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

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



Hope Held For Child Disease

The outlook in the fight against rheumatic fever has improved, but most often between the ages of five and fifteen, still results in serious heart damage in many cases, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Rheumatic fever usually strikes

after a nose and throat infection caused by germs of the streptococcus family. An average of three out of one hundred of the common-ly called "strep" infections are followed by rheumatic fever. penicillin Sulfonamide and

usually can overcome the infection. But if rheumatic fever developes, strict bed rest is the first resort to ease the load on the heart and to help the patient avoid added infection

Sometimes sulpha or penicillin may be given to the convalescing patient to help avoid a recurrence of the disease. Repeated attacks of rheumatic fever are more likely to lead to heart damage. The rheumatic heart condition

can involve damage to one or more

of the four valves of the heart or to the heart muscle itself. Rheumatic fever inflames the valves and muscles and when the inflamation subsides, it usually leaves a scar.

In about two out of three cases this fever leaves no heart damage. or cases so little injury that the victim can regain active, everyday living. In other cases, modern surgery may help. No matter how slight an attack

of rheumatic fever may seem, the first and most important thing to do is to follow your doctor's advice to the letter.
