rumbo Clinic in the LaGrone building and broke into the adjoining Lott Pharmacy on the east where the south portion of the pharmacy roof fell in. The annex and contents were a total loss. The office of the clinic and examining rooms were badly damaged by smoke and water. The pharmacy received near total damage in the south half of the building and smoke and water damage in the north half. The fire was controlled about an hour and half. The fire apparently started in the roof of annex in the decking of the roof. Damage is estimated at about \$40,000 early Tuesday morning and may run higher depending upon salvage estimates.

Chief Jones boys did a most remarkable job in holding the fire and they were joined at about 9:45 by a unit of the Tahoka Fire Department. Several times O'Donnell's hose dripped and the firemen got wet and cold. Tahoka's response is deeply appreciated.

Monday's loss was a most severe one to the town as it hit its source of medical supplies and services of the town's only physician. There were no patients in the Clinic and no injuries.

Lott Pharmacy was a show place here being most modern and attractive and moved into only about 3 years ago. By Tuesday noon, Dr. Rumbo and staff were moving back into the clinic. Mr. Lott had not announced his plans by noon Tuesday.

The town has had several severe fire losses in recent years losing a theatre and more recently a grain elevator. The town will rally to build back and make an even better town.

Know Your Law --

Most likely you can't picture yourself being brought into court on anything worse than a speeding violation. Nearly everyone feels that way. Even so, it is good to know that in this country you can't be made to stand trial twice for the same offense.

We have a provision in the U. S. constitution against "double jeopardy". That's one of the important safeguards in our law system which makes it certain that once a court has reached a verdict of "innocent", the acquitted person may not be put on trial again for the same offense.

To add to the protection, if a person has been acquitted, the prosecution cannot appeal the case to a higher court. The constitution states specifically: "Nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life and limb."

This right holds good, however, only if a full trial is held and a verdict is reached. It is possible to face another trial on the same charge if the first trial ends with a "hung jury" or a "mistrial", or if a new trial is requested.

**Child Care Important**

In all nature there is an ele-  
mentary truth: The mother al-  
ways protects her young. The trus-  
tism applies fourfold in human civ-  
ilization.

In our complex society there are  
so many things for parents to do  
to protect their young that they  
are apt to let certain aspects of  
child protection slide.

One of these is seeing that their  
children have the entire battery of  
protective inoculations against po-  
lio. This is especially important for  
small children — the pre-schooler.

Last year there were 1,618 cases  
of paralytic polio up to the mid-  
dle of September. This year, by  
September 19, there were 3,407  
cases in the United States.

The largest percentage of vic-  
tims were under five years of age.  
In Texas there have already been  
257 cases of paralytic polio, a  
slight rise over last year.

The overwhelming majority of  
paralytic polio victims have been  
persons who have not completed  
the entire series of three shots.

Immunization programs are in  
effect in many schools, so that lar-  
ge numbers of school children have  
been polio-protected.

However, that still leaves huge  
numbers of adults and small child-  
ren unprotected.

Parents have a responsibility to  
themselves to start and finish the  
series of three Salk shots.

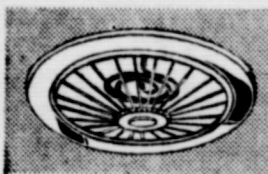

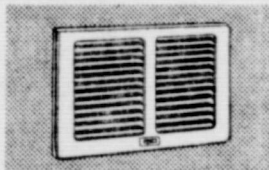

### Know Your Law ---

You have read of someone's "taking the Fifth".

Why does our constitution let people — some involved in crimes — keep on refusing to answer questions put to them in our courts, investigating committees, and government agencies?

Because no man can be called on to accuse himself or give evidence against himself.

Where did this rule come from? From the church canons.

Long ago under common law, witnesses or parties took an oath and talked a lot or a little as their consciences bade.

Later an English law put witnesses under an oath somewhat like the Church's oath; but the judge could subject them to sharp questioning, even torture. The king, for example, punished "heresy and sedition" this way.

England at last changed the law: Before any one had to take an "inquisitional" oath, someone had to accuse him of a crime or show that he was "notoriously suspicious". No more "fishing expeditions". No man had to accuse himself.

By 1790 no man had to testify if to do so could bring on his own punishment. The American colonies adopted this rule, and as the Fifth Amendment wrote it into our constitution as the Bill of Rights.

### V. A. Quiz

Q—Is every service-disabled Korea veteran entitled to special vocational rehabilitation training?

