HOW TO FIGURE YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Many people are under the erroneous impression that 6 quarters of coverage will make them fully and permanently insured under the Social Security Act. While it is true that some considerations. some employees and self-employed individuals need only quarters of coverage for a fully insured status, others may need as much as 40 quarters of coverage.

A quarter of coverage is any calendar quarter after the end of 1936 in which an individual is paid wages of at least \$50 for employment covered by the social secu ity law. Beginning January 1, 1951 quarter of coverage is any calendar quarter in which a self-employed person is credited with net earn ings from self-employment lay be credited to an individual's account, e must have self-employment net ome of at least \$400 for the tax

In determing the quarters of cov erage required for a fully insured status., the starting point is January 1, 1951. To find how many quarters a given individual needs from that starting roint, count the calendar quarters up to the nuarter in which the individual reaches the age 65 or dies, whichever occurs first. Divide the total number of elapsed quarters by two and drop any odd number. The result will be required quarters of coverage for the individual. A minimum of quarters of coverage is required all cases and a maximum of 40 quarters of coverage will be required in some cases. In no case would an individual ever need more than 40 quarters of coverage. Quarters acquired in coverage. Quarters acquired in covered employment at any time after 1936 may be added to quarters gained in covered employment or self employment after 1950 to make up the required amount.

Right Of Way May Be Needed For Two Counties

Work Set For 1955

The Texas Highway Department is expected soon to ask Lynn and Dawson Counties of right of way deeds for the proposed 4-lane high way thru Lynn County extending to Lamesa. S. C. McCarty, district en-gineer of the Highway Department, said preliminary surveys are already underway from Tahoka to O'Donnell. \$450,000.00 of State and Federal funds have been ear-marked for two additional lanes of paved road in Lynn Co. from Tahoka to C'Doanell and a similar project is set for Dawson Co. from O'Donnell to Lamesa. The long time dream is to make all of 87 an expressway.

Lynn and Dawson Counties will be expected to furnish the right of way and to do this the two counties may have to vote a small bond issue.

paving would be used where possib le for two lanes and then there would be 40 feet between the new two lene road. In all 60 more feet would be needed. Then the State will ask the counties involved for eservation agreements on another 40 feet on each side for a possible freeway in the future. This land could be farmed until such future date as needed, if ever. Possible cost to each county would run from \$12,000 to \$14,000 for immediate right of way. It is expected that in next few years the project would tie in at Lubbock Co. line.

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

Spiderweb Business **Proves Profitable** In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.-Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed hairs." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "hairs" are made.

Her business goes back to her childhood when, because of her frail health, her parents encouraged her to be out-of-doors as much as possible. She became interested in insect life-first moths and butterflies, then crickets, and finally spiders.

By 1939, when 37, she had been experimenting with extracting the silken web from spiders for several years. The government was inquiring whether the web would be produced commercially.

Human hairs had been utilized for years in gunsights, bombsights and periscopes, but were susceptible to extreme temperatures. They contracted and broke in the subzero cold of the stratosphere-and sagged in high temperatures. An extremely fine, sturdy and elastic strand was needed-and the spider web was the answer.

Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer draws the silk from one of the spider's spinnerets and reels it on a metal frame for shipment.




