NO HELP IN BEING FEARFUL OF CANCER, SAYS DOCTOR

Fear of cancer cannot help its victim, and unreasonable fear should be replaced by intelligent action concerning this disease, is the opinion of Dr. Holle, Commissioner of Health.

The doctor said that cancer can usually be cured in its earlier stages, before it spreads to other areas of the body. This has been demonstrated by the fact that many persons have been treated successfully by surgery, radium, or x-ray and are now living, many years after a definite diagnosis of early cancer was made. Many people postpone diagnosis when they suspect cancer either because they dread to hear the truth or because they believe that a cure is impossible.

In the treatment of cancer, time is the most important factor, according to Dr. Holle. To produce satisfactory results, treatment must begin early in the course of the disease while the cancer is confined to a small area.

Persons suspecting cancer should consult their doctor as soon as they notice any unexplainable lump, unusual discharge, a persistent sore on any part of the body or any change in the appearance of a mole or wart. It is disastrous to wait for pain as this is a late symptom that usually doesn't occur until the malignant growth has made much advance.

If an educated guess of 12,000 bales is near correct for the season, the harvest is roughly 1-3rd complete. There remains an acute shortage of harvest labor. Going rate of pulling is \$1.55 hundred. Grain harvesting is rapid as is the cotton harvest due to the beautiful fall weather. Business was very good over the week end.

Now, lay out the supply of pin curlers, hair net and contents of your kit. Read the directions thoroughly. Next, block off the hair in the regular home permanent wave blocking pattern.

While the hair is still damp, start rolling the curls. Saturate each strand with waving lotion, slip on end papers and curlers. Once wound, you can forget about the hair for 30 minutes and get breakfast for the family.

Half an hour later finds you rinsing the curls briefly with clear water and towel blotting to out-land dripping. Slip a scarf on the head until your husband leaves. Substitute a hair net to hold in place.

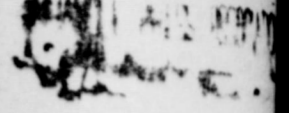

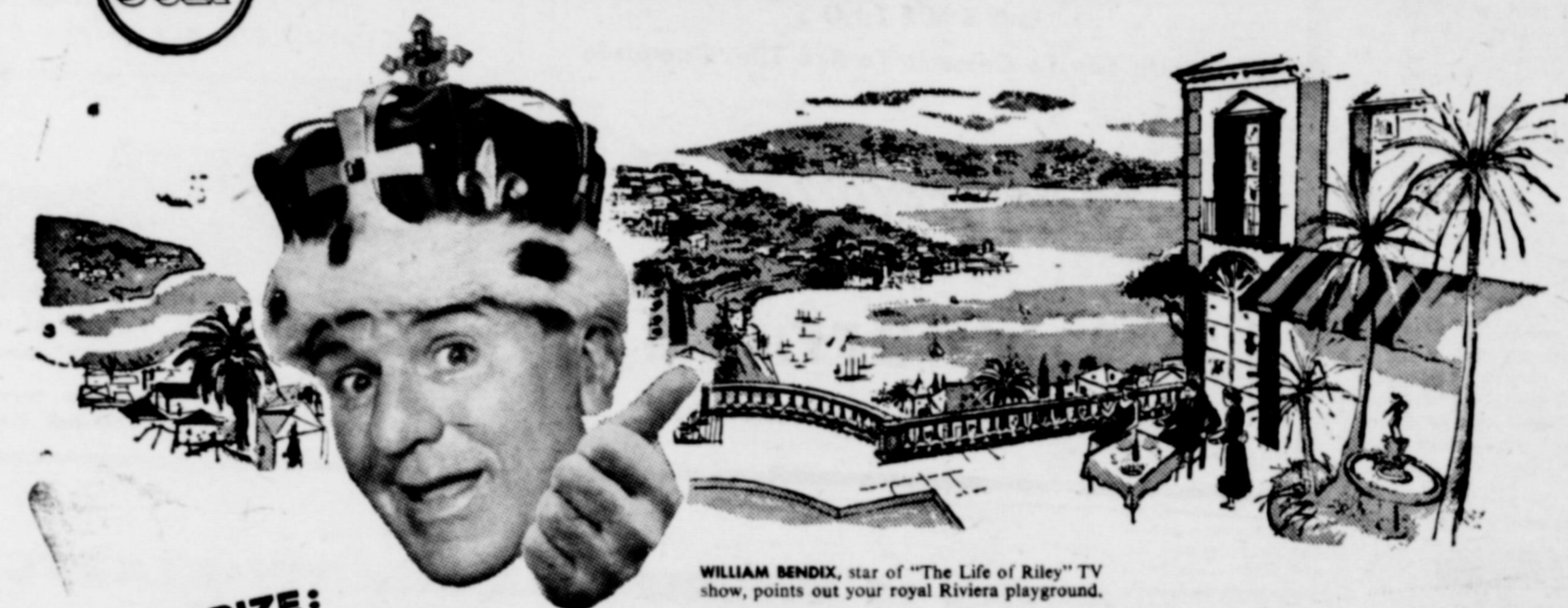

Vegetable combinations make excellent main dishes if you add a protein food such as eggs or cheese to them. Besides, it's an excellent way to keep the food budget trim.

Green peppers stuffed with this corn mixture are a pretty as well as nourishing and interesting vegetable dish. You'll want to keep this recipe on file for the next several months:

Corn-Pepper Bake (Serves 6)

- 6 large green peppers
- 4 slices bacon
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tablespoons finely diced onion
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 1/2 cups milk, scalded
- 2 cups cooked corn
- 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs

Wash peppers, cut a slice from the side of each and remove seeds and fibrous parts. Cover with boiling water and simmer 5 minutes. Meanwhile cook bacon, drain and dice. Beat egg slightly. Melt butter, add onion and cook until tender. Add flour, sugar, seasonings and blend. Add milk and cook

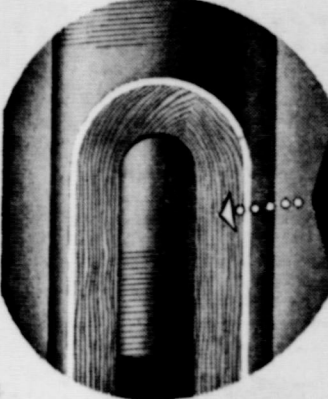