A—No. A veteran must need the training to help him overcome the handicap of his disability. However, a disabled veteran who does not meet this qualification still may be eligible for training under the Korean GI Bill.

Q—Is the War Orphans Education training program only a college program?

A—No. The War Orphans Education program, besides providing college and university training, offers opportunities in a wide variety of schools below the college level as well. Training is permitted in technical institutes, business schools, some vocational or trade schools, normal schools, institutions offering courses in medical and related fields, and in junior colleges.

Q—I am planning to convert my World War II GI term insurance to a permanent plan. Do I have to convert the entire amount of my insurance, or can I convert just a part of it?

A—You may convert a part of your GI term insurance, if you wish. The amount converted must be in multiples of \$500, but not less than \$1,000.

Q—I understand that a World War II veteran must file his application for a GI loan by July 25, 1960. Just what steps have to be taken by that date?

A—By that date, a lender must at least have agreed to make the loan and must have requested VA's approval. The law allows up to an additional year, after that deadline, to complete the deal.

lived here since 1930. He was raised on a Gaines County farm, attended Lamesa High School and is a 1934 graduate of Texas Tech.

He is an active Mason and Shriner, and a member of the Lubbock Kiwanis Club, a trustee of St. John's Methodist Church and a director of the Salvation Army.

Mr. Smith's career in Texas government began in 1944 with his election to the Legislature representing the old 119th District. He was elected twice to this post and in 1950 campaigned for the office of Lieutenant Governor, placing third in a field of 12 candidates and leading the tickets of 68 counties.

Among his activities in the Legislature, he was author or co-author of bills for better higher education, more hospitals, rural telephones, legislative redistricting to give West Texas true representation in state government, and was co-author of the Briscoe-Colson Farm to Market Road program.

During his current term as state senator, Mr. Smith has emphasized many times, in every place possible, that Texas government belongs to the people. Any public official who believes otherwise is not of the proper attitude to serve his people.

"To keep state business from the people is to start a trend toward stronger, more authoritative boards and commissions which can enforce rules contrary to the will of the people of the state.

"A good example of this excessive board strength is the current auto insurance plan enacted by the state insurance commission. The rate plan is being condemned in part for its complexities which adversely affect all drivers, even those with excellent records. Any policy that affects so many Texans deserves study by the Legislature. In order to bring the opinions of all citizens to bear on the program

"During the past three and half years, my office has kept close communication with public news media to help keep state government activities before the people of this district. My feelings in support of "openness of government" motivated me to sponsor a bill to require admission of news media to any group charged with spending tax money.

the "Wild West" in the late 1880's. A man named Ball was charged with murder, along with two others. Ball was acquitted, but the others were found guilty. The guilty pair appealed to a higher court, and their original indictment was found to be faulty.

Once again the government accused all three men. Ball claimed his right against double jeopardy had been invaded, and the U. S. Supreme Court agreed. He didn't have to stand trial again. The other two did, and paid the penalty for their guilt.

The reason for the "double jeopardy" provision is to protect the individual from being hounded all his life. In old England, where the fear of tyranny first prompted safeguards for personal freedom, one court said: "Were it not for this rule, anyone obnoxious to the government be run down by repeated attempts to carry on a prosecution against him".

- 1-lb. can tomatoes
- 1 lb. ground lean beef
- 1 Tablesp. grated onion
- 1 teasp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 teasp. salt
- 1/2 teasp. pepper
- 2 slices fresh bread, torn into crumbs
- 1/2 cup PET instant (in dry form)
- 3 Tablesp. butter or margarine
- 1 Tablesp. flour
- 1 teasp. sugar

Drain and measure 1/2 cup juice from tomatoes. Let rest of juice and tomatoes stand until needed. Mix well in 1 1/2-qt. bowl the 1/2 cup tomato juice, beef, onion, 1/2 teasp. Worcestershire, 1 teasp. salt, pepper, bread and PET instant. Divide meat mixture into 4 equal parts. With wet hands, shape each part into a small loaf. Put loaves into 9-in. square pan. Dot loaves with equal parts of 1 Tablesp. butter. Bake in 325 oven (low moderate) 30 or 35 min., or until brown. Meanwhile, melt 2 Tablesp. butter in a 1 qt. saucepan. Stir in flour until smooth. Add tomatoes and rest of juice, sugar, 1/2 teasp. salt and 1/2 teasp. Worcestershire. Bring sauce to boil. Then lower heat and cook 10 min., stirring now and then. Serve loaves with sauce and cooked broccoli. Makes 4 servings.
